

Bevos' bonus baby Santiago nursery's best?

In a year when the Pacific Coast League has a nursery full of bonus baby hurlers, the best prospect of all may be Portland's Jose Santiago, who signed for just a cup of coffee.

Santiago, 23, is the kind of rubber-armed hurler that every manager dreams of. He has already compiled a 17-5 record this year—if you count his 16-2 back home in the Puerto Rico Winter League.

He's 7-3 at Portland after stopping Seattle on five hits Tuesday night.

The Beavers, trying to climb in the rugged northern division of the Pacific Coast League, needed the 5-1 win just to stay even.

Grand Salm

First-place Tacoma crashed in on a first-inning grand slam homer by Richard Joseph and went on to a 6-3 win over San Diego.

Spokane stayed 2½ games back with a comeback 3-2 win over Salt Lake City. Portland is a half-game behind the Indians.

In the southern division, the race is as scrambled as your breakfast e.g.g. Oklahoma City climbed to within a half-game of first-place with a 9-7 comedy of errors over Denver, while Hawaii dispatched the leading Dallas-Fort Worth Rangers, 5-3. San Diego is more or less tied with Oklahoma City, also a half-game off the pace.

Santiago, who has averaged better than 200 strikeouts a year in the past three seasons, is going to his curve more this year. He fanned five Tuesday night to run his season's total to 69.

Green Homers

Portland broke open the game with four runs in the sixth inning. Hector Martinez got on by error, Bill Kern tripled, Ron Debus singled, and Dick Green Joseph's big belt at Tacoma enabled Danny Ruas to pick up whacked a homer.

The Padres had the bags jammed in the ninth with two out when Wayne Schurr came in and fanned long ball hitting Deron Johnson to end the contest.

The Oklahoma City-Denver contest was played after a rain at Denver. The 9ers piled across four runs in the eighth thanks to a miscue by Denver outfielder Ethan Blackaby, who fell twice on the soggy turf while trying to trap a routine-looking fly.

Gordon Jones picked up the win in relief, while Clay Carroll relieved Denver workhorse Chi Chi Olivo during the wild eighth and was the loser.

Corky Withrow of Denver had a two-run homer in the first which was nullified by Boer Jim Mahoney's two-run belt in the second.

Islander Ace Ed Thomas hurled his ninth complete game and picked up his seventh win.

Absence of Mantle not hurting Maris' hitting performance

It's a 5-1 Roger Maris again today in the New York Yankee clubhouse and around the American League.

Because the man who set the all-time mark of 61 homers in a season in 1961 only to be one of the disappointments of the 1962 campaign is proving that he does not need Mickey Mantle to soften up pitchers for him. In short, that he, too, can be a leader.

The experts questioned that last year when Maris failed to hit while Mantle was out of the lineup and they chortled that it would happen again this season when Mickey suffered a broken bone in his left foot which will sideline him until sometime next month.

It's a wonderful theory for those who hope this will be one of those rare years in which the Yankees do not win the American League pennant but it's being drowned out by the thunder of Maris' bat.

The Yankees have reeled off five straight victories and it's no coincidence that Maris has weloped away at a .500 clip during those five games. The 9-for-18 splurge has lifted his season average to .289 and he's connected for 11 homers and driven in 21 runs.

Maris made it easy for Whitey Ford to post his ninth win of the season Tuesday night when he hit two homers and a single in the Yankees' 10-5 triumph over the Washington Senators. Tom Tresh and Tony Kubek also homered and Hector Lopez had a triple as the Yankees moved a full game ahead of the Chicago White Sox, who lost to the Minnesota Twins, 5-3.

The Cleveland Indians defeated the Baltimore Orioles, 7-3, the Boston Red Sox routed the Detroit Tigers, 9-0, and the Los Angeles Angels scored an 11-inning, 2-1 victory over the Kansas City Athletics in other AL games.

In the National League the St. Louis Cardinals topped the New York Mets, 6-2, the San Francisco Giants drubbed the Los Angeles Dodgers, 9-3, the Cincinnati Reds shaded the Philadelphia Phillies, 2-1, the Milwaukee Braves defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-5, and the Chicago Cubs nipped the Houston Colts, 3-1.

Harmon Killebrew's 11th homer of the season helped the Twins drop the White Sox a full game behind the Yankees. Jim Perry pitched eight-hit ball for seven innings and Bill Dailey closed it out with two strong relief innings. Joel Horlen suffered his second defeat against four wins for the White Sox.

Barry Latman pitched a five-hitter and contributed a two-run double to an attack that carried the Indians to their sixth straight victory and their 16th in their last 18 games. Latman struck out 10 en route to his third win. Willie Kirkland homered for the Indians and Jim Gentile connected for the Orioles.

The Red Sox spoiled Charlie Dressen's debut as manager of the Tigers as Earl Wilson pitched a four-hitter and homers by Eddie Bressoud and Dick Stuart paced Boston's late-inning attack. It was the eighth straight loss for the Tigers, playing their first game under Dressen after Bob Scheffing was fired.

A wild pitch with the bases filled by John Wyatt enabled the Angels to score the winning run against the Athletics in the 11th inning. Ken McBride pitched a three-hitter and struck out seven in going the distance to win his seventh game against six losses.

PIRATES LOSE CATCHER

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Catcher Jim Paganlioni of the Pittsburgh Pirates will be out of action for several days with a fractured bone in the tip of his ring finger on the right hand. This leaves the Pirates with only one healthy catcher, Ron Brandt, since Smokey Burgess received a bruised right hand on Sunday.

B. Geraghty dies Tuesday

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI) — Ben Geraghty, who won fame as one of the minor league's most successful baseball managers, died early Tuesday of a heart attack. He was 50.

Geraghty is best remembered in the Pacific Northwest as one of six survivors of a bus crash on Snoqualmie Pass Highway in 1946 in which nine other members of the Spokane's Western International League ball club died.

Among the dead were Mel Cole, manager of the team, and Geraghty, when he recovered from head injuries, took over the reins of the club and in 1947 led it to within a few percentage points of the pennant and a new attendance mark of 280,000.

At the time of his death he was manager of the Jacksonville Suns of the International League.
