play "The Triumphant March." Listed alphabetically, 1963 graduates are:

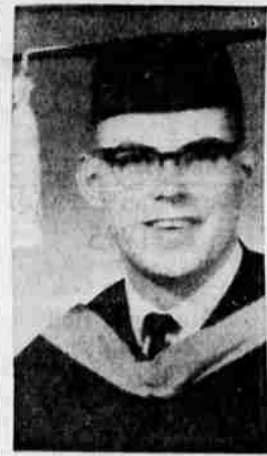

RAIL TALKS RESUME
 WASHINGTON (UPI) — Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz will meet Tuesday with officials of the nation's railroads and five rail unions on their work rule dispute that threatens a nationwide strike.

Wirtz announced Sunday he had called for both sides to submit a progress report on their negotiations, which have been going on since May 13. If no agreement is reached, the unions would be free to strike June 12.
