Oregon prep wrestlers to take summer Japan junket

CORVALLIS — Ten Oregon high school wrestlers scheduled to compete in Japan this summer will see more of Nippon than most tourists.
That much was guaranteed this week when a nine-match schedule involving nearly 2,000 miles of travel within Japan was announced this week.
Oregon's school boys will depart from Portland aboard a Pan-American jet flight July 9, spend three days in Hawaii and arrive in Japan July 13. Their exhibition wrestling schedule will open July 15 and close August 3 with matches in Tokyo.
In between they will visit the cities of Sendai, Aomori, Asahigawa on the northern island of Hokkaido, Akita, Niigata, Gumma and Japan's second city, Osaka.
John Dustin and DeLance Duncan, wrestling coaches at Marshall Field (Coos Bay) and Klamath Falls high schools respectively, will accompany the wrestlers and manage the tour.

Wrestlers will be selected at a try-out camp June 16-18 on the Oregon State University campus. Competitors who placed in an AAU meet here in March, and state high school champions who competed but did not place, have been invited for the try-outs.
Ten will be named after winning berths in free lance wrestling, the style they will wrestle in Japan. They will assemble again in July in Portland for a training camp immediately before the trip.
Originally scheduled to begin about July 23, the tour was advanced on the request of the Japanese. Oregon's athletes will be repaying a visit by a team of Japanese national high school champions to this state last winter. Proceeds from that tour are financing the return.
Bend prep coach Tom Winbiger said today none of his wrestlers will be going to the Corvallis tryouts. Mike Pederson is eligible, but cannot afford the time off from his summer job, Winbiger disclosed.

Because Tom Tresh, running from third base, jarred the ball out of Brown's hand as he prepared for the relay to first base. The ball squirted loose and in another second or two Roger Maris went chugging over the plate—all the way from second base—with the winning run.

Whitey Ford yielded 13 hits but pitched his way out of numerous jams and wound up with his seventh win against three losses. Jackie Brandt and Brooks Robinson homered for the Orioles but Maris achieved a milestone when he hit No. 200 of his career for the Yankees.

The Los Angeles Angels beat the Chicago White Sox 8-2 after a 3-0 defeat, the Minnesota Twins defeated the Kansas City Athletics 4-0, and the Detroit Tigers topped the Cleveland Indians 5-4 in other AL action. The Boston-Washington game was rained out.

In the National League, the Chicago Cubs swept the San Francisco Giants 9-5 and 5-4, the Milwaukee Braves beat the New York Mets 11-9, the Pittsburgh Pirates whipped the Cincinnati Reds 5-4 and 4-3, the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 6-0, and the Los Angeles Dodgers conquered the Houston Colts 5-1.

Homers Win Game

Home runs by Jim Landis and Dave Nicholson and the nine-hit pitching of Johnny Buzhardt enabled the White Sox to win the first game of their two-nighter with the Angels. But the Angels rallied for seven runs in the sixth inning of the nightcap to split the double bill and give Ken McBride his fifth win. Albie Pearson went 2-for-5 in the first game and 4-for-5 in the second.

Richie Rollins knocked in three runs with a homer and two singles and Bob Allison hit his 15th homer for the Twins, who shut out the Athletics for the second straight game. Jim Roland went seven innings before retiring with an injured elbow and Bill Dailey finished the game.

Ira leads OSU to baseball's 1963 ND honors

SEATTLE — Oregon State has had a repeat performance of the 1962 season. The Beaver baseball team won the 1963 "Northern Division" pennant with an 11-4 season record, identical to last year's championship team.

Paced by sluggers Al Lehrer, Frank Peters and Doug Stahl, with .385, .359, and .327 batting averages respectively, the Corvallis team outclassed most of its opponents. Oregon State chucker Cecil Ira led ND hurlers with a 6-0 season record and his 1.45 earned run average was second best.

Larry Schrenk, Washington State, established himself as the ND batting champ with a .440 average. Al Murphy, Oregon, was second with a .417 average and the previously mentioned three OSU batters finished the season as third, fourth and fifth in ND batting statistics.

Lehrer had the most hits for the year, hitting opposing batters to the tune of 25 base hits. Pettigill and Tom Seidel, Washington State, tied for the home run lead, each with four round-trippers.

Problems may tear apart SEC athletic group

ATLANTA (UPI)—The Southeastern Conference, long recognized as one of the powerful athletic groups in the nation, is beset with problems these days that could tear it apart.

While it is too early for a definite conclusion, it appears the biggest of these wedges may be the introduction of Negro athletes into this Deep South conference which has held the color line since its formation three decades ago.

It is no longer a question of if — but when. The University of Kentucky has announced that it will start awarding athletic scholarships to Negroes this coming school year. This means that Kentucky probably will have Negroes on its varsity football team in the fall of 1964 — and that's when the parting of the ways may begin.

The conference appears split right down the middle on the racial issue. Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Tennessee and Vanderbilt, all of which have Negro students, have indicated they are willing to play racially mixed teams on a home-and-home basis.

But in the three deepest of the Deep South states — Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana — the other half of the Dixie dozen does not appear as ready to accept Kentucky's plans.

The six questionable schools, Alabama, Auburn, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Louisiana State and Tulane, have declined to come out flatly one way or the other. They all have taken a wait-and-see stand.

The big question for most of these appears to involve playing against racially mixed teams at home. Most already have played against teams with Negroes in games away from home.

Golfing hopefuls battling for 129 berths in Open

NEW YORK (UPI) — A field of 484 golfers will vie for 129 berths in the 1963 U.S. National Open golf championship when second round qualifying events are held at 13 sites next Monday and Tuesday.

The survivors then join 21 exempt players in championship play at the Country Club, Brookline, Mass., June 20-22.

Six 36-hole qualifying rounds will be held Monday at Chicago, Kansas City, Cincinnati, Denver, Washington and Portland, Ore. The other seven elimination competitions will be held Tuesday at Pittsburgh, Fort Worth, New York, Atlanta, Bakersfield, Calif., Winchester, Mass., and Detroit.

The largest qualifying tourney will be at New York, where 114 players compete for 45 National Open berths.
