

WSU grapple captain former 'Cat matman

Not too many weeks ago we mentioned that Mikel Harrington, a Washington State University student in veterinary medicine from rural Bend, had been elected captain of the 1963-1964 Cougar wrestling team.

We also mentioned that Harrington was a former Lava Bear. Harrington wrestled for Redmond Union High School, not Bend. The truth of the matter is the Harrington family lives in that particular area on the north outer fringe of Bend that bears a Bend address but which lies within the Redmond School District.

Via phone call, Harrington himself informed me (then only a resident of the area for less than two months) of this situation. Upon further investigation, it was revealed that this is not 100 per

cent true. The Harrington home is sometimes listed as a Redmond residence. The city directory for Bend and Central Oregon published by the R. L. Polk Co., lists it as RD 1, Box 600, Redmond.

Pacific Northwest Bell's phone book, however, lists it as Deschutes Road, Bend.

At any rate, Harrington wrestled for the Panthers and not the Lava Bears. This much, apparently, is true, and my apologies to the Redmond School District, and especially to grappler Harrington.

We had made the Lava Bear assumption from a news release from WSU that mentioned Harrington as being from Bend.

This Harrington matter has one more element that is a surprise to this end, I, myself, ran across Harrington in Pullman through a friend of mine that bears the same family name.

At the time we chatted, and I mentioned that I was soon moving to Bend. Not once in our conversation, however, do I recall anything mentioned about which high school he wrestled for. The fact of the matter at the time was the following ironic situation: we both wrestled or had wrestled collegiately, and that he was a former resident of Bend and I was to be one shortly.

Dressen seeks ways to stop Detroit dive

Charley Dressen promises to think of something soon and it had better be real soon, like right now, before Carl Yastrzemski drives the Detroit Tigers clear out of the American League.

Yastrzemski is the Tigers' single-handedly, a fact Dressen has become painfully aware of even though he has managed them in only two games.

The tail-spinning Tigers have dropped both those games, extending their losing streak to nine games, and you can bet all the beans in Boston that Charley is going to have a heart-to-heart talk with his pitchers before they face the Red Sox again today.

Most of the conversation will center around Yastrzemski, who ruined Dressen's debut by driving in two runs on two hits Tuesday night and really went to town Wednesday night with two homers, three hits and four RBIs in Boston's 9-2 victory over the Red Sox.

Randall clobbers Leico nine, 18-3

If Bend's Little League play is plagued with lop-sided victories, the same thing follows for the Rookie Leaguers.

After four and a half innings last night a Rookie League contest was called when Gordon Randall's basebatters held an 18-3 advantage over the Leico Rockies.

There were no bad innings for the Randall nine. Randall scored six runs in the first, four in the second, two in the third, and six once again in the fourth.

Leico had trouble getting off the ground, and it wasn't until the fourth frame, that it could push across a tally. When Leico did get going, it picked up three.

With the exception of the first inning, wherein they teed off on the baseball as if it were sitting on a golden pedestal, Randall batters got aboard the bases most of the time via the four ball route.

Whenever a Leico tosser would hurl a fat pitch, however it was slapped for extra bases more often than for singles. Leico's scoring was enabled by two base hits (one a double) plus two walks.

CORVALLIS (UPI) — World record holder C. K. Yang of UCLA and 15 other hopefuls had joined the field through Wednesday for the National AAU Decathlon Championships June 28-29, but there was some doubt about Yang's physical condition.

The husky Formosan has been bothered by torn rib cartilage and was forced to pass up the pole vault event in the National Collegiate championships at Albuquerque, N.M., last weekend.

Other entries so far include those of Pat. Paul Herman, former Westmont College standout who collected more than 8,000 points in the meet in which Yang set his world record of 9,121, and Steve Pauly of Oregon State.

Dave Edstrom, former Oregon athlete now at Oxnard Air Force Base, also is entered.
