

Reeve, Steen keep Oregon's hopes alive

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI)—Vic Reeve finished second in the three-mile run and Dave Steen led all qualifiers in the shot put Friday to keep Oregon's slim hopes alive for its second straight NCAA track championship.

Reeve, who has been a big disappointment this season, came in second behind Southern California's Julio Marin in 14:26.6. Marin's time was 14:24.9.

Steen got off a heave of 61-11 1/4, the best effort of his career, to nose out Gary Gubner of New York University in the qualifying. Gubner went 61-9 1/4.

Reeve's finish was worth eight points and gave the defending champion Ducks a total of 10 after four events and two days of the three-day competition. The meet ends tonight.

Southern California was in first place with 20 and Villanova held second with 12. Boston College was tied with Oregon with 10.

Other qualifiers for Oregon were Dave Blunt in the 100-yard dash, Archie San Romani in the

mile and John Burns in the javelin.

Blunt ran second in his heat in 9.5, San Romani finished third in the heat in 4:13.6 and Burns went 242-10 1/2 for fourth place in the javelin.

High jumpers Paul Stuber and Terry Llewellyn and pole vaulter Bob Watson qualified Thursday for Oregon for the finals.

Oregon State moved four men into the finals—Norm Hoffman in the 800-yard run, Gary Stenlund in the javelin, Morgan Groth in the mile and Tom Wyatt in the 440-yard intermediate hurdles.

Hoffman won his heat in 1:51.2, Stenlund was second in the javelin in 253, Groth finished second in his heat in 4:13.1 and Wyatt ran fourth in his heat in 51.9.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI)—Julio Marin, a wisp of a lad with legs of steel and a heart of iron, calls upon his last ounce of reserve tonight to try and become the NCAA track and field meet's first triple winner since Jesse Owens' heyday in the mid-1930s.

Owens turned in "quadruples" in 1935 and 1936. He won both dashes, the low hurdles and broad jump.

Marin, a wiry legged Costa Rican pre-med student at Southern California, already is the toast of the 42nd annual NCAA championships being held at the University of New Mexico for his stirring endurance triumphs in the six-mile and three-mile runs.

Tonight, he goes after his third victory in as many nights when he tries to give USC's championship chances another big boost with a victory in the meet's closing event—the 3,000 meter steeplechase.

He won the six-mile Thursday night in 30:32.9, collapsed at the end of the race but refused an offer of oxygen, then came back Friday night to whip a good field in the three mile in 14:24.9.

Marin, whose winning performance came as a surprise in the other two events, will provoke an even bigger one if he pulls off his triple in the steeplechase. He's never run it before. His nearest comparative event is the two-mile run in which he has been clocked in 8:50.2.

USC may need every point Marin can pull from his stout legs if the Trojans are to dethrone champion Oregon or keep speed-packed Arizona State from cutting inside and edging both the favorites.

Jones awarded fight decision

TEANECK, N.J. (UPI)—Promoter Murray Goodman sought to arrange a return bout between heavyweight contenders Doug Jones and Billy Daniels today following Jones' controversial decision over the Brooklyn battler Friday night in the Teaneck Armory.

Referee Paul Cavlier, the lone voting official, awarded Jones a 5-4 1/2 verdict over Daniels. The decision was greeted by mingled boos and cheers from the 4,000 fans.

Jones of New York weighed 194 pounds, the heaviest of his career, for his first fight since being outpointed by Cassius Clay at Madison Square Garden on March 13. Daniels stood almost a half-foot taller than Jones and weighed 189 1/2 pounds.

Daniels, the sixth-ranked contender, dominated the early rounds. He had Jones semi-groggry from six nearly consecutive rights to the head in the second and belabored Doug with a terrific head barrage in the sixth.

Third-ranked Jones, though, rallied strongly in the remaining rounds as he opened cuts on Daniels' brows and bloodied his nose but was unable to floor courageous Billy.

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Thornton 145 choice tonight

NEW YORK (UPI)—Light heavyweight contender Wayne Thornton of Fresno, Calif., is favored at 14-5 to beat mystery man Jose Menno of Argentina tonight at Madison Square Garden and thereby clinch a shot at the title.

Their 10-rounder will be televised nationally by ABC. Garden matchmaker Teddy Brenner has promised Thornton, 22, a crack at Willie Pastrano's brand new 175-pound crown if fourth-ranked Wayne wins tonight because of his 1-1-1 record in three fights this year with Pastrano before Pastrano became champion.

Willie took the title from Harold Johnson June 1 on an unpopular split decision at Las Vegas, Nev.

The unknown Menno is 27 years old but he has had but 16 professional bouts since turning professional in 1961 after a long amateur career. He is unbeaten as a pro with 15 wins, including seven knockouts, and one draw.

Thornton, a specialist with hooking combinations to body and head, seeks his 28th victory in 32 fights. He also is after his 19th knockout. He lost two decisions, was stopped once on cuts, and had one draw.

Sign up for boys and girls softball, hoop programs set

Registration for a girl's summer softball league and a boy's summer basketball program will begin Monday, according to city recreation director, Vince Genna.

The girl's softball program, for girls nine years old and up, will be divided into two divisions; for girls nine to twelve and for teenage girls thirteen and older. Interested girls may register at Harmon Field Monday between 9 and 11 a.m.

The programs, supervised by Karen Houston, will have the younger girls playing their girls during the day, while the older girls will have practices during the day and probably some night games. The games will be played on the softball field behind the senior high school.

The city will furnish all needed equipment except for fielder's gloves, which the girls must supply themselves, Genna pointed out.

'Kool Kats' League
An informal "Kool Kats" basketball league is also planned by Genna.

The basketball program, which Genna described as being "lowly organized" and "strictly recreational," will employ a unique set of rules that eliminates most of the regimentation of the sport.

According to Genna, the league will be divided into as many six man teams as are needed to accommodate the boys who register. The games will be played at the Juniper Park recreational slab on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The contests will be divided into two 22 point halves; the first team that reaches 44 points first wins the game.

In addition to providing competition to the boys on a lower organized scale, the program is aimed at improving the participants' basketball skills.

All players will be required to shoot with their power hand in the first half of play and then switch to their weak hand in the last half. That is, right handed players will be shooting with their right hand in the first half and with their left hand in the second half.

If a player scores a basket with his power hand in the second half of the game, the basket will count for the opposing team.

The players themselves will act as officials, Genna said, they will keep track of their own scores

and also act as their own referees.

Substitutions will be made on the basis of fouls committed. Each time a boy commits a foul, he must be replaced by the sixth member of his team, who stays in the game until he fouls someone. This rule is aimed at giving all the boys an equal chance to play.

The team that was fouled gets possession of the ball out of bounds instead of a free throw.

Boys interested in playing in the "Kool Kats" basketball league are asked to come to the city recreation department in person and register as soon as possible so that the number of teams needed can be determined and scheduling begun.

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Bauer shines Bend Legion turns back Roosevelt, 5-2

Bend's American Legion baseball-nine beat Roosevelt of Portland, 5-2, behind the four-hit pitching of Bill Bauer on Municipal Field here last night for their fourth victory against eight losses.

Bauer, a six-foot five-inch left-hander, gave up only four scattered hits as he went the entire nine innings for the Bend club. Bauer struck out nine of the visitors but showed signs of control difficulties as he handed out an equal number of free passes.

Larry Barnes started off the Bend scoring in the first inning by taking a base on balls, getting to second and third bases on two consecutive passed balls and coming home on a wild pitch.

Palmer, Nichols lead in tourney

RYE, N.Y. (UPI)—Arnold Palmer reminded Jack Nicklaus today "it's the crimpies who always win golf tournaments."

"That's a fact," said stocky Jack, who got the scare of his young life when "something snapped" in his neck as he hit his tee shot on the third hole in the second round of the \$100,000 Thunderbird Classic Friday.

"I'm hurting just bad enough to go on and win this thing. It's an amazing thing to me I'm only four shots back."

However, Nicklaus, who'll be defending his U.S. Open championship at Brookline, Mass., next week, expected to wait until just before tee off time in the third round today to decide whether he wants to pursue Palmer and Bob Nichols of Midland, Tex., who led at the halfway point with 187.

Palmer added a 70 to his first round 67 and Nichols fired a four-under-par 66 after a 71. Nicklaus, in with 69 in the opening round, had a 72 for 141 despite the pain and fright that hit him when he was caught suddenly by what an orthopedic surgeon eventually diagnosed as an "old fashioned stiff neck brought on by the cold, damp weather."

Dr. Lawrence Demarest last of four physicians to treat Nicklaus, said Jack could play any time he felt like it without producing any serious injury.

Trojans keep playoff alive

OMAHA, Neb. (UPI)—Arizona and stubborn Southern California have battled to the end of the plank. The survivor of tonight's showdown is the national collegiate baseball champion.

It could have been all over Friday night. But Southern Cal's Trojans would have none of that.

The Trojans carried one defeat with them when they met Arizona Friday night in the first half of the championship finals of the NCAA's double-elimination tournament. They capitalized on a first-inning lapse for five runs and went on to a 6-4 victory which set up tonight's decisive game.

It was the first loss for the Wildcats in the tourney.

REGATTA HELD

NEW LONDON, Conn. (UPI)—The nation's oldest intercollegiate athletic event, the Yale-Harvard regatta, comes up for its 96th renewal today with the Elis bidding for their second straight victory.

Teaming with Ivy League tradition, this four-mile endurance test dates back to Aug. 3, 1852. Yale was the 1962 winner upstream on the Thames River, but trails in the over-all statistics. Harvard has won 50 races, Yale 47.

Dodgers sign Grants Pass boy

GRANTS PASS (UPI)—Gary Reddick, 19-year-old Grants Pass high school outfielder, has been signed by the Los Angeles Dodgers and sent to Santa Barbara of the California League.

The signing was announced by Dodger scout Bill Brenzel, who said he obtained Reddick's services in a \$30,000 package deal which includes a substantial cash bonus and a full college scholarship. Reddick plans to study architecture at the University of Oregon between baseball seasons.

The young ball player worked out with the Salem Senators this week and reported to Santa Barbara Friday.

In high school, Reddick was a football, basketball and baseball player, a member of the honor roll, president of the student body, president of his junior class, vice president of the Luther League, and was an all-conference star in high school and American Legion baseball the last two years. He was a member of the all-state high school baseball team this year.

Reddick batted .330 during three years in high school and .350 in two years of Legion competition.

Developed under Grants Pass coaches Ron Maurer and Larry Stevens, Reddick is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Reddick. The father is in the furniture business here.

Premier rowing flotillas meet

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (UPI)—The nation's premier rowing flotillas—topped by defending champion Cornell University's power-stroking heavyweight crew—meet on Onondaga Lake today in the 61st annual intercollegiate championships.

An estimated 15,000 spectators will watch a record 15 crews line up for the three-mile varsity race over a course stretching along the northwest shore of this 4 1/2-mile lake.

Twelve junior varsity shells square off in the other three-mile event after the same number of freshman boats launch the intercollegiate Rowing Association (IRA) regatta.

Besides Cornell, IRA members entered in the varsity challenge cup race host Syracuse, high-stroking Penn, Navy and Columbia. The guests are Washington, California, Wisconsin, MIT, Princeton, Dartmouth, Brown University, Rutgers, Boston and the country's small college kingpin, Marietta (Ohio).

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
