Bid invitation on center issued

The U.S. Forest Service has issued an invitation for bids in connection with the construction of the first phase of the Redmond Aerial Center, a project that will continue over a period of several years.

Officials said bids will be received until 2 p.m. on June 21, in the office of the contracting officer at the Forest Service headquarters in Portland. A pre-bid conference will be held at the building site, on Roberts Field, Redmond, at 10 a.m. on June 4.

Phase I of the development calls for a paraloft building, a 25-man barracks and a 100 man mess hall. Plans may be obtained from the Contracting Officer, U.S. Forest Service, Box 3623, Portland, 8, Oregon.

Work is now under way on an access route to the Air Center location. This road takes off from U.S. Highway 26 about two miles east of Redmond. The work, a \$10,000 project, is about 60 per cent completed.

Bids for excavation of the paraloft building, two septic tanks and an elevator pit at the aerial center will be opened on May 28, at 2 p.m.

Harrison Gray dies at age 76

SALEM (UPI)—State police today were looking for an 82-year-old escapee from the Oregon State Hospital here who was committed in 1957 following the fatal shooting of a Klamath County welfare worker.

Being sought was Guy Earl Cramer of Klamath Falls, who walked away from the hospital Friday afternoon. He was not considered dangerous.

Cramer was placed in the hospital after he shot and killed Fred Peterson and wounded two other welfare workers during a welfare meeting at Klamath Falls. He told police he was angry because he was refused welfare.

Cramer also escaped from the hospital last August. He was captured at Klamath Falls last January and returned to the hospital.

Reds seemed to be glum in little Laos

In Vientiane, sleepy capital of the sad little kingdom of Laos, Soviet diplomats this week appeared noticeably glum.

If so, they had good reason. For it appeared that Moscow had lost an important round in its battle with Red China for Communist leadership, one that affected not only the Soviet position in Laos but one that would have repercussions throughout Asia.

It also seemed likely to have an important effect on the efforts of the United States and Britain to preserve the shaky neutrality of the little landlocked nation which appears small on the map of the world's power struggle but looms large in the future of Southeast Asia.

When on July 23, 1962, in Geneva the foreign ministers of 14 nations signed an accord on the neutrality of Laos, it was done so by the West with the ironical knowledge that its success would depend upon keeping the Soviets in and the Red Chinese out.

Moscow Direction

The hope lay in the belief that Red North Viet Nam, chief supporter of the Red Pathet Lao, leaned more toward Moscow than Peking in its political orientation and thus would be more likely to heed Soviet counsel.

North Viet Nam's Ho Chi Minh had been trained in Moscow and was believed to depend on Moscow to preserve his own status against any ambitions of his big Chinese neighbor.

Whatever validity there was in the hope disappeared when Red China's No. 2 man, Liu Shao-chi, chose the North Viet Nam capital of Hanoi to deliver another bitter attack on Communist "revisionism" and on Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's policy of co-existence.

The attack only could have been delivered by permission of Ho Chi Minh and so it meant that Red China, advocate of the export of violent revolution, had taken over as Ho's chief mentor.

Blow to Prestige

If it meant a blow to Moscow's prestige in Asia and to Allied hopes in Laos, there were others also to whom the Laotian truce had brought disillusionment.

One was neutralist Laotian Premier Prince Souvanna Phouma who had castigated the United States for its support of the pro-Western government which preceded him, and who now also castigated the Reds for their violation of the Geneva accord.

It also meant disillusionment for a tiny man named Gen. Kong Le, fighting the Pathet Lao.

Another to whom it must have brought disillusionment was Red Prince Souphanouvong, nominal leader of the Pathet Lao.

Laotian observers believe that Souphanouvong is leader in name only and that his place has been taken by hard-core Communists who will take orders from Peking and Hanoi.

Sale of timber due on June 4

The Deschutes National Forest on June 4 at 2 p.m. in Bend will offer for sale 24,100,000 board feet of timber in the Browns Mountain area of the Bend Ranger district.

This will be one of the largest sales planned for the calendar year.

Browns Mountain is immediately south of Crane Prairie in the upper Deschutes country. The sale area entirely encompasses Browns Mountain, higher levels of which will be reached through a new access road. A total of 7.81 miles of permanent road must be constructed in connection with the big sale, and 7.9 miles of existing road must be reconstructed to log the timber. Estimated cost of this road work is \$74,205.

The sale area covers 3,060 acres and holds an estimated 15,700,000 board feet of ponderosa and western white pine, 500,000 board feet of lodgepole, 3,700,000 board feet of Douglas fir and 4,200,000 board feet of white fir and other species.

The minimum acceptable bid for ponderosa and western white pine has been set at \$30.80 per thousand board feet.

Action delayed on education budget today

SALEM (UPI)—A \$77.3 million higher education budget, with \$4.3 million taken out mostly in money for new teachers, was nearly ready to go to the House floor today.

The budget was on the Ways and Means Committee agenda for final action, but the decision was postponed when the committee recessed so members could attend another meeting.

The higher education budget was the last big one still in the committee. It has been the most-studied, and most-talked-about, of the session.

The \$77.3 million represents general fund, or taxpayers' money that will be used to operate the state's colleges and universities in the 1963-65 biennium. Gov. Mark Hatfield had asked \$81.6 million.

Bend Lions attending the Baker convention were Farley J. Elliott, George Warrington, Larry Keown and Glenn Ratcliff. Some 750 Lions and their wives attended the convention.

Charles Stewart, Pendleton, was named district governor, and Ratcliff was named District G trustee for the new Oregon State Lions Sight Conservation Foundation, Inc.

The 1964 convention will be in Coos Bay.

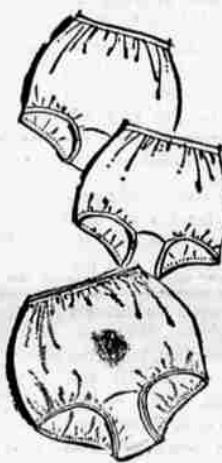

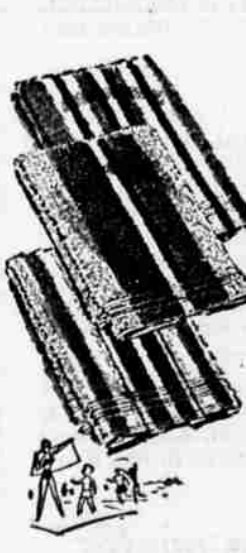
