

### Queen Frederika may be behind Caramanlis downfall

Just as fictional detectives are advised to seek out the woman in the case, some political sleuths thought they had found her this week in the background of the downfall of Greek Premier Constantine Caramanlis.

Although King Paul had served as head man, they decided, the woman in the case, and the cause of it all, was headstrong Queen Frederika.

The reason seemed petty, certainly not enough to bring down a government which in eight years had brought both stability and a measure of prosperity to Greece.

Ostensibly it was King Paul's determination to carry out a scheduled July state visit to Great Britain against the advice of his 56-year-old premier.

But the word was that the king merely was acting in support of his pretty queen who remained undaunted by the fact that on her last visit to Britain in April left-wing demonstrators had put her

into undignified flight down a Mayfair Street.

Queen Frederika, born a German but determinedly Greek since her marriage long has been a figure of both praise and blame.

She won the affection of Greeks with her work among Greek children during the Greek civil war, once disobeying military orders against entering a contested village where she had heard guerillas were holding a group of children. She entered the village alone despite enemy gunfire.

But she also won the enmity of Greek ministers who resented her intrusions into politics and her clearly held opinion that frequently she knew better than they.

But the crisis which brought down the Caramanlis government had more to it than a question of social amenities.

In fact there was reason to believe that Caramanlis himself had invited the dispute as a reason to resign and force the country into elections.

#### Premier Under Fire

In his own country Caramanlis long has been under fire from liberals and leftists on charges that he rigged the 1961 elections.

Outside Greece, Communist propaganda has maintained a drumbeat of charges that Greece is one of three remaining Fascist countries in Europe.

Both Caramanlis and the royal family have been under mounting leftwing criticism for the 1,000 or so political prisoners remaining in Greek jails 15 years after the successful fight against the Reds in the Greek civil war.

It was upon this issue that left-wingers and ban-the-bomb followers of Bertrand Russell put Frederika to panicky flight last April.

#### Deals From Strength

As for himself, Caramanlis is dealing from a position of strength.

His national Radical Union Party controls 180 of the 300 seats in Parliament, making it impossible to form a new government without his permission.

He remains one of the most popular politicians in Greece and can look forward confidently to popular endorsement of his policies in new elections.

Out of the present shakeup seemingly can come two results. Queen Frederika will get permission to make the state visit to Britain. And Caramanlis will be able to stifle his critics through a new mandate.

### Pittman says dropping CD could result in tragedy

PORTLAND (UPI) — Federal Civil Defense Director Stewart L. Pittman, who has said Portland's decision to drop civil defense could mean "tragic consequences," was to meet informally with the City Council this afternoon.

Pittman also was to speak to the City Club, and meet with Warne Nunn, aide to Gov. Mark Hatfield, while in Oregon.

The City Council recently voted to cut out Civil Defense funds. So did Multnomah County.

Pittman has said abandoning of the CD agency could mean "tragic consequences" for the people of Portland if a nuclear attack ever occurred.

The legislature also cut back Civil Defense funds, reducing the state's agency from 18 to 3 members. Pittman's talk with Nunn presumably was to be on whether the state might still qualify for some federal help.

Gov. Mark Hatfield said earlier this week he was not optimistic.

Meanwhile, Deschutes County has voted to do away with its Civil Defense program after June 30.

PORTLAND (UPI) — A former Hungarian finance minister said Thursday that if the Portland City Council did not receive "Divine guidance" in abolishing Civil Defense "they have done a very foolish thing."

Dr. Nicholas Nyaradi, who left Hungary in 1948, said Civil Defense saved hundreds of thousands of lives in Budapest during World War II when the city was frequently bombed.

"We had 100,000 casualties, but

if we hadn't had an adequate Civil Defense program the casualties would have been 500,000," he said.

Dr. Nyaradi, who is director of the School of International Studies at Bradley University in Peoria, Ill., was here to speak to the Pacific Northwest Conference of Certified Public Accountants.

### Guard rail installed up Lava Butte

Work on a guard rail along the outer edge of the spiral road leading to the summit of Lava Butte, ten miles south of Bend, is nearing completion, with J. C. Denton and Sons, Beaverton contractors, in charge.

The protective rails will extend over a distance of about one mile, from the parking area at the top of the 500-foot high butte to the level area in the lava beds at the base.

This is a U.S. Forest Service project, with George Cook, resident engineer in the Bend headquarters office, in charge.

Posts for the rails are being placed in the cinders at the outer edge of the road that spirals up the butte. The protective fence will be about two feet high.

Lack of guard rails on the narrow road up the cinder butte has caused considerable concern for tourists, Forest Service people have noted. In the past, some of the most timid passengers on cars have preferred to walk.

Despite the narrowness of the road and its winding character, no major accidents have ever occurred on the butte. However, several years ago a car missed a curve and rolled down the steep slope, but without injury to occupants.

Lava Butte is the location of one of the major U.S. Forest Service viewpoints in the North Pacific district.

### Cigarette firms may be forced to modify appeals on television

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — There are strong indications that cigarette commercials on television will be under increasing pressure in the future to modify their sales pitches at youngsters about the glamor of smoking.

It is not impossible that action, either voluntary or otherwise, may result in a shift of emphasis of these commercials — perhaps as a precautionary advertising step with sound public relations value, especially if medical evidence should mount in a way to make any other decision appear unfavorable.

In the not too distant past, "CBS Reports" shook the multi-million-dollar cigarette advertising accounts of television with a study of the smoking hassle. And Leroy Collins, president of the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB), caused a furor last fall when he criticized cigarette commercials aimed at youngsters and said flatly there is mounting evidence that cigarette smoking posed "a serious hazard to health."

Collins, it might be noted, is a pretty forward-looking fellow, having warned his broadcasting colleagues about the ratings mess well in advance of the time that it came fully to public light before a congressional investigative body this year.

All of this is of particular interest not only to youngsters, but to parents, because it is no secret that the coming video schedules for the new season are aimed more than ever at capturing the increasing financial power of teen-agers.

Earlier this month, an article in the journal of the American Academy of Pediatrics by Dr. Samuel Wishik, of the University of Pittsburgh School of Health, charged the Madison Avenue wizards with making smoking seem related to sex appeal.

"There is no doubt that 'Madison Avenue' has a heavy hand in it," the article said, warning of possible government heat unless something is done. "Cigarette advertising nowadays, especially on television, plays up the two elements of sex and maturity to sell its product. Smoking by young people is glamorized, made to seem sexually attractive, and in the male equated with virility."

### Coastal areas suffer outages

PORTLAND (UPI) — Central Oregon coastal areas suffered power outages around noon Thursday when a defective fuse on a transformer bank at the Bonneville Power Administration substation at Florence arced to the ground. The outages ranged from 27 to 38 minutes.

The fuse failure disrupted service to the coast from the Eugene-Reedsport 115,000 volt transmission line, cutting off power to Fern Ridge, Walton, Mapleton and Florence. Rural areas serviced from these points of delivery were also without power.
