

Departure delayed by JFK's son

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy's departure on a Western tour was delayed Wednesday when his 2-year-old son, John Jr., tried to go along.

The lad, accompanied by his mother, Mrs. John F. Kennedy, was taken from the White House to Andrews Air Force Base in a helicopter, as the boy sometimes does when the President is leaving by jet.

After Kennedy left the helicopter, however, John Jr. scurried off and ran toward the President who grained and said something newsmen could not hear.

John Jr. then began crawling up the 15 steps of the ramp leading into the back door of the huge Boeing 707 presidential jet. The President, looking amused, followed his boy up the steps. A moment later, after he had been escorted to the cockpit, the President's Secret Service men to come get the boy so the President could take off.

John Jr. had run up the aisle of the plane and by the time the agents caught him he was in the front of the jet. He was escorted from the front ramp by an agent who held his hand.

The youngster looked decidedly unhappy.

Colin Kelly III graduates from U.S. Academy

WEST POINT, N.Y. (UPI) — Colin P. Kelly III, proud bearer of a name made famous during the early days of World War II, graduated from the U.S. Military Academy Wednesday without the help of that famed name.

"I wanted to prove that I could do it on my own, and if I wasn't qualified to enter the academy, I didn't believe it would be right to take the place of someone who was qualified," he said.

Academy officials explained that Kelly, whose father, Capt. Colin P. Kelly, was the first West Pointer to be killed in the Second World War, could have entered the academy without taking a competitive examination.

FDR Makes Request

The story goes back to Dec. 10, 1941, when then President Franklin D. Roosevelt penned a letter to the President (whoever he might be in 1963) asking for the appointment of young Kelly to the academy.

At that time, Roosevelt said he did so on behalf of "this youth as a token of the nation's appreciation of the heroic services of his father."

"Corky" Kelly was appreciative of the honor, but he didn't want it that way, so he took entrance exams and passed.

Today he was presented his gold bars and became 24. Colin P. Kelly III.

Father Bomber Pilot

Newsmen who talked with young Kelly said he was proud of his father's name but did not want to trade on it. His father was a bomber pilot who was killed three days after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. Capt. Kelly ordered his crew to bail out and went down with the plane.

"Corky" never saw his father. He was only 19 months old when the B-17 went down during an attack on Japanese warships in the Pacific.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur made the suggestion to Roosevelt that the war hero's son be given special consideration for appointment to West Point when he became old enough.

President Eisenhower made the appointment, but Kelly turned it down. He went to college for a year and then took examinations for entrance to the academy.

Calcutta Pool report studied

PORTLAND (UPI) — Dist. Atty. George Van Housen said today he has taken under advisement a report that a Calcutta Pool was conducted at a Rose City Municipal golf course May 19.

A Calcutta Pool involves auctioning names of participating golfers, with persons who purchased names of winning golfers sharing the pool of money paid at the auction. Van Housen said he had the pool amounted to \$1,500.

Van Housen said that "depending upon the method of operation the Calcutta Pool could be either a felony or a misdemeanor under Oregon law, and in either event, the statutes provide for forfeiture of any prizes upon conviction."

Discovery of error bolsters charges that tax measure was 'a paste pot and scissors job'

SALEM (UPI) — Discovery of an error in the legislature's million tax package as it awaited the governor's signature bolstered charges that it was "a paste pot and scissors job."

The House grudgingly accepted, but retailed by killing a Senate measure to submit a sales tax to the voters in November of 1964.

The battle finally ended minutes before the legislature adjourned when the House was forced to bow to a Senate coup which trimmed funds from the interim tax committee, and made appointment of a senator as committee chairman mandatory.

House Minority Leader F. P. Montgomery termed the tax package a "paste pot and scissors job."

Senators feared the package would not raise enough money to finance the \$40 million spending program for the next biennium.

House members claimed the bill was so poorly drawn it would raise more than planned.

Senators insisted a one-shot speedup of withholding tax collections be held in reserve for emergencies.

House members added a provision that if there was more than a \$10 million surplus, the excess would be used to offset property taxes.

The new law was not what the governor, house or senate wanted. Gov. Mark Hatfield recommended a net receipts "tax reform" program, and called for a 4-cent pack cigarette tax.

The House Tax Committee, after 250 hours of hearings, recommended nearly the governor's plan, and the one-shot feature.

Senate Changed Things

The Senate Tax Committee threw out the net receipts and cigarette tax, revised the present law and raised the rates.

Wallace ready to defy U.S. injunction

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI) — Gov. George Wallace indicated Wednesday night he intends to defy a federal injunction prohibiting him from blocking the admission of three Negroes to the University of Alabama "regardless of the law."

"This can be our finest hour," he told Alabamians in a statewide television address.

Wallace had refused immediate comment Wednesday after federal Judge Seymour Lynne issued the restraining order at Birmingham.

However, Wallace's press secretary, Bill Jones, said "the injunction will make absolutely no changes in the governor's stand."

The former judge has vowed to turn back personally any Negro trying to enter the segregated university.

Wallace said in his address Wednesday night that the federal court-ordered admission of the Negroes at the main university campus at Tuscaloosa and the extension center at Huntsville next Monday had created a "constitutional crisis."

"I need the support of all of the people of Alabama" in maintaining a "peaceful situation at the university," Wallace said. "Peace and tranquility must prevail."

Soviet planes fly near U.S. carrier Ranger

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Aerial inspection of a U.S. aircraft carrier by Russian planes was reported today as evidence that the Soviets still wish to test their ability to find the big flat-tops in case of war.

Finding them in peacetime, according to U.S. naval experts, is no great problem, because their departure dates and courses are no secret.

The latest incident occurred early Tuesday when six twin-engine Soviet bombers flew over the carrier Ranger 330 miles east of Japan.

One of the Soviet planes flew low over the Ranger's flight decks, but others appeared to have difficulty in seeing the carrier because of an overcast.

Overly-cautious parents may do their youngsters an injustice

NEW YORK (UPI) — The "be careful, you'll fall" warning of the parent to a child often starts a pattern of caution which ties and binds all through life, says Mrs. Aldous Huxley.

"If we have been careful since childhood, by the age of 30 we will probably be very careful and by 40 we are extremely careful," she continues. "Unless we do something about it each year, the habit and the suggestion become more firmly implanted and we become more restricted in body and mind."

Mrs. Huxley, reddish-haired, blue-eyed wife of the famous author, now has turned writer herself, producing sort of an instant therapy called "You Are Not The Target." It is a compilation of 30 "recipes" for everyday living and loving and coping with problems from fear and frustration to love and understanding of others.

"I used the term 'recipes' because I didn't want to get into the areas of religion or psychoanalysis," said Mrs. Huxley in an interview.

"And I wanted something that would help us right now. The recipes are for the well as well as for the not so well. But one does not need to be sick to get better. All of us are much vaster in our capacities than we think."

Mrs. Huxley, born in Turin, Italy, is a certified psychologist and said she had done a lot of work in psychotherapy. But she's convinced psychotherapy must be combined with physical activity to be most effective. "You can't divorce the body from the mind," she contends.

That is why every "recipe" carries suggestions for physical activity as well as mental. "Go into a room by yourself. Put on your favorite music. Throw off your clothes and dance. The goal of this dance is not art, the goal is personal freedom" is one example.

Mrs. Huxley said the title of her work, for which her husband wrote the foreword, comes from her belief that most of the time when you're being bombarded by somebody's bad temper or viciousness, you're not the target at all. You just happen to be in the way of an outburst caused by some other irritation.

One section is called "To Hell with Caution" (specially dedicated to those over 40). "I'm not saying we can live without caution," said Mrs. Huxley. "It is necessary for survival. I darned well better be cautious when I cross Fifth Avenue."

Tension

"But being too careful, being constantly afraid, suspicious, secretive—these feeling patterns produce a continuous tension (which) constricts the circulation of ideas, of feelings..."

"Habitual caution ties and binds us; it is as if we were dressed always in clothes that were several sizes too small," said Mrs. Huxley.

She suggested that the watchful parent fearful of a child's safety should use good sense in choosing where and when the child could run freely. Then let him. "The minor bumps and bruises are a learning experience," she said.
