

Two cops slashed in flare-up at construction site as Negroes demonstrate in Philadelphia

Two policemen were slashed and several persons were injured today in a new flare-up of violence at a Philadelphia construction site where hundreds of Negro demonstrators protested alleged job discrimination.

One patrolman was slashed on the wrist and another on the arm during a fight which broke out when Negro pickets refused to move to permit workers to report to their jobs.

Five other policemen and about 200 pickets were cut and bruised in the melee.

The workers got through to the school construction site which had been the target of protests for a week. It is located in a largely Negro neighborhood in North Philadelphia.

The violence broke out two hours before a seven-point agreement was reached to end the mass picketing and employ Negroes in skilled jobs on public construction projects in Philadelphia.

It called for the immediate hiring of a qualified Negro plumber, steamfitter, two electricians and a sheetmetal worker at the school site.

In the South, authorities at Jackson, Miss., were prepared to arrest racial demonstrators by the thousands. Two large buildings at the state fairgrounds were set up as temporary jails.

The city of Durham, N.C., announced it would open its municipal swimming pools on a desegregated basis, a move taken earlier in the week by Atlanta.

Cecil Moore, the president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) branch in Philadelphia, said the picket protests would continue until more Negroes are employed in skilled trades at the school site.

He pledged to assemble 4,000 pickets today to carry on the demonstration.

Authorities in Jackson were taking no chances should new demonstrations break out in the Mississippi capital city.

Wire was strung around two exhibit buildings at the state fairgrounds and Jackson Mayor Allen Thompson said the prisoner compounds could confine 10,000.

persons. Negro leaders said they would step up their segregation protest campaign.

At Tallahassee, Fla., 220 Negroes were ordered to appear in court today to answer charges of disobeying an injunction against demonstrations. Two Negroes and a white man picketing a segregated restaurant at Charlottesville, Va., were beaten Thursday.

In Washington, the Defense Department said it has transferred 150 troops of the 101st Airborne Division at Ft. Campbell, Ky., to Ft. McClellan, Ala., to replace 150 infantrymen. The department said the shift was not connected with the removal Thursday of about 400 troops from the Birmingham, Ala., area where President Kennedy sent troops following racial violence on May 12.

Jackson police Thursday broke up a campus demonstration by 500 Negro high school students, some of whom threw rocks, bottles and bricks at officers. Three policemen were reported slightly injured. Two persons were arrested at the school and 25 more demonstrators were arrested in downtown Jackson.

Get Riot Training

Highway patrolmen from throughout Mississippi were moved into the capital and put on standby alert at patrol headquarters where they underwent riot control training.

Thompson and two city commissioners warned Thursday that violence would support demands of civil rights leaders that federal troops be sent to Jackson.

Negroes later in the day requested that Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy intervene "to prevent further unlawful arrests and harassment."

Police at Tallahassee Thursday arrested 257 persons for staging two brief racial demonstrations in the Florida capital. A crowd of about 200 white persons cheered and applauded when police moved in on Negroes picketing a segregated theater. But officers had to use tear gas to break up another demonstration by about 85 Negroes. One girl fell to the ground in the bluish smoke, but was picked up by a fellow demonstrator and apparently was not hurt.

The three men at Charlottesville were protesting segregation in a restaurant when they were attacked by two white men who beat them with their fists. Police arrested all five men and charged them with assault.

The Rev. H. F. Johnson, head of the Charlotteville branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), was hospitalized with undetermined injuries.

There were these other racial developments:
—A biracial committee at Nashville, Tenn., said Thursday it has completed its organization and had "launched immediately" into racial problems facing the Tennessee capital.

—Three Negroes tried unsuccessfully to enter three downtown theaters at Chattanooga, Tenn., Thursday.

—An NAACP official said at Radnor, Pa., Thursday that demonstrations at a school construction site in Philadelphia were the start of a nationwide drive against segregation in unions.

Pear industry damage seen

MEDFORD (UPI) — Congressional failure to extend the Mexican farm labor program may damage the multimillion dollar Rogue River pear industry, an industry spokesman said Thursday.

Don Root, president of the Jackson County Fruit Growers League, said there are not enough domestic workers in the area to harvest the crop.

The industry has employed between 250 and 300 Mexican laborers annually. The House of Representatives earlier this week refused to extend the law under which the workers enter this country.

SELASSIE PLANS TRIP

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia will visit the United States for 10 days beginning Oct. 1.

During his stay, the African leader will pay a two-day state call in Washington and then visit other areas of the country. Emperor Selassie's last visit was in the spring of 1954.

Peace Corps draws barbs in Indonesia

JAKARTA (UPI) — The first U.S. Peace Corps contingent to Indonesia arrived Thursday night to shouts of "Peace Corps go home" by hundreds of young Indonesians.

The anti-American demonstrators at Jakarta's International Airport carried placards reading "Peace Corps no, Ganefo yes."

Ganefo is the abbreviation for "Games of New Emerging Forces," an international sports competition Indonesia and Communist China are attempting to promote to rival the Olympics.

The seventeen American athletic coaches who arrived from Tokyo Thursday are slated for duty as physical education instructors in Indonesia's outer islands.

The coaches were driven to their billets at the Asian games village in a bus as the demonstrators shouted anti-American slogans.

President Sukarno personally extended the formal invitation to send volunteers here to Peace Corps Director Sargent Shriver in 1961. The United States first had made informal feelers to Indonesia about a proposed Peace Corps Mission here.

Communist and extreme leftist parties have leveled attacks against the corps for several weeks. These efforts have been countered by some student groups which have supported employment of the coaches here. They have also requested another Peace Corps contingent of science instructors, but the government has not acted on the proposal.

Fines expected despite plea

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador (UPI) — Ecuadorian authorities are expected to levy fines today on at least two of 21 U.S. tuna boats held at the Salinas naval base despite a request from Secretary of State Dean Rusk for their release.

Official sources said Development Minister Jose Salazar Baragan will decide the penalties "in accordance with fisheries laws."

The tuna boats White Star and Ranger were seized Saturday on charges of violating Ecuadorian territorial waters. Nineteen other boats of the San Diego, Calif., tuna fleet gathered to protest the seizure and accompanied the two seized boats to Salinas in "voluntary detention."

It was not certain immediately whether any penalties would be imposed on the "voluntarily detained" boats.

Ecuador claims the right to monopolize fishing grounds within 200 miles of its coasts. The United States, however, regards Ecuadorian territorial waters as extending only to the customary three-mile limit.

Bouquets put on MM crypt

WEST LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Two additional bouquets were placed on the crypt of Marilyn Monroe Thursday beside the red roses kept there at all times by her ex-husband Joe DiMaggio.

Both were in remembrance of the star's birthday which will be Saturday.

One bouquet was from DiMaggio, who has had roses placed at the crypt three times a week since the actress' death last August.

The second bouquet was placed there at the request of Kay Carr, 12, of Deerfield, Ill., who never saw Miss Monroe except on the screen. The young girl sent \$2 to the Memorial Park for the bouquet. A secretary, Mrs. Patricia Madden, added some money of her own and bought the flowers.

Stock Exchange picks new public governor this week

NEW YORK (UPI) — When the New York Stock Exchange named a new public governor this week, a few old-timers on the street recalled the hot debates among members more than a quarter century ago when the idea of public representation on the board first was proposed.

The latest to be elected to one of the three public governors' posts on the 3-man board was J. Victor Hen, Chairman of the Boards and Chief Executive Officer of the Continental Insurance Companies.

The Milwaukee-born Hen, who started out a business as an examiner for the American Central Insurance Co. in St. Louis, in 1917, has held a succession of high ranking jobs in insurance companies and insurance associations in the years since: an imposing list of directorates, both on corporate boards and on those of philanthropic and educational groups.

Represent Viewpoint

Fiction of the public governors to represent the public viewpoint to the exchange. The nominations made by the president of the exchange, are made from among leaders in business, commerce, or education. The public members are elected by the board; the other members, except for the paid president of the exchange who is an ex-officio member, are elected annually from members of the exchange itself.

First of the public governors

was elected in 1938. The creation of these posts on the board was a part of the revamping of exchange rule which took place in the late 1930's and beyond, and resulted from activities of the "Young Turks," who were determined to rebuild public confidence in the exchange and in the securities business as a whole. It had been badly buffeted by investigations which followed the market crash of 1929.

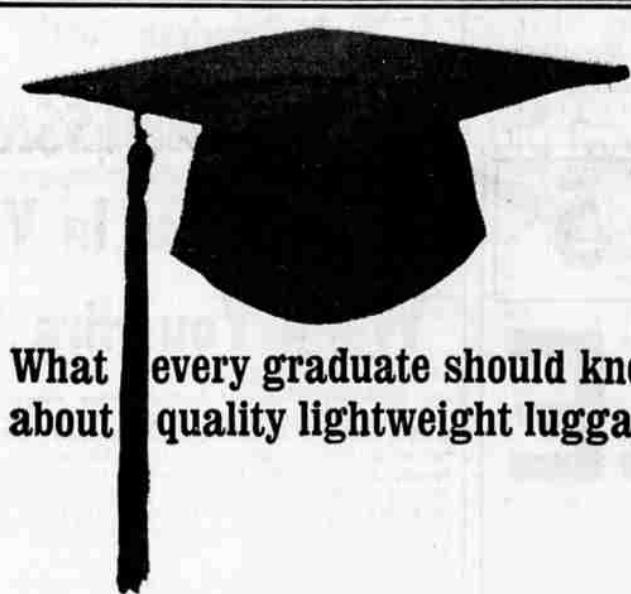
Other basic changes made at that time included the creation of an ample paid staff and cutbacks in the power of the old committee setups. Provision was made for out-of-town membership on the board of governors.

Met Opposition

Not all of the steps were taken without opposition. Some older members were convinced they were not necessary, but the "Young Turks," under the leadership of William McChesney Martin Jr. and others, prevailed, working closely with members of the Securities and Exchange Commission, itself a comparatively new group then.

Public governors are elected to one-year terms; the practice has been for each to serve three terms as did Thomas B. McCabe, Chairman of the board of Scott Paper Company, who was Hen's predecessor.

The board meets once weekly, and one meeting a month is a policy meeting; it is at these that the public governors are most likely to make known their views on activities, present or future, of the Exchange.
