

## School district has no objection to ski proposal for Pilot Butte

Directors of School District No. 1 have no objection to the use of the northwest slope of Pilot Butte for a ski run and ski jump.

That was the word given Dr. Robert Cutter, Bend Skyliner representative, last night after he had outlined a plan to build such a ski run and jump which would utilize artificially manufactured snow.

Approval of the board was asked since the district owns property in the vicinity of the contemplated ski area and is negotiating with the state highway department for further land. The property would eventually be used as a school building site.

Dr. Cutter reported that the ski jump would be built for use in connection with the National Junior Ski Meet which Bend is virtually assured of getting for 1965. He intends to be in San Francisco later this week for a National Ski Association meeting, at which time final action is due on the junior championships.

The board also opened bids on several summer work projects. Bend Roofing Co. was low bidder at \$922.50 for re-roofing at Thompson School, and the Pioneer Masonry Restoration Co., Seattle, offered a low bid of \$5,589 for waterproofing and masonry restoration work at the Junior High School. In both instances bids were beneath amounts budgeted for the work.

Directors also opened bids for purchase of a used school bus, but delayed action until Louis Mitchell, transportation supervisor has had an opportunity to inspect several buses which were offered. Bidding was Murray and Holt, Bend, and Sherman Howard, Redmond, Wash.

## Flag Day plans made by Elks

"It may be interesting to note that Elks observed Flag Day for many years before it was officially adopted by the Congress of the United States," Hafstad said, adding: "At the Elks national convention in Dallas, Tex., in 1908, a resolution was adopted making it mandatory for all Elks Lodges to observe June 14 as Flag Day."

"The National Flag Day Bill officially recognizing June 14 as Flag Day was passed by the 81st Congress and signed into law by President Harry S. Truman on August 3, 1948, culminating years of work by individuals and organizations."

Elks of Bend have observed Flag Day for many years.

Mr. McMeen was the son of Mrs. Dale McMeen of Bend, and Joseph Belz of Cannon Beach.

He is survived by his parents, a brother, Donald, Seattle; three sisters, Thora and Patty of Bend, and Christina Belz, Cannon Beach. He is also survived by his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Gray of Gearhart, and Mrs. Charles McMeen of Bend.

Mr. McMeen attended elementary school in Bend, but went to high school at The Dalles. He was a student at Oregon State University for two years, and recently graduated from the University of Washington here with a master's degree in electrical engineering.

He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa scholastic honorary and Alpha Tau Omega social fraternity. At the time of his death, Mr. McMeen was an engineer at the Boeing aircraft plant here.

Mr. McMeen was killed when his car crashed head-on with an oncoming car. He died instantly.
