PORTLAND (UPI) — Truck drivers and production employees went on strike today against local area soft-drink bottling plants. Pickets from Teamsters' Local 162 were stationed at half a dozen plants. An employer spokesman said the dispute was over wages. He said employees made a "final offer" Monday of a 10-cent hourly hike effective April 1, with another 10 cents in each of the next two weeks. Employees said the union sought a pay hike of 32 1/2 cents an hour the first year and 22 1/2 cents the second year of a two-year contract.

'Forgiveness Days' due at library

Just in time for spring house-cleaning, vacation preparation and end-of-school, the Deschutes County Public Library is holding "forgiveness days." From 4 p.m. Wednesday to 10 a.m. Friday, any books overdue and placed in the track in the front hall at the main library in Bend will be accepted "fine free." And no questions asked!

Here is an opportunity for laggards or forgetters to clean their shelves, lockers and closets, ease their minds and help the library straighten its records, according to Miss Ivy Grover, librarian.

The library is making its fifth-year inventory, and the job is about one-fourth finished. Staff members are working in teams on special areas — checking the shelves, clearing the shelf cards and searching for books out or missing.

Much shifting and re-arrangement is necessary to accommodate the growing supply of books and material needed for finding answers to today's questions, Miss Grover says.

Plans call first for inventory of present holdings and for weeding of out-dated material, then for replacement of lost books, and the continuing purchase of new books or editions.

Student borrowers who have forgotten the items buried in lockers, adults who like to go on vacation with a clean house and a clear conscience, and everyone who has a habit of letting things pile up — can save money and help the library, by taking advantage of forgiveness days.

Annual open house held

Shops used in the repair of highway equipment from a third of the state were receiving their share of attention this afternoon in connection with the annual open house program at the Oregon State Highway Department plant on U.S. Highway 97 just north of Bend.

The open house will continue until 9 o'clock tonight, with members of the staff serving as guides on informal tours. Coffee and doughnuts were being served hundreds of visitors.

Many residents of the area have visited the office area of the OSHD facilities here, but few have strolled over the compound to look over the equipment repair shops which were opened on April 1, 1964, and later nearly doubled in size. Under roof at present is 28,400 square feet.

The shops crew consists of 23 men, headed by Floyd A. Starkey, superintendent. The huge area served by the shops reaches diagonally across the state from the Columbia River at The Dalles to the Nevada line. Equipment is brought to the Bend shops from the entire area, for repair and maintenance.

Available for this work is a plant second only to the one in Salem in size. Machinery repaired ranges from the big snow plows to small tools.

The Bend plant is one of the five in the state. The others are at Salem, La Grande, Klamath Falls and Coquille.

The OSHD plant in Bend, with the office and shop areas the central features, are in a 22 acre tract. Ten acres are under fence.

ACTION FILED

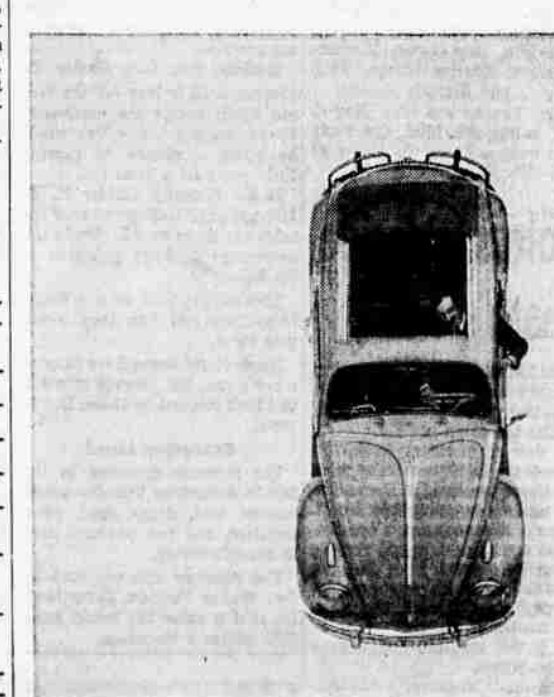
