

Bend garners 7th place at prep state A-1 track meet

CORVALLIS — Three third places by Bend High School tracksters paced Coach Hoot Moore's track and field team to 18 points and a tie for eighth place last weekend in the state A-1 prep track meet here. Bend's "wonder boy" Bill Hut-

ton accounted for 12 of the 18 tallies himself. Hutton took third in both hurdle races, topping the timbers in the best time during the preliminaries. He toured the course in an amazing 19.6. In the finals, however, he ran them in 19.9 for a third. Hutton ran a 14.9 in the highs.

The event was won in 14.8 seconds. Clyde Smith, the only junior in the event, captured third spot in the discus when he heaved the sphere 155' 3". Herb Hickman, Bend's hope in the 440-yard dash, did not qualify in the preliminaries. The prelims were run in three heats, and Hickman was placed in "the toughest" heat. He took third in the heat with a time of 50.5. The other two heats were won in 50.5.

Jim Leagjeld had a bad day and didn't place in the javelin. Bend's two 880-yard runners, Mark Miller, a senior, and Mike Donley, a sophomore, failed to place in the half mile event.

Thanks to Leon Lincoln, Jefferson High School of Portland, won its second track title in four years.

Lincoln captured the 100 in 9.9, the 220 in 21.6 and ran the anchor leg on the winning 880-yard relay team as the Democrats piled up 46 points.

Myrtle Creek won the Class A-2 championship with 36 points. The Democrats were followed by defending champion North Eugene with 41 points and pre-meet favorite Grants Pass with 35.

Other top schools were Hillsboro with 28, Medford and Marshallfield 24, South Salem 23, Cottage Grove and Bend 18, Lincoln, North Salem and Albany 16, Central Catholic 15, Franklin 14, Roseburg 13, Crater 12 and Klamath Falls and Cleveland 10.

Gary Von Koten of Grants Pass and Mark Henningsgaard of Cottage Grove shattered the pole vault record with vaults of 13-7 1/2. Van Koten was awarded first place on the basis of fewer attempts.

Wendell Cox of Hillsboro won the mile in 4:16.8.

In Class A-2, pre-meet favorite Central Linn finished second to Myrtle Creek with 34. Reedsport gained 32, defending champion Creswell scored 30, Rogue River tallied 29 and St. Mary's had 28.

Two records were broken in the A-2 competition. Allan Fowler of Creswell broke the broad jump record by winning with a 22-4 1/2 jump and Central Linn's 680-yard relay bettered the other mark by coming in first in 1:32.2.

3 bobbling baseballers mar loop race

Three butter-fingered bullplayers saro messed up the National League race on Sunday.

The culprits were shortstop Jose Pagan of the San Francisco Giants and outfielder Duke Carmel and pitcher Bob Gibson of the St. Louis Cardinals, but before climbing all over them or suggesting they sell their gloves, be advised they ordinarily do a fine job on defense.

Not Sunday, though.

Pagan committed three errors and his last one in the 10th inning enabled the second-place Los Angeles Dodgers to beat the first-place Giants, 4-3, and slice their league lead to two games.

Carmel and Gibson each made errors during the 11th inning of a nightcap against the New York Mets, helping Casey Stengel's crew snap a seven-game losing streak and defeat the third-place Cardinals for the first time this season, 3-2. The Cards won the opener, 7-4.

It was a miserable day all around for Pagan, who went hitless at the plate, set up one Dodger run with a wild throw in the fourth inning and let in the tying run with another bad peg in the seventh.

With Don Larsen pitching in the 10th, Jim Gilliam bounced a routine grounder to Pagan, who then threw wild again, allowing Gilliam to go all the way to second from where he scored the winning run on Tommy Davis' single.

Winner Don Drysdale (6-4) gave up eight hits, including solo homers by Jim Davenport and Felipe Alou.

In the Mets-Cards nightcap, Carmel, who had replaced left-fielder Stan Musial in the 10th, muffed Charley Neal's 11th inning fly for a two-base error. Chico Fernandez then bunted toward the mound and Gibson fired wildly past first base for another two-base error that scored Neal with the winning run.

The defeat cost the Cardinals a chance to move within 3 1/2 games of first place after they beat the Mets in the opener on a three-run homer by pinch hitter Charlie James in the eighth inning. St. Louis bombed four of five Met pitchers for 16 hits, including five by Ken Boyer and four by Bill White.

In other National League games the Philadelphia Phillies swept a twin-bill from the Cincinnati Reds 10-4 and 3-0; the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 5-2, in 11 innings, and the Chicago Cubs downed the Houston Colts, 5-1.

Over in the American League, the first-place Baltimore Orioles took two from the Cleveland Indians, 10-6 and 6-1; the New York Yankees beat the Washington Senators, 7-1, but dropped the nightcap, 7-6; the Detroit Tigers trounced the Boston Red Sox, 12-4, then lost the nightcap, 6-5; Chicago White Sox, 5-2, and the Los Angeles Angels beat the Kansas City A's, 6-4.

Ray Culp, a 21-year-old bonus rookie pitcher who received \$100,000 for signing, and 36-year-old veteran Roy Sievers, who was given only a new pair of baseball shoes for signing his first major league contract, were the stand-

Baker's passing not enough as varsity wins

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Oregon State's varsity rallied for two touchdowns in the final minute and a half to defeat the alumni 36-28 Saturday despite a brilliant passing exhibition by Terry Baker.

Baker hit 32 of 46 passes attempted, including two for touchdowns. He also ran for a score.

Doug McDougall tallied on a three-yard pass from Gordon Drake with 1:20 left and Wane Drake tallied on a 24-yard run with 31 seconds remaining to give the varsity its victory. It trailed 28-22 before its last two touchdowns and was behind 21-14 at halftime.

Fighter Johnson remains favorite

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Light heavyweight champion Harold Johnson is a prohibitive favorite at 18-5 to beat clever Willie Pastrano at the Las Vegas convention center Saturday night in their title fight, which features this week's boxing schedule.

Their 15-round bout will be televised nationally to homes by ABC.

This will be the fifth defense for muscular Johnson of Philadelphia, 34, since he won the vacant title in 1961.

Twenty-seven-year old Pastrano of Miami Beach, second-ranking contender, clinched the title shot by upsetting Wayne Thornton of Fresno, Calif., by a decision on May 4.

Johnson seeks his 20th straight victory. He hasn't been beaten since May 6, 1955, when knocked out by Julio Mederos in the "doped orange" incident.

Johnson is heavily favored because of his combined skill and punch. Pastrano is the speediest

and most elusive performer in the 175-pound division, but he is a comparatively light hitter.

Promoters Mel Greb and Jack Doyle hope for a gate of \$90,000 in the 8,000-seat convention center. In addition the television fee to the promotion is \$60,000. Johnson is guaranteed \$37,500; Pastrano \$21,250.

An excellent 10 round lightweight contenders' fight is slated for Caracas, Venezuela, Monday night, when third-ranked Buny Grant of Jamaica, B.W.I., meets fourth-rated Carlos Hernandez of Venezuela.

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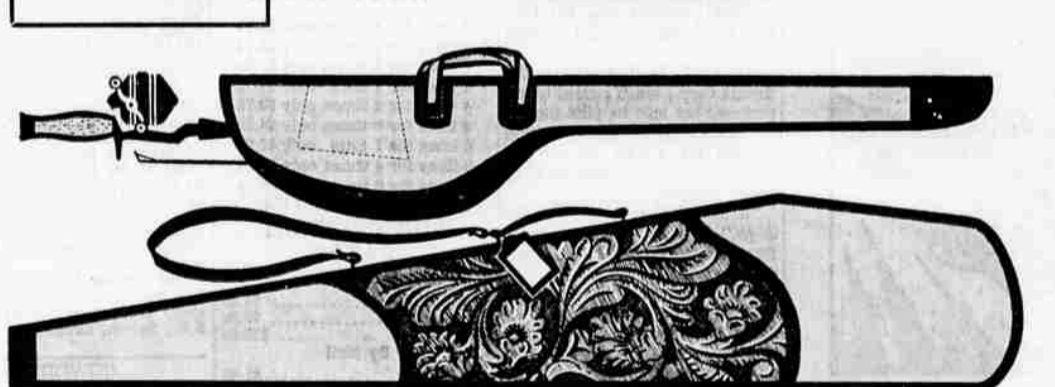
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
