Final words of Pope John are for Christian unity

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — With his final words, Pope John XXIII called prayerfully for Christian unity.

"Ut unum sint," he said. "That they be one."

After uttering the Latin words Pope John lapsed into the final

coma that ended his life. "Ut unum sint" were the words of Jesus Christ at the Last Supper.

Throughout the agony of death Pope John repeatedly voiced words of comfort and inspiration. "Death is not an ending," he told one of his doctors, Pietro Valdini. "With death a new life begins, a glorification in Christ."

Revealing for the first time the secret he had guarded so carefully for a year, Pope John said "I know very well what is the matter with me and I also know that I have only three or four weeks of life."

He had even less time than he thought, for he died less than two weeks later.

Speaking of messages pouring into the Vatican, he said: "This interest in the Pope, who humbly represents the Lord, marks a new fervor of prayer, of thoughts and purposes of peace, the firm and clear conviction that what matters in life is always what is in the spirit of the Gospel."

"They (doctors) say I have a tumor. Well, the will of God is always done, I hope to close the (Ecumenical) Council and see peace in the world. (But) don't worry about me because my bags are packed and I'm ready, even very ready, to go." (May 31.)

Coming out of a coma unexpectedly June 1 and asking doctors for a cup of coffee, he quipped: "Well, we are still here."

"The time still has not come. The Lord wants the offering of my suffering. The Lord's will be done." (Speaking the night of June 1 to Eugene Cardinal Tisserant.)

"We are going where there is only one language spoken, the language of love." (To Msgr. Thomas Ryan who taught Pope John the English language.)

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But he told United Press International that a recent poll he took had persuaded him that a majority of his constituents were opposed to the plan to finance the program through Social Security.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Indications Monday were that President Kennedy probably will have to bypass the House Ways & Means Committee to get his controversial medical care bill through Congress.

And he would face a formidable task in accomplishing that feat.

A statement by Rep. A. S. Herlong Jr., D-Fla., that he no longer was willing under any circumstances to help pry the measure from the House Ways & Means Committee dealt a heavy blow to the bill's chances.

Error corrected by lawmakers

SALEM (UPI) — A mistake in its big tax program was corrected in less than an hour Monday afternoon by the legislature.

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Iranians (or Persians) take pride in their period of history going back 6,000 years

TEHRAN (UPI) — Iran, despite a determined effort by its former shah to make this name universal, is still stubbornly known as Persia in many places and to many peoples in the world.

This may be due to the fact that although the late shah — father of the present ruler — wanted his country to be known as "The Land of the Aryans," which is what Iran means, the word Persian was too deeply ingrained in history.

Persian cats and rugs are known the world over. There is the Persian Gulf. The language was always Persian, never Iranian. And it was difficult to erase by fiat in 1927 a term which was already familiar to the chroniclers of the Bible who speak of "The Land of the Persians."

By whatever name, Persia and Iran are one and the same nation. It is a large tableland from 3000 to 6000 feet high in western Asia with an area of 628,000 square miles, more than one-fifth the size of the United States and about two and a half times that of Texas.

Take Pride in History

Iranians (or Persians) pride themselves on a history and culture which extends back more than 6000 years.

Their most famous kings, Darius and Cyrus, held sway over half the known world some 2500 years ago and since that time the country has remained a political entity despite the cataclysmic invasions of Alexander the Great and Genghis Khan, the Mongol.

Iran is bordered on the west and northwest by Iraq and Turkey, on the east by Pakistan and Afghanistan. To the south is the Persian Gulf, the Gulf of Oman and the Arabian Sea. And to the north the Caspian Sea and Russia with whom Iran shares a border 1250 miles long.

To help Iran maintain its independence the United States has

given this country during the past decade about \$1 billion in military and economic aid. This aid has gone towards modernizing the 200,000 man army and the implementation of projects designed to raise the living standards of the people.

Shah Mohammed Reza, 43, has also taken steps to strengthen the nation internally with measures intended to end feudalism and to give a majority of the people a greater voice in their own affairs.

75 Per Cent Literate

More than 75 per cent of the 22,000,000 population are engaged in agriculture and are generally illiterate. Side by side with ancient means of irrigation are the great dams—one of the most recently completed is fifth in size in the world and the highest in the Middle East.

The dams will help modernize agriculture. To stamp out illiteracy the shah has formed corps of young men who undertake to bring education to everyone, even in the most remote villages.

Although the majority do not enjoy a high standard of living, Iranians are famous for their hospitality. It would be considered unforgivable for anyone, down to the poorest laborer, to insist that a visitor partake of food at meal time.

An ordinary laborer earns less than \$12.50 a week on the average. He must work two hours to earn a pound of mutton, three days for a pair of shoes and more than two weeks for a decent suit of clothing. The average worker lives with his family of four or five in not more than two rooms for which he pays a monthly rental of about \$10 to \$15.

Rich Compared To U.S.

Rich Iranians, on the other hand, have some of the most beautiful and modern homes in the world and live in luxury that might be the envy of multimillionaires in Europe and the United States.

Although it is a Moslem country Iran is not an Arab country. Urban Iranians live a Western life, wear Western clothes—a suit, a felt hat and a tie—and look very much at first glance like the

people on the street of an American city. There are tribes, however, which still wear their own costumes and no one wants them to change these colorful robes—least of all those in charge of trying to persuade more tourists to come here.

While Persian is the principal language of the country there are hundreds of tribal dialects and large groups of permanent settlers speak Arabic, Turkish, Armenian, Kurdish, Assyrian, Pushtu, Urdu, Russian and so on. The vast majority of the people belong to the Moslem Shia sect. There are also 100,000 Armenian Christians, thousands of Assyrians and other Christians and 40,000 Jews.

Many Projects Underway

Despite the oil income and the grants from the United States, Iran has so many development projects under way that it is always searching for new income. Tourism seems to be a promising source. An American-operated luxury hotel was opened in Tehran by the shah this year and most of the 200,000 people in the capital have come for a look at it. Other hotels are mushrooming all over the country.

Roads are being improved and travel regulations simplified.

The legislature is bicameral as in the United States. The lower house of Majlis consists of 200 elected members. There is an upper house or senate of 60 members, half of them elected and half appointed by the shah who has the right to dissolve either or both houses of the legislature.
