

Hatfield opposes tax move, favors Constitution plan

SALEM (UPI)—Opposition to a referral of the 1963 legislature's tax increase measure, and strong support for a planned initiative

movement for a new state constitution was voiced today by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

He said he hoped the public would not support the tax increase referral.

"I do not think it is wise because in all probability it would necessitate a special session of the legislature," he said.

"I think the recent 141-day session was enough. The legislature has already demonstrated that this is the best bill that they could come up with."

Hatfield added: "If they couldn't draft an acceptable package in 141 days, you can't expect more of the legislature in a special session."

A preliminary petition to refer the tax measure was filed with the secretary of state Monday by J. Francyl Howard, editor and publisher of weekly newspapers at Albany and Corvallis.

On the question of a new constitution, Hatfield termed the planned initiative movement "an excellent idea."

"I regret that the people are forced to take this action because of the Senate's failure to refer the new constitution to the people for a vote," he said.

During the recent legislative session, the proposed new state constitution won approval in the House, but failed by three votes of receiving the two-thirds majority it needed in the Senate.

Timber goes to Tite Knot

A five-cent raise on the pine won for Tite Knot Pine Mill, Redmond, 25,100,000 board feet of timber in the Prairie Farm area of the Metolius district at an auction Tuesday afternoon in Bend, in the Deschutes National Forest office.

Tite Knot, represented by Phil Dahl, and Brooks - Scanlon, Inc., represented by Hans Milius, entered sealed bids for the big stand of timber, at the minimum acceptable price, \$273,045. Tite Knot, in the auction that followed the bid opening submitted a five cent raise for the pine. That ended the bidding.

Total price paid for the stumpage by the Redmond firm was \$273,460.

The stand, near the northern end of Green Ridge east of the Metolius River, holds some 8,300,000 board feet of pine, of various species; 14,000,000 board feet of Douglas fir and larch, and 2,800,000 board feet of white fir and other species.

The minimum acceptable bid for pine was set at \$20.55 per thousand, fir, \$6.35, and white fir and other species, \$4.85. The timber covers approximately 3,600 acres, and will be milled in Redmond.

This sale was the largest on the Deschutes National Forest this year.
