

Sunday night ball at Houston nets big crowd

Sunday night baseball may never replace drive-in movies but the customers sure liked it because they got a chance to cool off and see the hottest pitching staff in the majors at the same time.

A crowd of 17,437, well above Houston's day-time average, took in major league baseball's first Sunday night game in history Sunday night and whooped in delight as the Colts handed the San Francisco Giants their seventh straight defeat, 3-0.

The whole idea of Sunday night games was to beat the intense day-time heat in Houston and it worked out fine when the game was played in pleasant 79-degree temperature compared with 95 degrees during the day.

Houston's pitchers have been even hotter than that recently, yielding a total of only two runs in the Colts' last three games.

Knuckleballer Skinny Brown, a 28-year-old American League veteran, was Houston's pitching star Sunday night when he took over for starter Dick Farrell in the third inning and held the Giants to one hit over the last 6 1-3 innings for his first victory of the season.

Yields Lone Single
Brown, who struck out six and did not walk a batter, gave up only a fourth inning single to Willie Mays, who was wiped out stealing.

The veteran right-hander, picked up in May as a free agent after being released by the Yankees, was summoned from the bullpen after Farrell pulled a back muscle. Farrell had given up three hits.

The Colts scored two of their three runs off loser Jack Sanford, now 7-5, with Carl Warwick singling home the first one, John Bateman singling home the second and Howie Goss' double accounting for the final one in the eighth.

Dodgers Beat Cubs

The first-place Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Chicago Cubs, 11-8, despite three homers by Ernie Banks; the New York Mets took the opener from the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-7, but lost the nightcap, 10-4; Philadelphia defeated Cincinnati, 8-7, in 10 innings, then dropped the second game, 3-1, and Pittsburgh blanked Milwaukee, 4-0, but lost the finale, 5-3.

In the American League, the Chicago White Sox took over first place with a 4-3 victory over the Kansas City A's while the Baltimore Orioles tumbled to second place when the Boston Red Sox beat them, 3-2, in 14 innings. The New York Yankees downed the Detroit Tigers, 6-2, the Los Angeles Angels defeated the Minnesota Twins, 4-2, and Cleveland beat Washington, 7-3.

Draw Large Crowd
A crowd of 35,743, the largest Cubs' home attendance in three seasons, watched the Dodgers capitalize on four errors and two wild pitches for their fifth consecutive victory despite Banks' three homers that brought his season total to 13.

Julius Boros took golf's Buick Open in 'record fashion'

GRAND BLANC, Mich. (UPI)—The "Moose" was the bull of the golfing woods today.

Julius Boros, the hammering Hungarian, had polished off the Buick Open in record fashion. He was 14 under par for the 72 holes, shattered the winning record by eight shots and picked up \$9,000 plus to move into third place on the year's money winning list with a fat total of \$43,325.

Money is nice, and is exactly what the pro tourists bat their way around the country for in sunshine and in sorrow, but it goes deeper with Boros than that.

He is a prideful man, the 43-year-old Bohemian better. And it ripples in his soul that he missed the U.S. Open golf championship last year. After all, he had won it in 1952, beating a Ben Hogan who was in his prime as well as the late, great Porky Oliver.

Forgot to Mail Blank

But last year in the manner of men who misplace cufflinks, airplane tickets and the keys to the car, he forgot to mail in his entry blank for the Open.

"They called some of the others whose entries hadn't arrived," said the Moose in the slow, easy way of a volcano about to erupt. "Now you would have thought, in view of the fact that I'd won the Open, that they'd call me, too. But they didn't. So I'd really like to give them something to think about."

Because he missed last year's Open, he'll be in New York today walloping his way around the two courses over which they'll qualify on Tuesday.

The odds are that he'll make it. He's that kind of a determined guy and, while still a long way from collecting Social Security, he's not one of the marble shooting set either. So most folks might not consider him too much of a threat. Yet, the way he played in the Buick, don't sell him

short.

The Moose, after three dinky years in which he failed to win a tournament, is hotter than a three dollar pistol. He copped it all at the Colonial Invitation and added a second and a fourth before hitting the Buick jackpot which, among other emoluments, will provide the five Boros kids with a new chariot during each of the next five years.

He credits his play to getting rid of burrs that bothered him in both shoulders and the taking ways of a Georgia thief. Boros' putter was stolen after the Masters and he went back to an old one derrieked from the closet.

Bend nine loses 2, wins 1, at Oregon City

OREGON CITY — Bend's American Legion baseball team suffered two losses here this weekend, but came on strong in a nightcap Sunday to post a whopping 15-9 victory over a tough Oregon City nine.

Good pitching by Madras' Bill Bauer and Redmond's Derald Parsons went for naught in the game Saturday, which Bend dropped 2-0, and the first game Sunday, also lost 4-2.

Bend mustered only three hits in the first encounter, and two in the second.

In Sunday's finale, Don Watrous, a Bend Legionnaire from Redmond, came onto the mound to relieve starter Glenn Cook, and helped his own cause when he blasted a home run with one on. Bend scored nine runs in a giant sixth inning. Watrous was credited with the win. Bend clobbered 12 base hits in the slug fest.

Coach Bill Bauer's Bend nine faces Klamath Falls in Bend this evening in a single game at the municipal ball park. Game time is 8:30.

Ed Cecil inks ball contract with Cardinals

Bend has produced another professional baseball player.

It was learned today that ace Linfield hurler, Ed Cecil, was purchased by the St. Louis Cardinals organization. Cecil, a 1960 graduate of Bend High School, will play ball for the Brunswick, Ga., Cardinals.

Cecil disclosed today that he is leaving tonight for the Georgia city, and will report for action there on Wednesday. Brunswick plays in the Georgia-Florida League, a loop with the same classification (Class A) as the local Northwest League comprising such teams as Salem, Eugene, Tri-City, etc.

Edward J. Cecil is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Cecil, 320 S. Third Street. His efforts this season with the Linfield Wildcats includes a three-hit win over powerful Northern Division winner Oregon State. He also tossed a victory over the College of Idaho.

Though only maintaining a 2-2 win-loss record for the season, Cecil figured in a lot of relief duty, and started a number of ball games other than those in which he was credited with official wins or losses. His earned run average for the past season was 2.25.

Cecil plans to finish college, and though he was a junior this year, will take two years to do so. He will play baseball, and attend Linfield during the off season.

He makes the 16th Linfield baseball athlete to enter pro ranks. Four (other than Cecil) are still playing.
