

Flowers now go to woman's head—as blossoming wiglet

NEW YORK (UPI) — The flowers that bloom in the spring now go to a woman's head—as blossoming wiglets.

The floral pastiche originated in Paris but now is spreading like a morning glory vine to other parts of the world where women constantly are looking for something new for the "do."

When weary of wigs, try flowers. Alexandre of Paris, who has coiffed some of the most famous—Princess Grace of Monaco, Mrs. John F. Kennedy to name a couple—introduced the floral treatment at the last clothes collection of Dior, Paris.

He showed highly lacquered pointsettias fashioned of real hair on the mannequins. Shiny as waxed leaves—and sold like wiglets to match hair color—these

foliage sprays are worn clipped to the top of the crown or cascaded backwards in a trailing cluster of petals.

The florals are more appropriate for evening when a woman wants her casual daytime style turned into a spectacular, suggests one of their New York exponents, Julius Caruso, stylist for Lili. Caruso created three do-it-yourself coiffures using flowers.

One he called the pot de fleur, perched atop the crown of a smooth hairdo. It is made by sewing artificial flowers to a wire net until a mound or pin-cushion shape of blossoms is achieved. To attach, first make two pin curls on top of the crown. This gives a foundation to hook a hatpin through.

Another is the mantilla, more elaborate. It is fashioned from a large grip tooth comb festooned with narrow velvet ribbons, each studded with tiny flowers, whatever your choice from dime store or other source.

To make, paste a covering of flowers over the barrette part of the comb. With a thread, tie the ribbons to the comb—one for every tooth. Sew small flowers along each ribbon about half an inch apart. Wear the comb at the back of the crown with the ribbons falling like the lace cape of the mantilla.

A third Caruso style, the blooming bang, is a grosgrain bow across the brow, held with tiny hat combs sewn in. Stitch artificial violets on the bow.

Wallace may boycott U.S. hearing

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI) — Gov. George Wallace, dismissing a subpoena served on a "civilly dead" household servant, has given every indication he intends to boycott a federal hearing aimed at preventing his interference in the integration of the University of Alabama.

A source close to Wallace said the governor would not "under any circumstances" appear at the hearing next Monday in Birmingham.

U.S. marshals Monday served papers on a Negro maid at the executive mansion in an effort to assure the governor's court appearance.

Wallace staunchly disagreed with Justice Department officials in Washington who indicated the serving of the subpoena constituted proper service.

Wallace said the maid is a convict who works at the executive mansion and whose civil rights were removed because of a felony conviction.

"It is ridiculous that they (the marshals) served a Negro maid in my house," Wallace said. "Civilly, she's dead."

A source close to the governor said Wallace would not attend the hearing because he contends the federal court does not have jurisdiction in the case and for him to attend the hearing "would make it appear that the governor recognizes such jurisdiction."

The source said, however, that Wallace's attorneys could appear in the federal court as a "special party" and make motions for dismissal of the case on grounds the court has no jurisdiction.

Wallace flew to Decatur Monday night and was ringed by 18 state troopers when he stepped off the plane. The troopers maintained a guard throughout the evening, although Wallace dismissed some of them.

A suit, filed last Friday by the U.S. Justice Department, seeks to bar Wallace from carrying out promised intervention when Negroes Vivian Malone and David McGlathery attempt to enroll at the University of Alabama next month.

Pope's death could hurt peace effort

MOSCOW (UPI) — Efforts by the Vatican and the Kremlin to smooth over the bitter relations between Roman Catholicism and communism may come to an abrupt end if Pope John XXIII dies.

Whether they then would be resumed will depend in large measure on the man who succeeds to the post of spiritual leader of world Catholicism.

Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev and other Communist leaders apparently view Pope John as a man whose pronouncements and attitude were strikingly different from the strongly anti-Communist position of his predecessor, Pope Pius XII.

The result, since early last year, has been a series of Kremlin gestures of friendship that would have been unthinkable in the days of Pius XII.

It may be that they will be ruled out as well under the next Pope.

Sends Messages

Khrushchev, an avowed atheist, not only sent Pope John congratulatory messages on his birthday and when he was awarded the Balzan Peace Prize, but also dispatched his son-in-law, Izvestia Editor Alexei Adzhubel, to Rome. Adzhubel had a private audience with the Pope.

Simultaneously, leaders of the Russian Orthodox Church began making similar friendship gestures. They sent two observers to the Ecumenical Council.

Then early this year the Russian Orthodox journal Moscow Patriarchy favorably reviewed the council's proceedings, particularly the Pope's stress on the need for peace.

Evidence of Change

The most tangible evidence of the new atmosphere in Communist-Catholic relations was the apparent progress toward arranging the departure of Jozsef Cardinal Mindszenty from his refuge in the United States legation in Budapest.

Whether the death of Pope John might affect these efforts is unknown.

Disagreement at Jackson could spark demonstrations

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI) — Disagreement between Negro leaders and Mayor Allen Thompson today threatened to touch off more racial demonstrations in this Deep South capital.

Early today, a "Molotov cocktail" exploded at the home of Medgar Evers, state field secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), but no one was injured and little or no damage was done.

A long-threatened series of demonstrations began Tuesday when a biracial group of nine persons staged a lunch counter sit-in. Three of them were beaten, others were manhandled, and all were doused with catsup and mustard.

Agreements Alleged

Later, several hundred Negroes were told at a civil rights rally that the demonstrations were being suspended because Thompson

and the two city commissioners had agreed to make several changes in the city's racial policies. Thompson denied most of the "agreements."

The Rev. G.R. Houghton, who headed a delegation of six Negroes who conferred with Thompson and the commissioners Tuesday, announced the alleged agreements. Several civil rights leaders urged at the rally that Negroes test the "agreements" by attempting to use previously segregated facilities today.

"If the mayor has denied what we say, then all is lost," Houghton said after the rally. "I'm almost certain there will be a resumption of demonstrations."

Home-made Bomb Explodes

Shortly after midnight the "Molotov cocktail"—a bottle filled with an inflammable liquid—exploded and burned in the carport of Evers' home.

The only noticeable damage was the slight scorching of a station wagon parked in the carport. Police began an immediate investigation.

Evers' wife and children were at home when the firebombing occurred. He still was conferring with other integration leaders at his office.

Stores Close Counters

Downtown stores began closing their lunch counters following Tuesday's violence. Workmen removed the 52 stools from the counter at Woolworth's, where the violence occurred. Walgreen's drug store posted a sign saying its lunch counter had been shut down "for the public protection."

A crowd of whites, which swelled to about 200, abused participants in the sit-in for three hours until Woolworth's closed the store at

mid-afternoon. Police made no attempt to break up the crowd. Authorities said this was because the store manager did not call for officers. But they said policemen would move in immediately if there were more sit-ins.
