## Solution sought on timber assessments

**SALEM (UPI)**—State tax commissioners will meet with the Columbia and Lane County boards of equalization this week in an attempt to settle a battle over timber land assessments, they revealed today.

Tax Commissioner Fred Hoefke said the commissioners would go to St. Helens Thursday to meet with the Columbia County board. The Lane County board will meet with the tax commissioners here Friday.

Timber land assessments in Columbia, Lane, Benton, Linn and Washington counties were doubled earlier this year by the commission.

Lumber industry representatives and some county officials raised a storm of protest.

Linn and Washington counties accepted the new valuations, Benton County has not yet decided what it will do, and Columbia and Lane counties rejected the higher assessed values.

Hoefke said the commissioners wanted to meet with the boards of equalization from the two counties to "determine their basis for changing our assessments."

"If they had a good reason, we may accept it. If not, then we will issue supervisory orders demanding the county assessor to put back our values," he commented.

A series of public hearings on the controversial increase in timber land assessments has been postponed until after the Thursday and Friday meetings. They are expected to begin near the end of this month.

Federal foresters have also been alerted for increasing fire danger, despite a forecast which indicates slightly cooler weather tomorrow.

The Deschutes National Forest guard school opened last night at Saddle Lake, with some 60 trainees enrolled. Immediately following the school, the trainees will take their posts in the five districts of the Deschutes forest.

## Flier killed in crash near K.F.

**KLAMATH FALLS (UPI)**—The pilot of an F-101 Voodoo jet fighter-interceptor from Kingsley Field was killed when his plane crashed and burned 20 miles northeast of here Monday.

Killed was Capt. Harold H. Smith, 31, Pembroke, Mass. The radar observer, 1st Lt. Carl W. Singleton, 22, Cold Springs, Ky., parachuted to safety.

Smith's body was found about a quarter of a mile from the crash scene near the community of Sprague River.

Air Force officials said Smith may have bailed out too close to the ground for his parachute to open. Smith and Singleton radioed that they were parachuting from the disabled plane.

Singleton was picked up by searchers and taken to Kingsley Field. He suffered only minor cuts and was treated at the base dispensary.

Smith is survived by his widow, Rheta, and son, Mark, 2, who lived at Klamath Falls, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Smith of Pembroke.

A board of inquiry was called to investigate the cause of the crash.

## County budget board takes action on 1963-64 items

The Deschutes county budget board last night increased various allotments some \$7,000 over last week's figures, lopped off \$6,600 for new personnel requested by two departments, and set Monday evening, June 24, for its final meeting before the budget hearing.

The board doubled this year's figure for county buildings, to \$6,000, to provide for remodeling of the former coal bin, on the basement level of the courthouse for a meeting room or office space. One bid was submitted for the work, and appointive members asked that at least one more bid be obtained.

The board allowed \$3000 of the \$5000 requested by the County Fair Board, for repair of buildings at the Redmond fairgrounds. The court has appointed a committee of five men to work out the details. Named were Lowell Hirtzel and Gordon Robberson, Bend; Laddie Jordan and Don Rogers, Redmond, and Fred Shepard, representing the county court.

A \$3,500 item for county planning, tentatively approved at last week's meeting, was authorized.

The board allowed \$3800 for two new automobiles for the assessor's department, with two of the five in use to be traded in. Assessor Robert Lyons said that in view of this expense, he had taken a second look at his asking for \$1,000 for a clerk-typist, and felt that he could make do with the existing staff. The deletion was approved unanimously.

The revisions, along with items previously allowed, brings the assessor's budget to \$69,580, a decrease from \$73,160 this year. A new \$12,000 machine brought up last year's figure.

The sheriff's budget was increased \$400 from last week's figure to \$32,345, a \$2,110 drop from this past year. In spite of salary increases, the amount is lower because last year, \$3,350 was allowed for new cars.

The salary of Melvin Newhouse, third deputy in the sheriff's office, was increased to \$5200. Sheriff Forrest C. Sholes was present to ask that the amount be brought up to the \$5410 allowed last week for the other two deputies, Bob Young and Wendell Thompson. Last week, Newhouse had been given a three per cent raise, which brought the salary up to \$4900. He will have been with the department two years in August.

The sheriff's request for an additional deputy, for enforcement of the boat law and tax collection work, was denied, although Sholes made a strong plea for the personnel increase.

Board members expressed the opinion that enforcement of the boat law is more expensive than the revenue from the Marine Board justifies. Judge Penhollow and Commissioner Baker defended the lake patrol on the premise that if the sheriff's office doesn't do the work the state police will, thus weakening county government.

As a compromise, the board put in a token item of \$200, for boat law enforcement. Judge Penhollow said that the boat may as well be withdrawn from the lake patrol detail, and kept for emergency use in case of drownings or other disasters on lakes or rivers.

## Jobless among youth posing serious problem

Mounting unemployment, especially among the nation's young people, will be the number one sociological program facing America in the years ahead.

This prediction was made yesterday by George Gleeson, dean of engineering at Oregon State University, in a talk before the Bend Kiwanis Club.

The speaker called attention to the difficulty already faced in finding jobs for young people who terminate their education after high school and cited figures which indicated that the problem will continue to grow unless ways are found to increase the number of jobs available for this group.

Possible solutions, Gleeson suggested, would include elimination of the practice of "moonlighting," a prohibition on working a person more than 40 hours a week, retirement of workers who have reached the age of 70 and curtailment of women who move in and out of industry primarily to purchase extra items for their families.

Gleeson also called for a revision of the educational structure to provide better training for young people entering the labor market.

The speaker was introduced by R. G. McFarland, a Bend Kiwanian and long-time friend of Gleeson's.

## Shows hit U.S. South

Heavy showers soaked the Southeast today and summery air pushed northward into the Midwest.

The heaviest rainfall during the night occurred in the Southwest. More than two inches fell at Corpus Christi, Tex., Naval Air Station.

Earlier, more than four inches hit Laredo, Tex., and Morgan City, La., ran its 24-hour total to seven inches.

Showers dumped lesser amounts across the South from Texas to the Carolina coast. Rain also fell in North Dakota, Nevada, Wisconsin and Pennsylvania.

A 15-year-old boy swimming in the rain-swollen Palo Duro Creek near Canyon, Tex., was swept under by the raging current Monday and drowned.
