

Bend Legion drops two close ones at Sweet Home

SWEET HOME — Bend's American Legion baseball team ran into late inning trouble in both ends of a doubleheader here Saturday, as the visiting locals dropped both games by a single tally.

In both contests, Bend jumped out to an early lead, and then faded in the games' latter innings.

In the first one, Madras' pitching dynamo, big Bill Bauer, had Sweet Home batters "eating out of his hand" in the first few frames, but found trouble in the bottom of the fourth and fifth innings when the Santiam sluggers brought in two runs twice.

Bauer, however, only allowed five hits. Bend got two tallies in the first inning, and another in the fourth. Dave Shelton, playing center field, went two for three at the plate to lead the local hitters. Larry Barnes of Madras slammed a double in the first frame, and Derald Parsons, play-

ing left field, banged a triple in the first.

Saturday's second game appears to have been a repeat performance of the first encounter. The same thing happened. Trouble in later innings, and a 4-1 lead melted into a 4-5 deficit.

Parsons of Redmond was on the mound for the Bend Legion in that second one. He was retiring

the Sweet Home hitters to the dugout in fine fashion until he hit a wild streak, and then it became a real headache for Redmond's "whizzer" tosser. Sweet Home got to him in the bottom of the third, and again for the winning tally in the bottom of the fifth.

Left fielder Seilen slammed a two-bagger scoring short stop Edwards for the marginal tally. After

er taking a full count, Edwards got aboard when Bend second sacker Doug Williams bobbled a hot grounder.

Leading the Bend batting were Larry Barnes and Redmond's Don Watrous. Both got doubles as they went one for four in the batter's box. The only other Bend hitters were Bennie Hamilton and Parsons who also went one for four.

Two Sweet Home sluggers, however, proved their worth. Third baseman Allison went three for four, and catcher Miner got two hits in four trips to the plate. The only extra base hit, however, was garnered by Seilen, a substitute left fielder. He banged that game-winning double in the fifth.

Parsons went the distance for the loss in the nightcap. Gardner of Sweet Home came on the mound in the third inning and became the winning tosser for the Santiam crew.

Seilen pitched the first game for Sweet Home. He went the distance for the win.

Another twin bill, slated for Sunday, was rained out. This weekend Bend will go on the road again, this time to Oregon City for one game Saturday and two tilts Sunday.

Mickey Wright 'weary' after tourney wins

BEAUMONT, Tex. (UPI)—Mickey Wright, tied with her own record of four straight tournament victories and admittedly "a little weary," today readied for next week's Chattanooga, Tenn., Women's Open and her last chance to keep the present victory skein alive.

The Dallas blonde burned up the course Sunday, turning in a last round 69 for a record 209 total and a victory in the \$8,000 annual Babe Zaharias Women's Open golf tournament.

The victory was worth \$1,250 to Mickey, but matching her own record for consecutive tournament wins was equally valuable. She set the four-in-a-row mark last year.

The Chattanooga tourney will be the last chance to keep her string alive. She flies to Lisbon, Portugal, after it for a televised golf date with European proette Brigitte Vavansot.

Miss Wright had an eagle on the par 5 No. 12 hole at the 6,276-yard Beaumont Country Club course Sunday, hitting her second shot to within six feet of the pin.

Little Clifford Ann Creed, of Alexandria, La., hung on gamely through the front nine, but wound up with a 73 for a 54-hole total of 214 and \$975 second place money.

Miss Creed had to birdie the 18th hole with a chip-in from five feet off the putting surface to ward off the rush of Judy Kimball, whose 71 Sunday left her one stroke back in third place.

Miss Wright's record round bettered Betty Jameson's 210 in 1955 for the tourney.

USC defeats OSU: to NCAA

CORVALLIS (UPI)—Southern California captured the NCAA District 8 baseball title Saturday by defeating Oregon State 7-5 in the second game of a doubleheader after losing the first contest 8-6.

The win gave Southern California a 2-1 series victory and advanced it into the NCAA championship tournament at Omaha June 10-14.

Southern California wrapped up the nightcap with two runs each in the seventh and ninth innings. Willie Brown hit a two-run single in the seventh. Bud Hollowell hit his second home run of the day and Brown scored on a throwing error in the ninth.

In the first game, Oregon State scored six runs in the first inning on seven walks and a two-run single by Jimmy Jarvis.

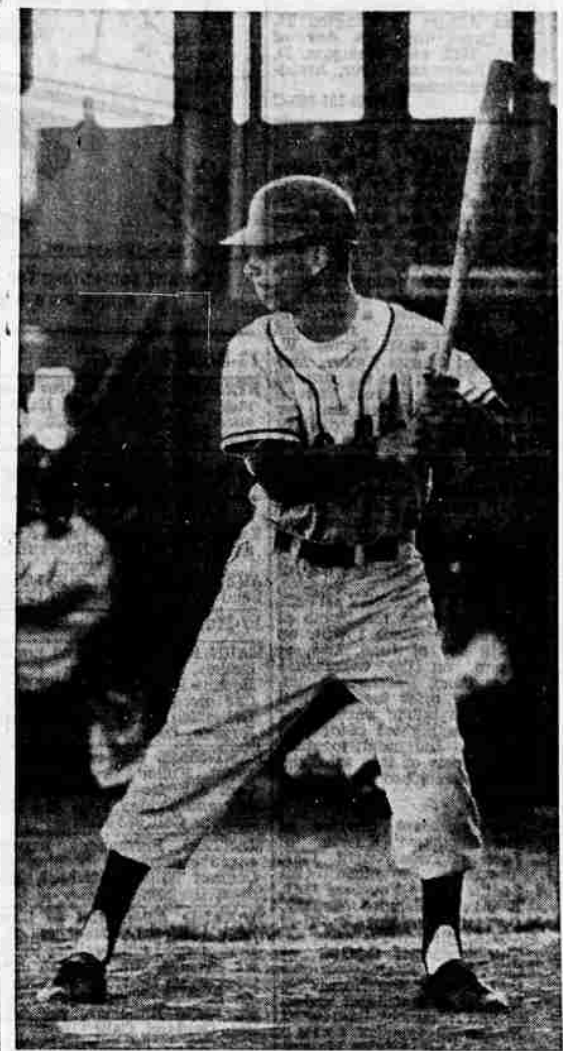
Dennis Straub went the nine-inning distance for the Beavers, striking out 15.

Lorenzen glides home first in stock car event

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (UPI)—Fred Lorenzen nursed his out-of-gas Ford for three laps around the Charlotte Motor Speedway and glided across the finish line at 30 miles per hour Sunday to win the World 600 late model stock car race and \$26,250.

The lead-footed North Carolina native, who now lives in Elmhurst, Ill., combined cagey strategy and a lot of luck to set a blistering mark of 132.417 miles an hour and boost his total earnings this season to well over \$75,000.

He purposely relinquished the lead to Junior Johnson at the 320th lap and trailed the Chevrolet jockey. By "dragging" behind Johnson he conserved fuel.

But this still wouldn't have been enough. It took a stroke of luck to turn the tide. Johnson blew a fire three laps before the finish and Lorenzen's scat-back Ford whizzed past.

For the next three laps, he rocked his car to feed the last drops of gasoline in the tanks into his engine.

Johnson finished second despite the blowout and won \$11,410 in prize money and \$6,050 for leading the race for 291 laps.

About 60,000 persons witnessed the accident-free race, marred for a short time by a slow drizzle.

Despite the rain, Lorenzen's time was about 10 miles an hour faster than the previous track record.

2 players instrumental in Tacoma's front running

Bob Garibaldi gets the headlines but Ron Herbel writes the scripts for the front-running Tacoma Giants of the Pacific Coast League's northern division.

Unheralded Herbel, a 25-year-old righthander from Brighton, Colo., was signed to a contract by the San Francisco Giants for practically peanuts while it took bonus look in excess of \$130,000 to lure Garibaldi off the Santa Clara Campus.

Now it looks like the Giants might have given the bonus stipend to the wrong pitcher. Garibaldi received rough treatment from Denver yesterday and ended up losing 6-2 to the Bears. He was relieved by John Pregoner in the seventh after giving up five runs.

In the nightcap, Herbel pitched the full seven innings and scattered four hits in downing the Bears, 3-1. It brought Herbel's record to 6-5 while Garibaldi was losing his second game after winning six.

But records don't tell the full story.

Seven Complete Games
The game was Herbel's seventh route-going performance of the PCL season. This is the best in the league. Herbel also owns an earned-run average in the vicinity of 2.60. Garibaldi's ERA is 4.30-plus and he has pitched five complete games.

Denver unleashed a 15-hit attack on Garibaldi, Pregoner and two other Tacoma pitchers in the opener. Outfielder Ethan Blackaby paced Denver's attack with three safeties which ran his hit streak to seven in a row against Tacoma. Denver leftfielder Corky Withrow swatted a two-run double.

In other games, Moe Drabowsky of Portland threw a three-hitter at Spokane for a 1-0 victory after Spokane won the opener 11-3; Hawaii scored three times in the

eight to nip Dallas-Ft. Worth 9-8 but the Islanders dropped the nightcap 9-5, and San Diego reliever John Flavin walked in the winning run for a 4-3 Oklahoma City victory.

Rain caused postponement of the Salt Lake City at Seattle doubleheader.

Drabowski Looking Up
Portland's Drabowsky, aiming for another shot at the major leagues, struck out seven to pick up his fourth win against a single loss. Dick Green's sacrifice fly brought in the winning run for Portland.

Rod Graber's two-run homer in the first game for Spokane helped Howie Reed get his fifth win. Mike Brumley and John Werhas collected three hits for Spokane while Manny Jimenez hit a solo homer for Portland.

Eight home runs were hit in the Hawaii-Dallas Ft. Worth doubleheader. Hawaii's Bobby Knop headed the slugfest with a three-run homer and a solo blast. Dick Simpson's three-run homer in the eighth gave the Islanders their uphill victory in the first game. The Rangers led 6-1 at the end of five innings.

In the second game, home runs by Joe Christian and Tony Oliva highlighted the Rangers' winning attack. Other first-game homers were hit by Carlos Bernier of Hawaii and Cesar Tovar and George Banks of Dallas-Ft. Worth.

Freese Belts One
Gene Freese's two-run homer put San Diego one run behind Oklahoma City at the end of five innings. But in the sixth, the 89ers tallied on two singles and a pair of walks.

Padre reliever Flavin walked an 89er with the bases loaded to force in the winning run. Three singles gave San Diego its third win in the seventh.
