## Five run mile under 4 minutes

**Brian Sternberg vaults 16' 8" for world mark**

COMPTON, Calif. (UPI)—Brian Sternberg of the University of Washington was the first man to concede today that his new world pole vault record of 16 feet, 8 inches might not stand up as long as 24 hours.

"I'll tell you the story about this vault," the elated Sternberg said Friday night just after his record performance in the Compton Invitational track and field meet.

"John Pennel is jumping tomorrow night (Saturday). This event is going up and up. Where it's going to stop, I don't know."

Four men cleared 16 feet or better Friday night, which should stand as a record for at least a week or so.

Sternberg's statement regarding the pole vault could be applied in a more restrained way to the mile run, where the four-minute mile used to be one of track's foremost goals.

Friday night, New Zealand's Peter Snell closed out his American invasion, leading five others under four minutes—the first time such a feat has been recorded in a single meet. Snell, with another tremendous burst of speed in the last 110 yards, shot to a 3:55.0 timing for the fourth fastest mile of all time.

Jim Beatty, however, was only six yards behind at the finish. The slightly built Los Angeles star ran the distance in 3:55.5, an American citizen's record.

**Forman ill**

## Commission sets general deer season Sept. 28 - Oct. 30

PORTLAND (UPI) — The State Game Commission Friday set Oregon's general deer season from Sept. 28 through Oct. 30.

The commission followed closely its tentative regulations adopted two weeks ago in setting final seasons and bag limits on the state's big game.

Members had considered testimony ranging from an appeal for closure of all deer hunting to wide-open seasons.

As in the past, hunters will be restricted to bucks with forked

horns west of the Cascades and bucks with visible antlers in eastern Oregon during the general season.

The unit permit season for taking antlerless deer will run from Oct. 12 through Oct. 20, one week shorter than last year's season. The commission reduced the number of permits to 97,350, making most of the cuts in southeastern Oregon, where a low fawn production has been reported.

An early buck season was approved in the high Cascades, the Minam area and the Waldport-Mapleton area. Fifteen extended hunts also are scheduled for hunters with unit permits who have not used their deer tags.

The general elk season will run from Oct. 26 through Nov. 11 in the Coast Range and Oct. 26 through Nov. 24 in the rest of the state. The antelope season is scheduled Aug. 17-21.

The Clatsop, Wilson, Trask and Tlaga elk units will be hunted only on a permit basis. Antlerless elk hunts also are scheduled in northeastern Oregon with 3,200 permits to be issued.

A total of 650 antelope tags will be issued this year, 50 more than last year. The Interstate unit and the south portion of the Klamath game management unit will be opened to antelope hunting this year in addition to the six regular units.

The commission said a synopsis of the 1963 big game regulations will be available to hunters early in July.

## MacArthur rules AAU to control 'open meets'

NEW YORK (UPI) — General Douglas MacArthur had to "lay the law down" but the United States finally seemed assured today of presenting its best track and field team against Russia at Moscow next month.

Stripping aside all diplomacy, the 63-year-old general who had been personally selected by President Kennedy to settle the differences between the Amateur Athletic Union and National Collegiate Athletic Association, issued his decision in cold, blunt terms both sides could easily understand.

MacArthur emphasized "this decision is final" and it caused the NCAA-supported United States Track and Field Federation (USTFF) finally to yield to the AAU.

Specifically, MacArthur told the USTFF "As clearly as I can make use of the English language" that the AAU is the sole sanctioning power for open track meets.

That includes the National AAU championships at St. Louis, June 21-22, and the general warned the USTFF not to interfere with "free participation" in any AAU-sponsored event.

It marked the third time this week MacArthur had to explain his position to the college group and he left little doubt he was annoyed.

In the face of MacArthur's dictum, the USTFF finally agreed not to bar any athletes under its jurisdiction from AAU-sponsored meets.

Prior to the USTFF's capitulation, several other affiliated groups of the NCAA had sought to prevent college athletes under their jurisdiction from taking part in the AAU championships, from which the teams to compete in the dual-meet against Russia will be chosen.

Lunt reached the 36-hole final round by twice staving off rallies to score separate one hole vic-

tories ever defending champion Dick Davies, Pebble Beach, Calif., and Dr. Ed Updegraff, Tucson, Ariz., Friday.

Blackwell disposed of England's David Moffat 2 and 1 and then downed Dr. Ron Luceti, South San Francisco, Calif., 3 and 2.

The two Britons thus reduced all American players to the role of spectators in setting up today's 36-hole final.

Lunt beat four Americans on his way to the final round. Prior to his victories over Davies and Updegraff, he defeated Billy Nicks, Hollywood, Calif., in the second round and George Blocker, Jal, N.M., in the fourth.
