

Fire runs keep firemen busy

Auxiliary power plant installed by Bend station

The installation of an auxiliary power plant has been completed at Radio Station KBND, the key Conelrad station for Central Oregon, and tested for operation.

Fifty per cent of the electrical installation is to be paid for by the federal government and the balance will be paid for by the City of Bend and Deschutes County.

The generator has sufficient power to operate the station either day or night, under normal operating conditions, and will make it possible for KBND to supply information to the area that it serves.

In commenting on the installation, Frank H. Logan, general manager of KBND, said, "while this installation gives KBND added responsibility to the area, we feel that it is another public service that will be of great value to Central Oregon in case of any emergency."
