Lions sponsor Van Allen show

Highlights of his recent "slow cruise to China" will be pictorially traced by W. L. Van Allen, Bend, Monday at 8 p.m. when he shows, at the Tower Theater, colored pictures he took on the Orient trip.

Van Allen will appear at the Tower under auspices of the Bend Lions Club, and in the two hour show plans to present some 470 colored pictures, selected from a total of 1,350. Some of the pictures were taken along the Saigon where the sound of Communist guns could be heard.

Mr. and Mrs. Van Allen made the 80-day round trip to the Orient, via the Marshall Islands and the Philippines, aboard the S.S. President Taft, a big freighter carrying 400 carloads of cargo.

The journey took the Van Allens to South Vietnam, Cambodia, Thailand, Indonesia, the Island of Java, Singapore, Kuala Lumpur, Malaya and Penang.

Van Allen in recent years has won national recognition in the photographic field and many of his pictures have been shown at national shows in the east.

Van Allen will serve as narrator, and plans to present a colorful, fast-moving show, Lions said. The clubmen will use proceeds from the show for their various community activities, especially in their sight conservation efforts.

Crops facing threat from cold snap

A crippling cold snap shattered low temperature records across the northeastern portion of the nation today and threatened to wipe out millions of dollars worth of tender fruit and vegetable crops.

State police said farmers at Erie, Pa., were "burning everything they could get their hands on" in a frantic effort to ward off damage to lush groves of grapes, peaches, apples and cherries.

The president of one of the four largest wineries in central New York said the skidding temperatures may wipe out the \$100 million grape crop.

"There's nothing we can do," he said.

Temperatures tumbled to 26 degrees at Olean and Stewart Air Force Base, 27 at Elmira, 28 at Utica, and 29 at Poughkeepsie, all in New York.

New York City set an all-time low record for the date with a 39-degree reading, Albany, N.Y., had a 31-degree reading, breaking the previous record low of 33.

The mercury fell to 30 degrees at Pittsburgh, Pa., breaking the record for the date by two degrees. Some areas in Pennsylvania recorded 26-degree readings.

Apparent agreement on fag tax appears to be reached

SALEM (UPI)—Apparent agreement on a cigarette tax was reached Thursday by Senate-House tax conferees—but the committee remained deadlocked on the income tax issue.

It marked the seventh day of the deadlock over a program to raise an additional \$60 million to finance a \$405 million general fund budget for the biennium beginning 37 days from now.

House conferees Richard Eymann, D - Marcola, and F. F. Montgomery, R - Eugene, stood firm in their demand for a net receipts tax.

Senate conferees Donald Hubbard, R-Eugene, and Glen Stadler, D-Eugene, were equally firm in declaring the Senate would not approve a net receipts program.

First apparent break came Thursday afternoon when Stadler proposed a 4-cent a pack cigarette tax, with \$3 million to go to cities. Stadler also called for holding the one-shot withholding tax collection in reserve in case the cigarette tax was referred to the voters.

Position Stated

"I don't think the Senate will go for the cigarette tax, unless we make it a part of a program that includes something pretty close to the income tax program approved by the Senate," Stadler said.

Eymann and Montgomery agreed to use the cigarette tax, and to hold the one-shot program in reserve. They did not agree to accept the Senate income tax plan, however.

"No matter what income bill we adopt, the House wants some net receipts features in it," Eymann said.

When committee sessions resumed Thursday night, Stadler said he had taken a poll which indicated senators "probably would vote for a cigarette tax if it is part of a program that includes the Senate income tax proposal."

Husband said the Senate would not approve the governor's net receipts tax which was proposed Wednesday by House conferees.

Compromise Offered

Stadler then proposed a "compromise" version of the Senate income tax measure patterned closely after the present law, and including a capital gains feature.

After a short recess House conferees submitted their "compromise" net receipts proposal which included a \$5 filing fee, and a 1 per cent "progressive receipts" tax with a \$1,000 deduction.

Eymann said he would not make any recommendation at this time on either a capital gains measure or an increase in corporate excise taxes.

Approval given school budget

MADRAS — Jefferson county's rural school district tax levy amounting to \$194,502.25 in excess of the six per cent limitation was approved by a 24 vote margin in a lightly attended school election this week.

Total over-all vote in the county saw the levy to provide a tax offset for equalization purposes okehed by a 70 to 54 margin. The election held in the five component school districts saw the measure approved in all districts but Madras 509J.

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Thomas retires as president of auto group

Robert W. Thomas, owner of Bob Thomas Chevrolet - Cadillac Company in Bend, retired as president of the 170-member Oregon Automobile Dealers Association at the group's 29th annual convention in Portland this week. The OADA named Knute Qvale, president of Portland's Riviera Motors, as new association president.

Nearly 300 delegates to the three-day convention heard a series of speakers outline the modern automobile dealer's responsibilities in everything from "quick new car service" to traffic safety. M. R. Darlington, managing director of the nation-wide Auto Industries Highway Safety Committee, and Vern L. Hill, director of the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles, urged the delegates to support such legislation as mandatory installation of seat belts and regular motor vehicle inspection.

Tuesday morning was devoted mainly to a panel discussion on providing speedier and more complete auto service on both new and used cars. Panel members stressed the modern driver's wish to "have his car completely utilitarian at all times." The conclave wound up with an annual golf tournament and banquet Tuesday evening.

Thomas has served as an officer of the OADA for four years. He was elected first vice president in 1961, and advanced to the office of president in 1963. He will continue to serve on the association's Board of Directors.
