"I like being an adult, especially in my association with people at the studios. They don't ask me where I got my 'shoosies' anymore."

Carol holds the record for quick trips to Europe. She was flown there recently to complete a single scene on location in Rome. The flight, with various stops, consumed the grand total of two days. It was her first trip abroad and Carol made the most of it.

"I spent a day and a half in Rome, one hour in Paris, a half-hour in Milan, six hours in Copenhagen and an hour and a half in Greenland," she said.

But it was in Rome that Carol spent most of her time and was finally and forever assured that she no longer looks nor acts like a child.

Young Demos back ballot bid

PORTLAND (UPI) — The executive board of the Young Democrats of Oregon passed a resolution Sunday supporting a move to place the state's proposed new constitution on the 1964 general election ballot.

The executive committee of the Citizens Committee for Constitutional Revision voted Friday to place the document on the ballot by initiative petition if that method can be used legally in this case.

The Young Democrats resolved to "pledge the efforts of the entire organization to secure signatures... if this may be done according to the present constitution."

The proposed constitution failed to get through the 1963 Oregon Legislature by the necessary two-thirds majority. It was passed by the House but failed by three votes in the Senate. Backers then decided to ask Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton for an opinion on the legality of putting it on the ballot by initiative.

Solemn mass ends services for Pope John

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Nine days of funeral services for Pope John XXIII ended today with a solemn Mass in St. Peter's Basilica attended by churchmen and politicians from all over the world.

Seventy-two cardinals were present for the services presided over by Eugene Cardinal Tisserant, of the Sacred College. On Wednesday, the cardinals will begin the conclave to elect the successor to Pope John, who died June 3 at the age of 81.

For the Mass, representatives of 85 governments and international organizations gathered beside the red-draped catafalque lit by 88 candles and topped by the jeweled papal crown.

After the services, the cardinals moved to the consistorial hall where they received the government delegations one by one, including U. S. representatives headed by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson.

There was no official representative of the Soviet government but a two-man delegation represented the Russian Orthodox Church.

TRAGEDY HITS FAMILY

MIAMI (UPI) — A planned Father's Day outing with his son ended in death Sunday for Evelio Leon Sr. and his estranged wife.

Police said Leon picked up his son, Evelio Jr., 12, after church and went to get his wife's permission to take the child to the beach. An argument broke out between the parents and Leon pulled a gun, shot his wife to death and then turned the gun on himself, police said.

Leaks:

The Western powers aren't the only ones that have trouble keeping secrets. The monthly publication of the Czech railway workers has complained that official secrets are getting into the hands of unauthorized persons and that documents are being lost. It may be the signal of a new Czech crackdown on official carelessness.

Majority Vote:

French Socialists, Communists and some of the old line middle-of-the-road parties are expected to bring heavy fire to bear on the French-German alliance treaty when it comes up for discussion in the national assembly this week. But the Gaullists, who have an absolute majority in the House, will vote for it and ensure its approval.
