Progress noted in correcting water problem

 MADRAS — Decided progress in alleviating damage to county roads through the correction of some of the practices of using road side borrow pits as drainage ditches by North Unit Irrigation District water users, was reported this week by Ross Watts, Jefferson county roadmaster.

Watts reported a good job has been done by a large part of the water users of the North Unit Irrigation district in controlling and properly disposing of waste water but much work is needed.

Discussing progress made thus far the roadmaster said some of the work has been the continuation of good farming practice normally carried out. Others have been correcting long existing errors, sometimes at considerable cost and labor. In numerous cases, cooperation between neighbors has materially assisted in helping to save Jefferson County's paved roads and made possible the continuation of the county's paved roads.

Discussing existing problems, Watts expressed the belief that remaining instances of water in borrow pits, even on road surfaces can be corrected without direct action as provided by law.

Citing the coming summer's work, Watts explained that even the paving program for the summer is still in jeopardy if water saturated spots exist prior to application of an oil mat.

It is expected that appointment of the new superintendent will be made by July 5. Minimum salary being offered is \$12,000.

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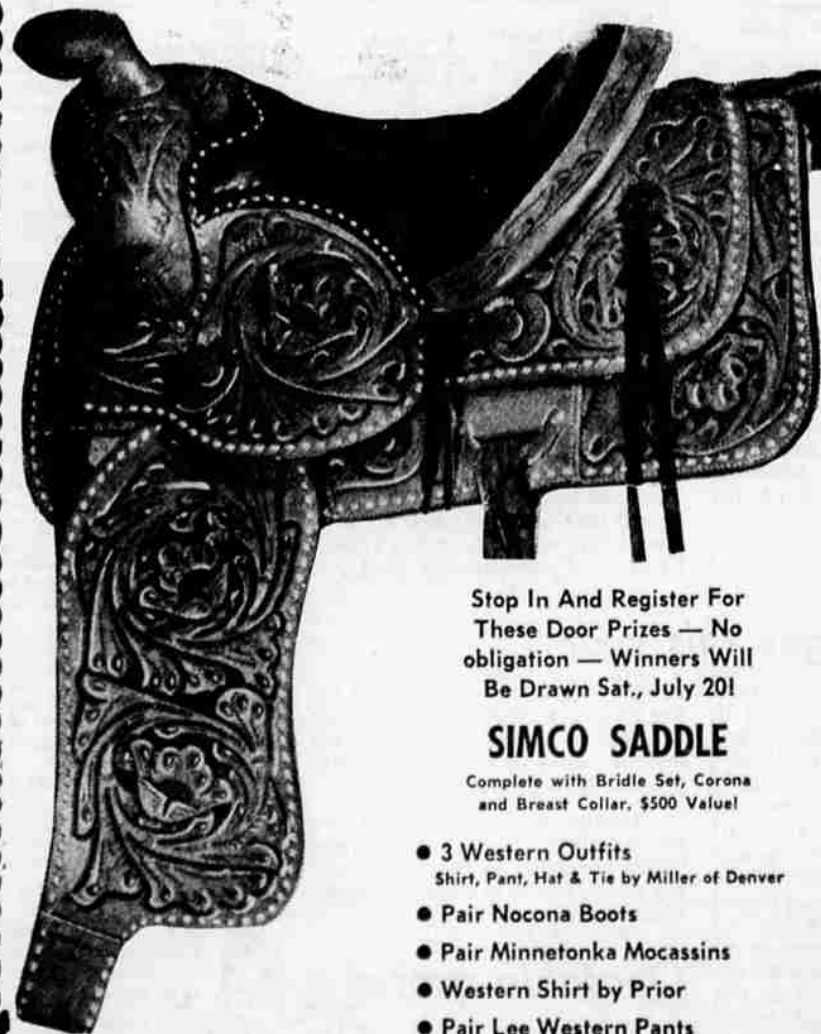
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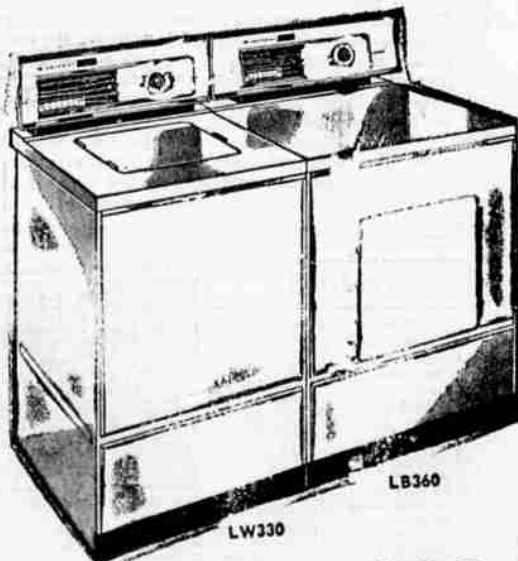
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
