### Council reports increase offer

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Timber Operators Council said Wednesday it had offered the International Woodworkers of America a wage increase of 20 cents an hour over a three year period.

The lumber producers' management group and union officials are involved in negotiations over a new contract. The present contract expires Friday night and workers have authorized a strike.

A spokesman for the TOC said negotiations were recessed after the offer was made, subject to call by federal mediators. Executive Vice President Carl F. Glos said he believed some progress was made, despite failure to reach an agreement yet.

The union originally demanded a wage increase of 40 cents an hour.

Glos said loggers now receive an average of \$3.98 hourly and sawmill workers receive \$3.22, including fringe benefits.

Union negotiators are scheduled to meet Friday with the "big six" of the Northwest lumber industry, Weyerhaeuser, Crown Zellerbach, International Paper, U.S. Plywood, St. Regis Paper and Rayonier.

### Friendly feud has erupted in Ireland over JFK visit

DUBLIN (UPI) — A friendly feud erupted between the Fitzgeralds and the Kennedys today over the visit of their famous relative to Ireland.

The Fitzgeralds come from Skibbereen in County Cork and say they are as closely related to President Kennedy as the better-known Kennedys of New Ross in County Wexford.

They are the clan of the President's mother and they plan a welcome for the President aimed to rival the head mile faillte (hundred thousand welcomes) he will get from the Kennedys of New Ross.

The President is scheduled to visit Cork June 28. When his helicopter touches down, history will have turned a full circle for the Fitzgeralds.

The President will land in the same green fields from which his great-great-grandfather, John Fitzgerald, was evicted 153 years ago and his land given to English planters.

When the great famine came, one of John's six sons, James, sailed to Boston where he married an Irish girl, Katherine Cadogan. One of their children, James Fitzgerald, became famous as the "Honey Fitz" of Boston politics and is the man for whom President Kennedy has named the presidential yacht.

"Honey Fitz" in his turn also married an Irish girl, Barbara Hannan. Their daughter is Rose, the President's mother.

The information on the Fitzgerald family, gathered before the Kennedys were so politically prominent, was put together by Cork-born retired U.S. naval Lieut. J. J. Cadogan of 1527 12th Ave., San Francisco. He came across the Fitzgeralds of Skibbereen while researching his own family tree.

He was startled, he said, by the strong family resemblance of the Irish Fitzgeralds to the Boston Kennedys. He discovered three

### Tribute paid by President

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy paid a Memorial Day tribute to the nation's war dead and an unscheduled stop at the graveside of former Defense Secretary James Forrestal.

During brief formal ceremonies, the President Thursday placed a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns high on a hill in Arlington National Cemetery which overlooks the Capitol.

Kennedy, who did not speak at the tomb, then was driven through the winding tree lined roads of the cemetery containing 112,000 tombs to a remote corner. There, he stopped at the graveside of Forrestal, the first secretary of defense.

He stood silently a few moments before the plain marker which reads: "Died 1949 in the cause of good government."

Forrestal, who became the nation's first defense chief in 1947, died in a fall from the window of his hospital room at the Bethesda, Md., naval hospital in 1949. His son, Michael, now is a member of the President's staff.

Two-year-old John Kennedy Jr. trailed behind his father, holding tightly to the hand of a Secret Service agent. Mrs. Kennedy and Caroline did not accompany the President.

Shortly after noon, the President and his family left for Camp David, the presidential retreat in Maryland's Catoctin Mountains. Kennedy returned to the White House by helicopter nine hours later.

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### Total feed grain consumption expected to be same as 1961-62

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department today predicted total consumption of feed grains in the 1962-63 marketing year would be around 154 million tons, about the same as in 1961-62.

The disappearance of this amount would leave a carryover into 1963-64 of about 61 million tons, down 11 million tons from the carryover into 1962-63.

The department said consumption of corn during October-March totaled slightly more than 2.2 billion bushels, about the same as the record quantity used in that period of 1961-62. Total disappearance of the key livestock feed for the marketing year is expected to be around 4 billion bushels, about the same as in 1961-62. This would leave a carryover into 1963-64 of about 1.3 billion bushels, down 340 million bushels from a year earlier.

The Agricultural Research Service (ARS) estimates the European corn borer destroyed more than 88 million bushels of corn in 1962, costing farmers nearly \$94 million. The loss from the borer in 1961 was 65 million bushels.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASC) expects supplies of fertilizer materials for 1962-63 to total 9,396,000 tons of plant nutrients—nitrogen, phosphate, and potash. These supplies represent an increase of 9.1 per cent over those of 1961-62.

### Plans made for Tiros next year

NEW YORK (UPI) — A Tiros weather satellite capable of photographing the earth's entire surface at least daily will be put into orbit sometime next year, according to plans announced on Wednesday by the National Aeronautics and Space Agency.

The hatbox-shaped satellite would roll on its side in a wheeling polar orbit and photograph 500,000 square miles of earth and cloud cover every 30 seconds with two cameras.

The photographs will be stored on tape for transmission when the satellite passes within range of ground stations.

Six Tiros have been orbited successfully since 1960, and have transmitted more than 230,000 pictures of cloud cover, storms, snow and ice conditions and other meteorological information.

The only "weather eye" still functioning is limited in its picture-taking because it never changes position in space. Therefore, its camera lens is facing away from the earth much of the time.

### Leaders issue joint appeal

MOSCOW (UPI) — President Kennedy and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan appealed jointly to Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev today to conclude a treaty banning test explosions of nuclear weapons.

The new Anglo-American initiative was contained in separate letters from the Western leaders addressed directly to Khrushchev. The letters were delivered to the Foreign Ministry by messenger.

The letters were the latest move by the United States and Britain in their efforts to break the protracted East-West deadlock on the nuclear test issue.

It was believed the primary objective of the new messages was to determine from Khrushchev just what the Soviets consider an adequate inspection system.

Failure to agree on inspection has prevented East and West from concluding a test ban treaty in nearly five years of negotiations. More than a year has gone by at the 17-nation Geneva disarmament talks with that same issue blocking agreement.
