

Bolivia pulls from OAS

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Bolivia formally withdrew Monday from the 20-nation council of the Organization of American States (OAS) and called the withdrawal permanent.

Bolivian Ambassador Emilio Sarmiento said the action was prompted by the organization's failure to settle the long-standing dispute between Bolivia and Chile over a border river. It is the first time an OAS member has taken such a drastic step. Cuba was ousted from the OAS last year for its Communist ties.

Sarmiento said Bolivia would continue to participate in inter-American activities but that the chair in the OAS council here would be left vacant.

2 persons shot during holdup

PASCO, Wash. (UPI) — Two persons were shot during a holdup at the Lucky Dollar Food Center here Monday night and were taken to Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital for emergency surgery.

Hospital attendants said Mrs. Iva Galloway, 54, Burbank, was shot in the chest. Carl Thorpe, 52, Pasco, was shot in the arm. An unidentified bystander outside the store said he heard a shot and turned and ran. Then he said he heard a scream and two more shots. When he reached his car, the bystander said, he saw "a small, dark guy" in dark clothing run down an alley and across a street.

Commodities in cold storage are above average for 1957-61

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department's current cold storage report shows that commodities in refrigerated warehouses on June 1 totaled 4.9 billion pounds.

These supplies were 2 per cent below those on June 1, 1962, but 19 per cent larger than the June 1, 1957-61 average.

The department said orange concentrate holdings dropped 33 million gallons during May to 46 million. This decline was in contrast to a gain of 18 million gallons during May, 1962, and a five-year average gain of 8 million gallons for the month.

Frozen fruit stocks on June 1 totaled 270 million pounds, 11 per cent less than a year earlier and 4 per cent under average.

Frozen vegetable supplies on June 1 totaled 946 million pounds. A year ago the frozen vegetable supplies totaled 873 million pounds.

Butter in storage moved up 23 million pounds to a total of 380 million pounds. Of this amount, 331 million pounds were government stocks. Butter stocks a year earlier totaled 387 million pounds, of which 339 million were government-owned.

Cheese stocks on June 1 totaled 338 million pounds a gain of 21 million from the previous month.

Warehouse holdings of shell egg stocks were 218,000 cases. A year ago supplies were 319,000 cases. The average is 384,000 cases.

Frozen egg stocks were 83 million pounds on June 1, compared with 85 million a year earlier.

Frozen poultry supplies were 186 million pounds, 15 per cent less than a year earlier but 4 per cent above average. Turkey holdings were 97 million pounds, a decline of 20 million pounds dur-

JFK to visit Berlin wall

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy will make two stops at the Berlin wall during his visit to West Germany, the White House said today.

The White House also said Kennedy will hold a news conference in Bonn, West Germany, and will make no change in his plans to visit Italy, despite the deepening governmental crisis in Italy.

The President will leave here aboard his Air Force fan jet transport plane at 9:30 p.m. Saturday and arrive at 9:50 a.m., German time, at the Wahn Airport which serves Bonn and Cologne.

This will be the first leg of a ten-day trip which will include visits to Germany, Italy, Ireland, and a one-day stopover in England for talks with Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

Kennedy is scheduled to arrive back in Washington July 2.

Kennedy's inspection of the Berlin wall is expected to include a motor tour, plus stops at Brandenburg gate and at Checkpoint Charlie, the transit point between West Berlin and Communist East Berlin.

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Court hands JFK weapon to curb merger of banks

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court has handed the Kennedy administration its biggest antitrust victory — a means of stemming the recent wave of bank mergers.

In a landslide of opinions and orders ending the 1962-63 term, the court Monday approved the use of a 1950 amendment to the Clayton antitrust law in application to a bank merger.

The statute outlaws acquisitions "where in any line of commerce in any section of the country, the effect . . . may be substantially to lessen competition, or to tend to create a monopoly." Because of the wording of the law, the "acquisitions" can be bank stock only, not assets.

The 5-3 ruling strengthens the government's hand in cases already in court.

Affects Philly Merger

The test case concerned a merger of two huge Philadelphia banks, the Philadelphia National Bank and the Girard Trust Corn Exchange Bank.

The consolidation was part of a trend which saw more than 1,500 independent banks with combined resources of more than \$25 billion disappear in the decade ending in 1960.

The reasoning behind the administration's lawsuits to brake this movement is that commercial banks are the key to other business activity. They control loans, credit and commerce in general.

The more outlets there are, according to the government view, the more money will be available at advantageous interest rates.

Charge Antitrust Violation

The government also charged the Philadelphia banks with a violation of the Sherman antitrust law, which forbids combinations in restraint of trade.

Monday's majority opinion by Justice William J. Brennan Jr. did not even go into the Sherman Act aspects of the case because the decision turned wholly on application of the 1950 amendment.

Brennan said "there is no indication in the legislative history . . . that Congress wished to confer a special dispensation on the banking industry . . ."

In a case concerning the Sherman Act question, the court agreed to hear arguments next term on the legality of the merger of the First National Bank and Trust Company with the Security Trust Company in Lexington, Ky.

Hoover remains 'very serious'

NEW YORK (UPI) — Former President Herbert C. Hoover, suffering from anemia and intestinal bleeding, remained in "very serious" condition today at his home.

The 88-year-old Hoover was "sleeping most of the time" at his suite in the Waldorf Towers in Manhattan, according to a medical bulletin signed by four physicians Monday.

The statement, as tersely written as the one which disclosed Friday that Hoover was seriously ill, said he had shown slight improvement since Sunday "in that his fever is less and his heart action is more regular."

In the Friday bulletin, his doctors said he had been in serious condition for a week with gastro-intestinal tract.

The only persons being permitted to visit Hoover—aside from the teams of doctors and nurses attending him—were his two sons, Herbert Jr., and Allan.

The 31st President, who served in the White House from 1929 to 1933, was operated on for removal of a cancerous tumor in his intestinal tract last August. His doctors have given no indication that his present illness was related to the operation.
