

Seat belt clinic set at Prineville

PRINEVILLE — A cooperative project among several Prineville groups to make cars safer will be held in a safety and seat belt clinic June 22, according to Mike Stevens, chairman of the seat belt clinic project for the Jaycees, and general coordinator of the one-day safety clinic.

A city block, from Beaver to Main Streets on Eighth Street will be blocked off for the entire day, Stevens said. In that area, cars will be given a free safety inspection by a trained team of 4-H club members, Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts will hold a car wash, and seat belts will be installed by the Jaycees for the nominal sum of \$6 for belt and installation.

Stickers will be given cars that have been safety checked, and drivers will be notified of recommended improvements, if any, in their vehicles.

Stevens urged motorists to visit the day-long clinic. Hours will be from 8 a.m. to about 5 p.m., he said.

Marvin D. Mix, Bend High School and Oregon State University graduate with more than nine years of service in the U.S. Air Force and the Air National Guard, has been named Richfield Oil Co. distributor for the Bend area. He takes over the agency sup-

ervised here for many years by his father, the late Don S. Denning. Mrs. Denning is to assist her son in the operation of the agency.

Mix, a Bend high school graduate with the class of 1950 and a guard on Lava Bear football teams, was graduated from OSU in 1954, a major in the horticulture department of the School of Agriculture. For the past two years, he was with the Great Western Chemical Company, with his headquarters in Boise, Ida.

While in the Air Force, Mix served in Korea and in the Philippines, and traveled extensively in southeast Asia. In the states, he served with the Air Force in Texas and Arizona, as a pilot of jet planes.

Presently, Mix, owner with three other men of two planes, holds the rank of captain in the Air National Guard, and is flight leader of his Idaho group. He will make use of one of his partnership planes until he settles his business interests in Idaho.

With his brother, Don Denning, attorney in Vale, Mix owns a 90 acre fruit ranch and a 50 acre feed alfalfa ranch in Idaho, and a ten acre fruit ranch near New Plymouth, Idaho.

Mix took over the Richfield Oil Co. agency here on June 1. The distributorship covers the south half of Deschutes county.

\$400 remains in bounty fund

Most years, the fund is expended before the end of the year. Recent dispersals have been to five or six regular trappers, at the rate of two or three payments a month.

The county pays bounties of \$3 for coyotes and \$2.50 for bobcats.

Busy schedule keeps board in session after midnight

PRINEVILLE — A considerable variety of early summer business kept members of the Crook county school board in session at their regular meeting, June 10, until 1:30 a.m., for a more than five-hour meeting.

Visiting at the meeting were A. H. Haberly, who will assume the duties of county school superintendent July 1, and Joe Stahanyk, school board member-elect who will also attend his first meeting officially on July 8.

Gas and oil bids were awarded, new teachers hired, construction considered and some resignations accepted. New teachers elected to the Crook county teaching roster are James R. Birt, Wishram, Wash., who will be the assistant football coach next year, and Mrs. Lois Shepard, a former Prineville teacher, who will teach in the third grade at Ochoco grade school.

Resignations were accepted from Kenneth Crenshaw, a janitor; Dwaine Lambert, boys' physical education teacher at CCHS, and Don Person, music teacher at the junior and senior high schools.

The Crook county court and the school board united in awarding gas and oil bids as a means for obtaining a better bid figure. Both groups agreed to award to local bulk distributors. Awards were given to Shell for gasoline.

Standard Oil for kerosene and diesel oil, to Union for stove oil and oil for the furnaces, for the coming school year.

W. B. Thompson, junior high school principal, reported to the board that the Quarterback Club had sold hay from the grounds at the junior high school and had built a shed for athletic equipment at the school with the proceeds.

Several reports were made to the board by Lloyd Lewis, CCHS principal. He discussed the costs of various athletic activities, indicating that none of them had been self-supporting, with football going in the hole to the tune of \$343. The school board approved payment of the deficits, as it has for the past several years.
