Road graded into Big Cultus

Grading of a road from the Cascade Lake Highway into Big Cultus Lake has been completed and the route, about two miles long, is now in general use, Corwin E. Hein, Deschutes National Forest engineer, reports.

The Forest Service completed the first unit of the new road, under a force account arrangement, and the last mile, into the lake, was graded by Jack Robinson, Bend.

The new road reaches into Cultus Lake from the Cow Camp area, on a gentle grade. The line of the new road is close to Cultus Creek.

Deschutes County is assisting in work on the road, and it is hoped to get a cinder covering in place later this season. Oiling of the short unit is planned for 1964.

With the new road to Big Cultus Lake and the resort now in use, the Forest Service has closed several of the older rugged approaches into the lake.

Five persons lost their lives in Oregon traffic accidents Monday.

An 8-year-old Salem girl, Diana Sue Selmar, was killed Monday night when she was struck by a car while riding a bicycle near her home in east Salem.

Mrs. Vivian Winifred Masiker, 56, Forest Grove, died about 6 p.m. when her car struck a bridge post near Yamhill.

Mrs. Charlotte Webberley, 35, Sutherlin, and Joe Reed, 20, Oakland, Ore., were killed in a two-vehicle, head-on collision on old U.S. Highway 99 about 10 miles north of Roseburg.

Mrs. Webberley was alone in her station wagon and Reed was alone in his car.

Terrence Culp, 19, Burns, was fatally injured when his motorcycle collided with a car near Burns. He died in a hospital.

Heavy fourist influx noted

PRINEVILLE — This city saw its heaviest tourist and recreation traffic last weekend for the season thus far, according to consensus of service station operators and merchants.

Despite the heavy traffic of cars towing boats and trailers and the crowded parks at the Ochoco and Prineville reservoirs, police chief Mike Thompson reported that no accidents had been reported in his office during the weekend.

A number of traffic citations were issued, however. Thompson stated that Nathan Puckett was arrested Saturday night on the charge of drunk driving, and jailed. Puckett, it was reported, inflicted some roadside damage with his car to property on McKay Road north of Prineville prior to his arrest.

Puckett was also cited as being a minor in possession of alcoholic beverage.

School heads hold session

SALEM (UPI)—A two-day conference of school superintendents from throughout Oregon was scheduled to end here today with discussion of new legislation affecting schools and the effect of school environment on learning.

More than 150 public and private school superintendents attended the conference at Willamette university. The State Department of Education is sponsoring the affair.

Highlights of Monday's sessions included discussion of administrative responsibilities in school planning and the impact of new educational techniques of school buildings.

Dr. Archibald B. Shaw, associate secretary of the American Association of School Administrators, pointed out proper administration "is the process of bringing together human and material resources most effectively and economically to achieve the desired goal."

He cited examples of how an architect should be selected, and how the architect and school officials should work together to design facilities feared to meet specific needs.

Charles W. Brubaker, a Chicago architect, present slide-lectures in which he described modern trends in school design and new construction and design techniques.

BLAZES DOUSED
