Hearing on fish in second day

PORTLAND (UPI)—A Federal Power Commission hearing on the problem of getting fish by dams on the Snake River was in its second day today with indications it would last the rest of the week.

R. P. Parry, attorney for Idaho Power Co., said at the opening session that a complicated facility to get small fish below Brownlee Dam had proved a failure. He suggested a hatchery and incubation program downstream from the lowest dam in the river canyon as the best way to preserve salmon runs.

Dean F. Ratzman, a Department of Interior solicitor, said it was the department's position that Idaho Power should continue to provide passage of migratory fish past its dams. Parry's statement was supported by two Boise men, fish biologist Wendell Smith and engineer Donald E. Barclay. Smith said 130,539 downstream migrating fingerling salmon were collected by a net barrier at Brownlee in 1959 but only 13,675 were collected last year.

An observer at the hearing was Howard Morgan, Federal Power Commission member from Oregon, whose resignation from the FPC becomes effective this month.

Sen. Monaghan spurns arrest

WOODBURN (UPI)—Sen. Tom Monaghan, D-Milwaukee, exercised his legislative immunity here, and refused to accept arrest for a traffic violation while on the way home from the legislature.

Police Chief Leonard Fuller said Patrolman Flavin Gireaux halted Monaghan about 12:40 a.m. June 4 on U.S. 90E. The ticket was voided after Monaghan protested.

Members of the legislature are exempt from arrest except for felonies and breaches of the peace while going to and from the legislative session.

Bend city commissioners at tonight's regular meeting will choose a new commissioner to succeed the late Donovan S. Denning, former mayor pro-tem who died May 10.

The successor probably will be selected from among candidates who ran for commission posts in last November's election. These are Charles H. Cleveland, Lynn Johnson, Harry Drew, W. M. Loy, Frank Wonsler, Barney Davis and Donald Dieffenbach. Commissioners also will choose a new mayor pro-tem.

In other business the board will hold a public hearing and give first reading to an ordinance vacating a 7½-foot strip of land in Block 3 of the Keystone Terrace Addition. Also being considered is a request to purchase a tract of property north of Hartford on W. 12th, and a request for adjustment of a deed to property owned by Leonard Lundgren, of LELCO. A third request to be appraised is for adjustment of spaces in the Pilot Butte Cemetery.

In addition, the commission will null Bend's streets improvement policy. Meeting time is 7:30 p.m.

Auto industry in stretch bid for new mark

DETROIT (UPI)—The 6 millionth car of the 1963 model year will leave the assembly line today setting the stage for a stretch drive in the race for the best auto sales year in industry history.

Ward's Automotive Reports said its estimates indicated the milestone car would be built in today's production run. Ever since the introduction of the current models, industry spokesmen have forecast record production that would top the 7-131,000 cars produced in 1955.

Booming sales have more than upheld their predictions to date. In its forecast of June production, Ward's said the industry had scheduled about 700,000 units, considerably more than June of 1955 when 649,400 cars were built.

Ward's predictions call for total production for the model year of about 7.3 million.

Oregon DAV conclave due here next week

Over 200 Oregon members of the Disabled American Veterans will gather at the Pilot Butte Inn, June 13-15, for the organization's Oregon department 1963 convention.

Wayne L. Sheirbon, national vice commander of the DAV, will be the keynote speaker, Bend Commander Chet Myers announced today.

Other guests included are H. C. Scafield, director of the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs, and several officials of the Veterans Administration. Action will be taken on issues of both local and national importance, Myers said today. The conclave's highlight will be the election of DAV state officers who will serve during the coming year.

Candidates for the position of Oregon DAV commander are Lloyd DeLap of Klamath Falls, and Vince Hagen of Salem.

Numbering more than 200,000 members, the Disabled American Veterans group is the nation's largest single veterans' organization of war-time injured and disabled. The DAV, a Congressionally-chartered, non-profit unit, has nearly 2000 chapters throughout the United States, its territories and possessions.

Through various programs, the DAV has provided free assistance to more than a half million disabled veterans and their families since the close of World War II.

Brooks - Scanlon's bid was \$785 above the advertised minimum price. Listed by board feet and bid prices, the sale included:

Ponderosa pine and Western white pine, (\$20.85 per M bd. ft.) 15,700,000; lodgepole, (\$4.30) 500,000; Douglas fir, (\$5.25) 3,700,000; and white fir and others, (\$3.70) 4,200,000. Also involved in the sale was an unestimated amount of older, dead material.

Another sale is slated for next Tuesday.
