Woman kills her five children, husband, herself

PROSPECT, Pa. (UPI)—A 44-year-old housewife, despondent over ill health, turned her home into a bloodbath Monday, killing her husband and five young children with blasts from a 12-gauge shotgun before committing suicide.

State police said Mrs. Elizabeth Gregor, wife of a tractor salesman in this Western Pennsylvania farming community, killed the children, including 19-month-old twins, then telephoned her husband at work on the pretext that one of the children was ill.

When Joseph Gregor, 52, walked in the door of their home, she killed him and telephoned coroner Clinton Atwell to come to the house.

Before Atwell arrived with police, she apparently tied a string to the trigger of the shotgun and killed herself by pulling the string.

Atwell found Gregor's body by the front door and Mrs. Gregor's nearby. In another room, the bodies of Joseph Jr., 14; Thomas, 12; and Rosemary, 10, were found. The dead twins were found in their beds. The older children were Mrs. Gregor's by a previous marriage.

Police found a series of notes in the house which they said disclosed that Mrs. Gregor had been planning the slayings for some time.

Atwell said the shootings occurred shortly after Mrs. Gregor asked her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Carole Gregor, 19, to drive to nearby Butler, Pa., to obtain a prescription at a drug store.

Council buys new sweeper

PRINEVILLE — The city council, at its latest luncheon meeting, awarded the contract for a new street sweeper to Feenoughy Machine Co., at a price of \$10,630.

The city also accepted the same bids on gas and oil as had been accepted earlier by the Crook county school district and the county court. Joint purchasing results in a lower rate, it was stated.

Fred Stone, city building inspector, failed to appear at the luncheon meeting. It had been agreed by city councilmen at an earlier meeting that Stone should attend the meeting to discuss charges of lax inspection made by two local building contractors.

City recorder Francis Juris later said Stone had left Prineville for a two weeks' vacation and would appear before the council upon his return.

Prior to the meeting, councilmen took a field trip to inspect the former Union Hall, now used by the Boy Scouts, to study the heating problem raised by scout leaders.

REDMOND — Slaughter cows were steady, bulls higher and No. 1 market hogs 50 cents higher at the Redmond Auction Yard last week, according to the market report issued by County Agent Bob Sterling.

Standard slaughter steers brought 17.25 - 18.25; standard slaughter heifers, 18.20 - 19.80; utility, 17-18; commercial cows, 17.30 - 17.80; utility, 14-15.70, and canner - cutter, 9.20-13.80. Utility-commercial bulls sold for 18.50-22 and standard - good vealers, 27-29.50.

Baby calves sold by the head, beef and beef mixed bringing 45-67.50, and Holsteins, 32.50-47.50.

Choice calves, up to 400 pounds, brought 122.50 per head. Good-choice steers, 500-700 lbs., brought 22.30-23.50; common - medium, 400 - 700 lbs., 18-21; good - choice heifers, 500-700 lbs., 21-22.80.

Good - choice steer calves, 300-500 lbs., sold for 25.25-27; common - medium, 300-500 lbs., 22.75-23.80; good - choice heifer calves, 300 - 500 lbs., 23.80-24.50; common-medium, 250-500 lbs., by the head, 77-90. Medium - good pairs of cows and calves brought 172-220.

U.S. No. 1 and 2 market hogs, 180-220 lbs., went for 17.80-18 and weaner pigs, 8-11.50 each.

A total of 586, of which 280 were calves, went through the ring. There were 30 hogs and 15 sheep.

Her stand may mean tougher dividend action

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A strong-willed woman's stand on oil industry tax concessions has increased chances for tougher treatment of big corporation stockholders' dividends.

The oil and dividend issues were linked because of the position taken by Rep. Martha Griffiths, D-Mich., in the House Ways & Means Committee.

Mrs. Griffiths startled her committee colleagues last week by helping Republicans to defeat on a 14-11 vote a compromise version of President Kennedy's proposal that income from dividends be taxed at the same rate as income from wages and salaries.

She vowed later that she would not support any compromise on this issue if the oil industry were permitted to escape scot-free from the tougher tax treatment Kennedy had prescribed for it.

The action was taken as the committee worked behind closed doors on Kennedy's controversial program for revising the tax structure and cutting tax rates to provide a net reduction of \$10.4 billion in individual and corporation income taxes.

Reversing an earlier decision, the committee Monday afternoon agreed to levy an estimated \$50 million a year in new taxes on the oil and gas industry.

Estimated recent Treasury estimates of the impact Kennedy's recommendations would have had on the industry have run about \$300 million.

The committee's decision increased chances that Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., will now be able to persuade Mrs. Griffiths to go part-way with the administration in levying higher taxes on income from dividends.

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
