

Bend Legion wins 4 tests; Parsons tosses no-hitter

Bend's American Legion baseball team is about to upset the apple cart in the Oregon state Legion diamond picture, if ball games played here over the weekend are any indication.

When the dust cleared after Sunday's doubleheader, Bend had won its fifth straight ball game, and against more than just average competition, too.

Saturday saw a visiting Portland nine, Roosevelt, take a double drubbing at the hands of Coach Bill Bauer's Legionnaires. Derald Parsons, Redmond's contribution to Bend Legion roster, shocked the sports world in that first one against the Portlanders, tossing a no-hitter shut-out.

Parsons, one of Redmond High School's chuggers this spring, laid down the law to Roosevelt batters, fanning 15, including the last four Portland clubbers to face him.

Don Watrous, another Redmond athlete playing his summer baseball on the Bend Legion nine, got in the mood along with his prep teammate last spring, and sent one for two in the batter's box to start him on a hitting streak that was to bring him nine base runs in 13 trips to the plate during the four games. This includes three doubles. He is now tapping the ball at a phenomenal .479 clip, a team statistician announced today.

Bend totaled 45 hits in the four-game spree, more than half of the hits (86) that the squad clobbered in its first 12 outings of the season. The Bend Legion, with this weekend's victories, now has an 8-8 win-loss record.

Klamath Falls was the other Bend victim. Klamath Falls' Hawks (not the Falcons which played here last week) bit the dust twice, 9-4 and 7-5.

Roosevelt suffered two humiliating defeats. Bend took them to the cleaners in the Saturday opener, 5-0, and then continued its pace in the nightcap, annihilating the visitors 10-3.

Tonight Bend will attempt to pick up its sixth straight victory

when the Murray Brothers nine faces the stronger of two Klamath Falls Legion teams, the Falcons. Tonight's play will see a single game only.

This same Klamath Falls team was here the weekend before last, and took two from the locals.

In Saturday's opener that saw Parsons' stirring no-no effort, Bend got two tallies in the first, two more in the fourth, and another in the fifth.

Roosevelt's side of the score book looks clean as a whistle today. Parsons' whiffing of 15 Portland batters, left little room for any scoring.

In the second one, Bend started right out with a gigantic second inning, garnering nine of the 10 runs. A single by Benny Hamilton

in the first frame provided the other Bend tally.

Roosevelt got three tallies in the fourth inning on the strength of a double by center fielder Millage, and a solid base rap by left fielder Arndt.

Don Watrous and Bill Koho led the locals in the batting department, both going two for three. Jerry Wetle outdid their efforts, going three for four, and Mike Clark joined Bennie Hamilton in going two for four. George Woodworth also went two for four.

It was a late-inning splurge that provided Bend with the first win Sunday at Klamath Falls. Wild pitching aided Bend efforts in the eighth frame. Two singles, two walks, and one batter hit by a pitched ball provided three big tallies, the first one being enough

for the victory.

In the ninth, Bend got two more on much the same performance. Once again, Watrous led the hitting parade, going four for five at the plate. Hamilton went two for five.

A second game between the two Sunday was closer. A late inning rally by the Klamath Falls crew fell short and the Hawks fell victim to Bend, 7-5. Klamath Falls came on strong in the sixth and seventh frames for all five tallies. Two of them were in the sixth, and the other three came in the seventh. The Hawks performance was largely aided by their shortstop Cunningham who rapped a double and then a triple in his last two times at bats.

White Sox's game is still 'good pitching'

Pitching still is "the name of the game" and the Chicago White Sox firm of Johnny Buzhardt, Juan Pizarro and Jim Brosnan is more than proving the case to American League rivals.

Buzhardt, who leads the AL pitchers with an earned run average of 1.99, spun a four-hitter at the Kansas City Athletics Sunday and partners Pizarro and Brosnan combined on an eight-hitter in the nightcap to give the White Sox 2-1 and 3-2 decisions and a virtual tie with the New York Yankees for the league lead.

For Buzhardt, who had an 8-12 won-loss record with the White Sox in 1962, it was his eighth win of the season against only two losses. It also marked the fourth straight complete game for the former Chicago Cub and Philadelphia Phillie who never before has won more than eight games in any one season in the majors.

Pizarro, a 14-game winner for the White Sox a year ago, picked up victory No. 7, but he needed help from Brosnan, the transplanted "author" from Cincinnati, who got the final five outs. Before he left, though, Pizarro had fanned eight batters to run his strikeout total to 81.

The Yankees stayed nine percentage points ahead of the White Sox by defeating the Detroit Tigers twice, 4-0 on Ralph Terry's three-hitter and 6-3 behind Bill Stafford and Hal Reniff before a crowd of 44,357 at Yankee Stadium, the largest of the season in the American League.

The Cleveland Indians, Los Angeles Angels and Boston Red Sox also scored doubleheader wins. The Indians doubled the Washington Senators, 4-2 and 6-4; the Red Sox routed the Baltimore Orioles, 8-1 and 12-5; and the Angels beat the Twins, 5-3 and 5-4.

In the National League, the Cincinnati Reds swept the New York Mets, 11-5 and 10-3; Houston and San Francisco split, the Colts taking the opener, 3-0 and the Chicago Cubs downed the Los Angeles Dodgers, 8-3, then lost, 2-0; the Pittsburgh Pirates and St. Louis Cardinals divided, Pittsburgh winning the first in 12 innings, 4-3, and St. Louis the second, 11-7, and Milwaukee beat Philadelphia, 5-3, before dropping the nightcap, 7-4 in 11 innings.

Major castoffs to PCL hope to return

About a dozen former major leaguers sent down to the Pacific Coast League this season are showing their bosses in a hurry that they want return tickets to the steak and salad circuit.

All of them played a big hand Sunday in helping their respective teams achieve victory. They are pitcher Dave Thies and outfielders Manny Jimenez and Jose Tabataba of Portland; hurlers Ted Wills and Dave Sisler and infielder Gene Freese of San Diego; pitcher Jim Constable of Tacoma; southpaw George Brunet of Oklahoma City.

Also outfielder Bob Will of Salt Lake City and pitchers Bob DuLaba and Fred Newman and infielders Ken Hunt and Tom Satriano of Hawaii.

Wills (6-4), formerly of the Boston Red Sox and Cincinnati Reds, buried a nine-inning two-hitter in blanking Dallas-Ft. Worth 6-0. Relief pitching by former Cincinnati and Red Sox hurler Sisler helped the Padres edge the Rangers 6-5 in the first game.

Portland beat Spokane twice, 4-3 and 9-6, on the strength of Thies' pitching in the opener and a three-run homer by Jimenez in the nightcap. Tacoma's Constable

shut out Seattle 1-0 on four hits in the seven-inning finale after Kolstad, late of the Red Sox, scattered five hits to win the opener for Seattle 4-3.

Will, starting his first game for Salt Lake after being sent down by the Chicago Cubs in exchange for Ellis Burton, bashed a two-run homer in leading the Bees to a 12-9 win over Denver.

Home runs by Satriano, Hunt and Carlos Bernier carried Hawaii to a 4-1 win over Oklahoma City in the opener of a twin bill. Newman and DuLaba combined to limit the 88ers to five hits. All except Bernier were sent to Honolulu earlier this season by the parent Los Angeles Angels.

Brunet, allowed Hawaii only four singles, three by Bernier who ran his consecutive game hitting streak to 14, in blanking the Islanders 8-0 in the second game. It was the second shutout of the season for Brunet (4-2) who pitched for the Houston Colts last year.

San Diego's twin triumphs lifted the Padres to within one game of southern division leader Dallas-Ft. Worth. Wills hit a solo homer to aid his cause. In addition the leftlander rapped a pinch single for Sisler in the nightcap and a substitute runner scored the winning run on a single by Mel Queen.

Clay, Cooper await combat

LONDON (UPI)—Cassius Marcellus Clay was "muzzled" today as he restlessly awaited Tuesday night's rich world heavyweight challengers' fight with Henry Cooper of England at suburban Wembley's open air Empire Stadium.

Manager Bill Faversham of Louisville, Ky., had told Clay: "No more statements to anyone until after the fight."

Big Bill explained: "Cassius already has done a tremendous job of talking this fight into a sellout. And we want him to relax now until the weigh-in tomorrow."

Their expected weights are Clay 196 pounds; Cooper, 189.

Largely through the "Louisville Lip's" salesmanship in glorifying himself and belittling British Empire champion Cooper, the 10-round fight will be a sellout of about 55,000 fans and \$448,000, promoter Jack Solomons was able to announce today.

That gate will be the largest for any fight ever staged anywhere outside the United States, although the crowd will not be the biggest.
