

Oregon court rules ex-Red can be admitted to bar

SALEM (UPI)—The Oregon Supreme Court, by a 5-2 decision, ruled today that a former member of the Communist party could be admitted to the Oregon Bar.

The high court approved the application of Bernard Jolles of Portland for admission to the bar.

The State Board of Bar Examiners had recommended that his application be denied on the ground that he had failed to establish that he was a person of good moral character because of having been a member of the Communist party from 1949 to 1957.

Justice Kenneth J. O'Connell wrote the majority opinion.

Justice William C. Perry wrote a dissenting opinion in which Chief Justice William McCallister joined.

The high court concluded that Jolles is now free from Communist influences which distorted his moral judgment and that he is a person of good moral character.

The majority of the State Bar Board of Examiners found the evidence of his rehabilitation unconvincing.

The court said it concluded that Jolles' refusal to disclose the names of his former colleagues for fear that it would harm them was sincere and that it should not be used as a basis for denying him the privilege of practicing law.

The high court noted that Jolles voluntarily disclosed his past membership in the Communist party when he made application to take the bar examination.

SALEM (UPI)—The Oregon Supreme Court today affirmed a judgment of Multnomah County Circuit Judge Alan F. Davis requiring the Board of Medical Examiners to issue to Dr. William R. Cusick a license to practice osteopathy and surgery.

Dr. Cusick's license lapsed for failure to pay for 1960 license fee. He said he was ill in Mexico, and that his mail was not forwarded.

ed. The board has refused to reinstate him.

A \$9,485 award arising out of a collision between an auto and two heifers on a public highway, approved by the Jackson County Circuit Court of Judge James M. Main, was reversed and remanded by the high court.

Raymond R. Reter appealed the award to Junior Lee Parker.

The accident occurred in a closed range district where cattle are prohibited from running at large.

The high court found that Reter did not violate the statute because he did not "permit" the cattle to break out of a barn and run onto the highway.

He was Terrence Culp, resident of Burns. He was lead guitar player with "The Weirsmen" who have appeared in Bend, at the Domino, on a number of occasions, and were to play here again this Friday.

The youth, 19, died when his cycle struck the side of an automobile as it was making a turn, investigating officers said.
