

# Boston detective to question confessed strangler in New York

NEW YORK (UPI) — Boston's chief homicide detective planned today to question the confessed strangler of a divorcee.

New York police reported similarities between the slaying of Mrs. Zenovia Clegg in a Times Square hotel and the stranglings of eight women in the Boston area since last June 14.

Mrs. Clegg's nude body was found by a maid Sunday in her room at the Hotel Woodstock. A scarf she wore to conceal scars from a cancer operation was knotted around her neck. Police said she had been sadistically molested as were some of the victims in Boston.

Police traced Charles E. Terry, 34, a 6-foot, 5-inch part time painter and furniture mover, to Greenwich Village. He confessed beating and strangling Mrs. Clegg.

New York police notified Boston authorities, and Lt. John Donovan, head of the Boston homicide bureau, flew here. Terry refused to answer questions Thursday at his cell at Manhattan city prison.

Donovan said he would try to question Terry again today. The detective said Terry was a suspect in at least four of the Boston slayings.

Four of the stranglings in Boston took place in May, June and July of 1962. Police said Terry admitted moving here from Boston last August.

Police said Mrs. Clegg divorced her second husband, hotel chain auditor Navlon T. Clegg last year in Santa Barbara, Calif. She arrived here recently from San Francisco after a trip around the world.

In Mrs. Clegg's room, police found matchbooks and a paper bag bearing the names of restaurants and hotels. They began questioning employes at the places and got descriptions of the towering man who had been seen with diminutive Mrs. Clegg.

The descriptions were fed into the "variable image reflector," an electronic device that helps police artists translate descriptions into composite likenesses of suspects. The final likeness was photographed and distributed to detectives.

Detectives arrested Terry Wednesday in a Greenwich Village bar.
