# Equal paycheck measure signed

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Kennedy today signed into a law a bill aimed at assuring women of paychecks equal to those of men doing the same work.

The President signed the newly enacted bill in a ceremony at his office, with advocates of the legislation standing about his desk.
The law forbids employers o

about 72.5 million U. S. workers from paying women less than men for equal work. The legislation does not cover

all women workers and will not man apprentice, recently partici-pated in exercise Flying Fox, a spite its limitations, advocates of women's rights called the meas ure their most significant advance in many years.

No one knows now how many of the nation's 24 million workers eventually will get higher pay as a result of the new law. Advocates of the bill cited specific examples of wage discrimination because of sex, but made no esti-

mates of the totals.

The equal pay bill passed Congress with little controversy after years of futile efforts to establish James L. Jenes, 19, specialist wage parity in the law.
