60 trainees to attend fire school

Opening of the Deschutes National Forest 1963 fire guard school has been set for this evening at the Methodist Youth camp at Suttle Lake, with some 60 trainees to take part in an orientation program.

The camp will last through Thursday, and on Friday all trainees will be at their stations in the five Deschutes National Forest districts, ready for the fire season.

That season actually preceded the opening of the guard school when a series of noisy electric storms moved over the Deschutes woods Sunday afternoon, starting a number of small fires. Five fires had been checked this morning, and more were expected later in the day when the woods dried. All fires were of the "smoke" type, most of them in the Klak Butte area west of Bend.

A drenching rain accompanied the storm at Crescent, where 0.68 inch of moisture was measured. Round Butte, on the western skyline, measured 0.22 of an inch. Bend's moisture was only a trace.

In preparation for the opening of the fire guard camp, forestry students were moving into the area today from many parts of the United States. They will be joined tonight by a considerable number of local people — teachers, high school students and others.

Some 20 men will serve as instructors, headed by Deschutes National Forest fire control officers. Dale Bowditch, Sisters, is camp boss.

Training will range from look-out duties to the control of actual fires, started in safe areas of the adjacent woods.
