

R. L. DeCourcy taken by death

Robert L. DeCourcy, 86, resident of Bend during the past 20 years, died Sunday morning in the Barnes Veterans' Hospital in Vancouver, Wash.

Mr. DeCourcy was born Aug. 7, 1877. On moving to this area he homesteaded on the Upper Deschutes River on what is now the Montgomery Ranch. He was the founder of the Bend Troy Laundry.

A veteran of World War I, Mr. DeCourcy was a member of the Catholic Church.

Training due for reservists

Methodists back cutbacks in CD

Appointment of ministers to the churches for next year was the closing business at the annual Oregon Methodist Conference, which ended Saturday in Portland.

Ministerial and lay delegates from 167 churches voted a budget of \$570,058, a 7.3 per cent increase. Re-appointed to Central Oregon churches were: The Rev. James Thompson, Bend; the Rev. Milton Nelson, Gilchrist; the Rev. Vernon Groves, Madras.

Recent action of state and other government agencies in eliminating and curtailing appropriations for Civil Defense agencies was commended.

Opposition to three proposed Oregon constitutional amendments was expressed by the Conference, in that they "cripple the present system of federal powers and strip the national government of its present power to protect minorities and dissenters . . ."

ACLU opposing housing project

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Oregon branch of the American Civil Liberties Union announced Sunday it has sent a telegram to President Kennedy opposing construction of a low-cost housing project in Portland's Albina district.

The telegram also asked the President to investigate the site selection policies of the Portland Housing Authority, which approved the project.

Oregon ACLU Chairman Charles Davis said the housing authority was guilty of fostering a Negro ghetto in Portland. The Albina district is heavily Negro and Davis said the public housing development would attract only Negro occupants.

Equal paycheck measure signed

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy today signed into a law a bill aimed at assuring women of paychecks equal to those of men doing the same work.

The President signed the newly enacted bill in a ceremony at his office, with advocates of the legislation standing about his desk.

The law forbids employers of about 72.5 million U.S. workers from paying women less than men for equal work.

The legislation does not cover all women workers and will not take effect for one year. But despite its limitations, advocates of women's rights called the measure their most significant advance in many years.

No one knows now how many of the nation's 24 million women workers eventually will get higher pay as a result of the new law. Advocates of the bill cited specific examples of wage discrimination because of sex, but made no estimates of the totals.

The equal pay bill passed Congress with little controversy after years of futile efforts to establish wage parity in the law. The breakthrough came when a compromise method of extending the equal pay principle was advanced by Republicans and accepted by administration Democrats eager to pass a bill this year.

The compromise tied the new ban on wage discrimination because of sex to the existing federal minimum wage law.

The selection is scheduled to be made in ceremonies at the Memorial Coliseum.

Meanwhile, some 17 U.S. and Canadian Navy vessels are due to arrive here Wednesday.

LONDON (UPI)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan returned from a golfing holiday today and went into a huddle with his chief cabinet members on the spreading scandal that threatens his government.

It was learned, meantime, that the lord chancellor for the last 10 days has been investigating the security aspects of the scandal involving former War Minister John Profumo along with a former Soviet Embassy official and red haired playgirl Christine Keeler.

An investigation by the lord chancellor, chief of Britain's judicial system, has taken place only twice in Britain since the end of World War II — once when a junior minister in the Labor government was accused of taking bribes in 1948 and again in 1957.
