

# Modernization work on road being planned

Modernization of a ten-mile section of the Big Spring-Bachelor Butte unit of the Cascade Lakes Highway appears assured, with work to start in the present season.

This is the section of the mountain road that broke up under heavy traffic between Bend and the Bachelor Butte ski area this past winter.

The U.S. Bureau of Public Roads has already completed a survey of the project. Today word was received that Deschutes County plans to transfer a portion of its allotment of Federal Aid System funds to the Oregon State Highway Department to expend on the work. The improvement of this section would incorporate the FAS money with National Forest Highway funds.

The project, which will start at Mile Post 11 west of Bend, calls for a 30-foot wide, two lane road with a surface of sufficient strength to carry heavy traffic—even logging vehicles.

The improved road will approximately follow the present line. A wide right-of-way clearance is planned, with 30 feet on one side and 40 on the other. The 40-foot clearance will be to the south of the highway, to permit the sun to reach into the road area in the winter months.

The new road into Bachelor Butte will replace the narrow road, of light construction, completed following World War II.

Because of heavy use of skiers, the road into Bachelor Butte in recent winters has been one of the most heavily used winter routes in Central Oregon.

# Changes noted in recruiting

Some changes have been made in recruiting in the State of Oregon for the U.S. Coast Guard, and they directly affect Bend and Central Oregon.

Central Oregon has been assigned along with the entire south half of eastern Oregon to the Eugene recruitment depot.

An increase of the complement of the U.S. Coast Guard in its regulars has caused an increase of the recruiting work load for the Portland office. Hence, the placement of Central Oregon under the Eugene office.

Working out of the Navy recruiting office in Bend's post office will be Chief Sonarman M. L. Wheeler, Eugene recruiter. He will be in Bend the third Monday and Tuesday of each month, starting June 17-18.

In an announcement this week, the Coast Guard disclosed the first increase in enlisted personnel recruitment in five years.

## City planners approve Bevans' vacation plea

Bend city planners last night deliberated on the wisdom of closing additional city streets, then gave favorable recommendation to a vacation request put forth by O. H. Bevans, apartment builder.

Bevans wishes to build additional apartment on property located between Awbrey and W. Second Streets south of Portland Avenue. His request is for closure of a portion of W. Second that abuts the building area. The board ruled out a suggestion by Fire Chief Vern Carlson to build a cul-de-sac at the roadway terminus, when it was found that sufficient space is not available. Also ruled out was a provision for granting the city an easement to the property.

In the only other official business, commissioners fixed June 23 as the date for five public hearings to consider zone change requests. These include a request by Seaton Smith to change from single-family to multiple-family dwelling zone four lots in Pinelynn Park at the Drake Road-Newton intersection; by Al Bell to re-zone a multiple-dwelling area on lots at the southeast corner of E. Third and Fourth and Thurston and Underwood; and by Jan Ward for single-family to multiple-family zone between Saginaw and Roanoke, and E. 10th and 11th.
