

Lelco Rookies finally win

er tosser, who began walking batters. Lelco hit the ball, too, and the resulting seven tallies were more than enough to break the back of the Roofers. The Roofers, however, still had enough to add two more in the top of the fourth, but Lelco came right back to add two to its scoring meld.

An eleventh hour rally by the Roofers in the top of the sixth was not enough. The Roofers scored three but still fell three short of the Lelco score.

Early Wynn will attempt to gain 300th

Early Wynn didn't win his 300th but he did win the right to try again.

"It's entirely up to him when he'll pitch again," said Cleveland manager Birdie Tebbetts after the 43-year-old veteran lost a 2-0 heartbreaker Friday night to his former Chicago White Sox teammates.

"He pitched a remarkable game, all things considered," Tebbetts added. "I'd like him to go again as soon as possible. I don't want him to lose his sharpness."

Outwardly calm but inwardly crushed after failing to notch his 300th victory in his initial comeback try, Wynn quipped "it isn't the end of the world, gents," even if it must have felt like it to him.

Signed Three Weeks Ago
The veteran right-hander, signed by the Indians three weeks ago after being cut loose by the White Sox last fall and failing to regain a berth with them this spring, puffed and perspired through a scoreless eighth-inning duel with Juan Pizarro Friday night.

Wynn held the White Sox to six hits until Floyd Robinson opened the ninth with his third single of the game and moved around to third on a passed ball and a sacrifice.

Calling on all his craftiness, Wynn then made Dave Nicholson his fifth strikeout victim of the game but Ron Hansen followed with a home run over the left field fence for the only runs of the contest.

It marked the fourth time Wynn had been frustrated in his effort to become the 14th pitcher in major league history to win 300 games. He tried three times in vain with the White Sox last season and had remained in training four months for Friday night's effort.

The victory boosted the second-place White Sox one game behind the league-leading New York Yankees, whose seven-game winning streak was snapped by the Boston Red Sox 7-4.

Ends Losing Streak
Detroit ended its 10-game losing streak and posted its first victory under new manager Charley Dressen with a 6-4 decision over Kansas City, Minnesota took the first game of a two-nighter from Baltimore 5-2, but lost the nightcap 10-2, and the Los Angeles Angels shaded the Washington Senators 1-0.

In the National League, the Los Angeles Dodgers downed the St. Louis Cardinals 5-3, the Cincinnati Reds shut out the Houston Colts 3-0, the Milwaukee Braves defeated the San Francisco Giants 6-3, the New York Mets beat the Philadelphia Phillies 3-1, and the Chicago Cubs edged the Pittsburgh Pirates 6-5 in 10 innings.

Frank Malzone boosted his batting mark to .343 when he collected two hits and drove in three runs for the Red Sox in their victory over the Yankees. Dick Stuart also aided Bill Monbouquette to his 10th triumph by driving in three runs on two hits.

Aguires Needs Help
Southpaw Hank Aguirre put an end to the Tigers' backslide although he needed help from Bill Fawcett and Tom Sturdivant. The victory was the Tigers' first since June 10 and they clinched it with a four-run rally in the fifth.

The Twins garnered only four hits off loser El Delock and Dean Stone in their opener with the Orioles but three of the

blows were homers. Harmon Killebrew hit his 14th homer in the fourth inning with the bases empty and Bob Allison connected for his 17th with one on in the seventh. Jimmie Hall also homered with one on in the sixth as Lee Stange gained his first victory.

Robin Roberts stopped the Twins on eight hits in the nightcap, which also was decided by homers. Only this time the Orioles hit them, with Bob Johnson, Al Smith and Russ Snyder each connecting.

Dean Chance and Julio Navarro collaborated on a four-hit effort for the Angels that extended the Senators' losing streak to nine games. Two singles and Bob Perry's sacrifice fly produced the only run of the game in the sixth inning.

Big 6 finishes annual confab; no big changes

CARMEL, Calif. (UPI) — Big Six officials concluded their spring meeting today without making any historic decisions, but with a surprising showing of unity.

Just about everything was "unanimous" when it came to voting and there was no friction on anything.

The leaders even agreed that they would support the United States Track and Field Federation 100 per cent in its battle for control of amateur athletics with the national A.A.U.

"We are behind all the federations strongly," said retiring President Dr. Bradford Booth.

The other federations tangling with the august Amateur Athletic Union are in baseball, basketball and gymnastics.

The council even agreed that Oregon and Oregon State are "making progress" in bringing their educational standards up to the level of those at Big Six schools—and thus some day may be eligible for admittance, if they want it.

At the closing session Friday, Dr. Rixford Snyder of Stanford was named the council president. Stan Bates, Washington State athletic director, was named secretary. And Pete Newell, California athletic director, was re-elected to a two-year term as treasurer.

Among the items approved during the four days of sessions, was a petition to the NCAA asking it to use a regional blackout when a college football game is being televised nationally.

The Big Six also wants all its schools to enter a team in every conference sport. Most of them do. However, Washington and Washington State don't have water polo teams. And Southern California does not have a wrestling team.

Five of the six clubs have crew as a sport. But nobody suggested building a lake for the inland city of Pullman, Wash., so that the Cougars could join the crew fun.

Spokane pitcher Howie Reed was thinking today how he'd like to follow former teammate Nick Willitte to a warmer climate down South—say in the vicinity of Dodger Stadium, Los Angeles.

The 26-year-old right-hander won his eleventh game for the Dodgers farm club Friday night. He blanked the normally heavy hitting San Diego Padres 2-0 in three hits. Reed has lost four times.

A former Padre, Reed has been up three times with the Kansas City Athletics of the American League. He had his best season in organized ball last year when he won 12 and lost 8 with Spokane.

Lowest ERA
