## Memorial Day parade planned

PRINEVILLE — The annual Memorial Day parade through Prineville will be held Thursday, May 30, beginning at 10 a.m., according to Ernest Cardwell, Legion Commander.

All units in the parade will assemble at Pioneer Park by the city hall prior to the parade. Music of the junior high school band, a large ensemble, will set the tempo as the parade progresses from the park to the corner of Third and Main, north on Main Street to the bridge across Ochoco creek.
