## Southerners plan drive to get JFK

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI)-Govs Ross Barnett of Mississippi and George C. Wallace of Alabama will appear at a fund-raising din-ner here June 17 to kick off a Dixlecrat drive to defeat Presi-Kennedy in the 1964 presidential race.

Barnett said those who attended the \$25-per-plate dinner would be charter members of the "Southern Committee To Help Elect The Next President Of The United

The money raised, he said, would be Mississippi's share to help pay the expenses for an unpledged electors campaign. In the last presidential election, Mississippi elected independent electors who cast their ballots for Sen. Harry Byrd, D-Va.

"The south, by working together, will hold the balance of power in selecting the next president of the

United States," Barnett said. Lousiana and Alabama, have "already put up their part of the money and several other states are raising their part. We need the assistance of all Mississippains in order to be able to put our dollars on the line," he said. He did not identify the other

Barnett said the main speaker would be Tom Anderson of Bir-mingham, Ala., editor of the Farm and Ranch magazine. Wallace has accepted his invitation to appear "and will bring a special mes-sage from the people of Alabama,"

flight from the Virgin Islands. Rockefeller, regarded by many as the top possibility for the 1964 Republican presidential nomina-tion, held a brief news conference in New York City during which he ignored all questions concern-ing the effect of his marriage on

## African heads of state agree on charter for new organization

-African heads of state agreed today on a charter for an organization of African states to replace rival blocs that have split this emerging continent.

The new organization's tem-porary headquarters was expected to be in Addis Ababa.

While discussing the charter, the heads of state decided to change the name of the new organization from the Organization of African and Malagasy States to the Organization of African Unity, according to conference

charter creating the organization is being approved article by arti-cle. It will be signed in a public ceremony later today.

The charter was drafted by the

foreign ministers of Ethlopia, Nigeria, Ghana, Cameroun, Senegal and Egypt during the past three days at the insistence of the heads of state.

The organization will consist of: An assembly of kings, presi-dents and premiers which will meet at least once a year and pass resolutions by a two-thirds majority.

A council of ministers which will meet at least twice a year and also adopt resolutions by a

two-thirds majority.

A permanent staff headed by a secretary-general and one or more assistants.

A mediation and conciliation commission, which will be estab-lished by a separate treaty. Pledges member states to settle disputes among themselves by peaceful means.
