

UO president feels action of lawmakers cast cloud on federal research funds

CORVALLIS (UPI)—Dr. Arthur Fleming, president of the University of Oregon, said Tuesday he believed the legislature had put federal research money in jeopardy by reducing higher education salary requests.

Fleming said federal research money had been increasing of late. "This research money comes to us because of superior professors in the system, and it will certainly decline if our salaries do not permit us to attract and keep superior people," he said.

He said the federal research contribution to higher education amounted to about \$16 million during the current biennium compared to \$9 million for 1959-61. "That kind of money is definitely

good for the economy of Oregon, and it just doesn't seem to be good business to discourage it."

Dr. Branford P. Millar, president of Portland State College, said cutting of financial requests "will not even permit us to maintain the standard of education in Oregon at its present level." He said "the attitude of the legislature regarding education seems to be one of retrenchment rather than advance."

The college officials attended the State Board of Higher Education meeting.

William Walsh of Coos Bay, board chairman, said the legislature faced its biggest financial problem of any in the past 20 years.

Chancellor Roy E. Lieuallan promised that physical transfer of patients from the Portland Tuberculosis Hospital to Salem would be on a timetable based on their health and welfare and promised "nothing less than the best that can be provided."

The Salem TB hospital fell under the board's control in a last-day compromise at the legislature. The board indicated a physician would be named as administrator.

Abandoned child ruling is issued

SALEM (UPI) — The Oregon Supreme Court today ruled that a child not legally adopted after being abandoned remains a legal heir of his natural mother.

The ruling came when the high court reversed a decision from the Washington County Circuit Court of Judge J. S. Bohannon, and remanded the case back to the lower court for further proceedings.

The lower court had ruled that Harold J. Hughes had been legally adopted, but Hughes appealed the order on the grounds his natural mother had never signed the adoption papers.

The Supreme Court ruled that although the child had been abandoned by his natural mother, Mona Lawanda Nelson, he was still her legal heir.

The Supreme Court upheld a decision by Oregon Tax Court Judge Peter M. Gunnar which held that a gift in trust for charities was non-deductible.

Also affirmed by the high court was an action by the Multnomah County Circuit Court of Judge Alan M. Davies in setting aside the jury's verdict and granting a new trial in the case of an injured longshoreman.

Lloyd Strandholm was injured as the result of the collapse and fall of a large marine boom where he was working, and he was awarded damages by the jury.

The trial court set aside the jury's verdict and set a new trial because improper evidence had been introduced during the first proceedings.

Two divorce cases filed

Two new divorce cases were filed this week in circuit court, and another divorce decree was issued.

Ruth Katherine Blevens has filed for divorce from Donald Lee Blevens, to whom she was married Aug. 26, 1962. The plaintiff asks custody of the child she is expecting, \$75 monthly support and \$125 monthly support for herself during the period of her pregnancy. A division of personal property is specified.

Violet Gersbach seeks a divorce from Cliff D. Gersbach. They were married Jan. 30, 1956, in Minden, Nev. The plaintiff seeks equity in property at 1338 E. Tenth Street, household goods located there, and a division of the principals' personal effects, with each to take an automobile.

Mamie Ellis was granted a divorce from Wiley Ellis, and title to real property at 153 Jefferson Place. They were married May 8, 1930, in Bay City, Texas.

Ralph Yeaton taken by death

Ralph E. Yeaton, 78, a 40-year resident of Bend and foreman of The Shevlin-Hixon Company roundhouse here in earlier years, died Tuesday afternoon, apparently of a heart victim. He was injured recently in a fall, and was being cared for at Harmony House. The family home in Bend is 523 Sisemore.

A native of Sioux City, Iowa, where he was born on Feb. 27, 1885, Mr. Yeaton came to Bend on Jan. 3, 1923, a mechanic by trade. Mr. Yeaton's hobby was the cutting and polishing of stones. This was an interest to which he devoted much of his time in his retirement years.

Mr. Yeaton was long an active member of the Deschutes Geology Club and for years headed field trips and program committees. He was a Shriner, and was affiliated with all Masonic bodies in Bend.

Aside from his widow, Anna E., Bend, Mr. Yeaton is survived by a nephew, Bernard Flageolle, of Seattle, Wash.

Funeral services will be held Thursday at 2 p.m., at the Niswonger & Reynolds Chapel, with the Rev. Ronald M. Lundy and the Rev. Richard Knutzen in charge. Mr. Yeaton was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Pallbearers will be members of the Deschutes Geology Club. They will be Harry Harry Drake, John H. Eaton, Howard Thom, John Carter, Howard Jenne and Lloyd Kuserth. Burial will be in the Pilot Butte cemetery.

Because of the death of Mr. Yeaton and the Thursday services, the meeting of the Deschutes Geology Club planned for Thursday evening will be postponed until June 20.
