

Reports say fair-good local weekend fishing

Fishing looks to be from fair to good this weekend in most areas of Central Oregon, a weekly report from the Oregon State Game Commission said today.

It follows.

Prospects are fair to good for this coming weekend on the lower Deschutes River. The salmon fly hatch is just about over. Prospects at Hood River for the weekend are fair with single eggs being the most productive. Fair to good angling has prevailed from boats trolling in the Rock Creek Reservoir.

Clear Lake angling was fair last weekend. Prospects appear to be good for this coming one, if the weather is good. Frog Lake angling was only fair last week, and the prospects remain about the same for this one. Angling at Lost

Lake has been fair to good. Bad weather has discouraged many anglers.

Fair angling has prevailed at Wahtum Lake, but bad weather has hindered the anglers. Ochoco Reservoir has been producing good catches of trout for trollers and fairly good catches for spin fishermen from the dam. Prineville Reservoir has slowed down, but is fair trolling for trout. Bank angling is slow.

Walton Lake is fair for bait anglers and fly fishermen. Cove and Warm Springs areas of the Deschutes River are fair for trout. The Crooked River below Prineville Reservoir is showing improvement. The Pelton Reservoir is fair for trollers. East Lake is producing fair to good catches

of rainbow on bait or troll. Larger rainbow and eastern brook are being taken in fairly deep water.

Paulina Lake angling is fair with the best results on single eggs. Success at Davis Lake has been poor, but a few rainbow up to three pounds have been taken. Elk Lake angling is good for kokanee, especially by using worms.

Winds have stopped most angling at Big Cultus Lake, but on windless days rainbow and lake trout fishing is good. Little Cultus Lake is good for eastern brook and rainbow trolling with spinner and worms. Suttle Lake rainbow angling is good, and some brown trout are being taken. Blue Lake is good for rainbow and small kokanee using eggs or lures.

At Wickiup Reservoir, brown trout success is fair from the dam or on troll in shallow water. Kokanee fishing continues to be good. Fishing at North Twin Lake is slow. Troll or bait is producing fair to good rainbow catches. South Twin Lake is producing fair rainbow catches on bait or troll.

Crane Prairie Reservoir angling is good, but the wind has been discouraging most people. Kokanee are moving in the channels and the best results have been with worms. Trolling with spinning lures or spinner and bait is producing nice catches of eastern brook at Big Lava Lake.

Metolius River angling is good. The Deschutes River above Bend is good with bait or on troll.

It's Britain vs. U.S. today in British-Am

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (UPI)—It was the United States vs. England today in the quarter-finals of the British Amateur golf championship.

Four Yanks, led by defending champion Dick Davies of Pebble Beach, Calif., and four Englishmen battled their way into the round of eight Thursday, leaving the host Scots on the outside looking in.

Davies, who barely escaped elimination Thursday, drew British Walker Cupper Michael Lunt as his quarter-final opponent. The two were first off the tee this morning.

All-American Match

The other quarter-final matches pitted Dick Sikes of Springfield, Ark., against a fellow Walker Cupper, Dr. Ed Updegraff of Tucson, Ariz., in an all-American showdown. Dr. Ron Lucetti of South San Francisco, Calif., against Peter Green, and David Moffatt against John Blackwell in an all-English match.

The quarter-final winners will square off this afternoon for the right to meet in Saturday's 36-hole title round.

Davies came perilously close to surrendering his title in both of his matches Thursday. He needed an extra hole before eliminating Scotland's John Wilson in his morning round, sinking a seven-foot putt for a birdie-three on the 19th green. In the afternoon, Davies was four down after 11 holes before rallying for a 1-up victory over former champion John Beaharrell of England.

Griffith, 13-10

NEW YORK (UPI)—Ex-champion Emilio Griffith, the 11th man to win the world welterweight crown twice, is favored at 13-10 to achieve a record-breaking third title triumph Saturday night in his fight with champion Luis Rodriguez at Madison Square Garden.

Rodriguez of Miami Beach, 26, wrested the title from Griffith on a unanimous but controversial decision last March 21 at Los Angeles.

Griffith would make no kayo prediction against rugged Rodriguez who never was stopped in his 53 fights, only two of which he lost. However, close friends disclose that Griffith hopes to knock out Luis about the seventh round.
