Bob Hayes sets world 100 dash mark

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—The United States qualified athletes today for competition against Russia, including speedy Bob Hayes who broke the world's record for the 100-yard dash in the 75th annual National AAU Track and Field championships.

Hayes, who plays football almost as well as he runs, and he runs pretty fast, turned in a blistering 0:09.1 last night to lead qualifiers on the American team which will be completed with the second day running of 12 final events.

Seven final events were completed Friday. Hayes, a Florida A&M sprinter, and a halfback on his school's football team, has bypassed a possible career on the gridiron in order to concentrate on the 1964 Olympics.

The competition saw Brian Sternberg, world record holder in the pole vault, shatter a meet record by clearing the bar at 16 feet 4 inches, four inches shorter than his world mark.

Hayes Jones, the Detroit school teacher, regained his 120-yard high hurdles title by equaling the meet record of 0:13.4. This was his fourth national AAU crown, having won in 1958, 1960 and 1961.

Pete McArdle, second last year, won the six-mile run in 23:29.2.

The 33-year-old bus mechanic from New York City is the Pan-American games 10,000-meter champion.

Dave Davis of the U.S. Marines dethroned defender Gary Gubner of the Grand Street Boys Club, New York, in the shot put with a toss of 62 feet 5 1/2 inches. Gubner, who gets married Sunday in New York, had to settle for third at 60 feet 8 1/2 inches while Parry O'Brien, once the kingpin of the event, was runnerup with 62 feet 1 1/2 inches.

Larry Stuart of the Southern California Striders won the javelin with a throw of 255 feet 3 inches and teammate Ralph Boston made it three-in-a-row in the broadjump with a leap of 26 feet 10 inches.

The Striders piled up 44 points towards the team crown while the defending New York A.C. was far to the rear in fourth place with 11.

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Former Beaver broad jumps for AAU second

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—Former Oregon State star Darrell Horn won 26-4 to finish second in the broad jump in the national AAU track meet Friday.

Ralph Boston won the event in 26-10.

Gary Stenlund of Oregon State was sixth in the javelin with a throw of 239-11 1/2. Southern California's Larry Stuart won with 255-3.

Glenn Winningham, ex-Grants Pass High School standout, was fourth in the javelin in 238-6 1/2.

Oregon State's Morgan Groth and Norm Hoffman gained the 200-yard run finals by winning their heats in 1:50.0 and 1:51.4, respectively.

Former Oregon stars Dyrrol Burleson and Jim Grelle ran first and third in their heat to gain the finals for the mile run. Their clockings were 4:10.3 and 4:10.7, respectively.

Finals in the remaining events of the two-day meet were held today. Oregon's Paul Stuber and Terry Llewellyn were entered in the high jump.

Fiery Bend softballers hand Klamath Falls first defeat

Klamath Falls' dynamic men's softball team lost its first game of the season last night at Bend's municipal ballpark, as fired-up Bend squad took the Klamath measure, 2-1 in five frames.

Bend's victory came in the nightcap of a double bill, after dropping the opener 1-0 in 10 innings. Bend chucker Roger Skeen pitched a no-hitter but committed the team's only error in the 10th on an overthrow at first, enabling the visitors to cross the plate with the game's only tally.

U.S. Open facts Fraley says rough to be remembered

BROOKLINE, Mass. (UPI)—Fearless Fraley's fairway facts and figures from the U.S. Open golf championship:

The thing they'll all remember most about this one is rough which is a cross between barbed wire and quicksand and typical of the woes it caused was the case of Mason Rudolph on the first hole.

The strong young pro from Clarksville, Tenn., knocked his drive into the rough and needed three swings to get it back on the fairway. His five iron first moved it 25 yards, still in the rough. His seven iron second sent the ball 35 yards, and still in the rough. So he took a sand wedge, finally banged it out on the fairway, and settled for a fat seven.

"The only thing you can do is tee it high, let it fly—and pray," Rudolph said.

Chases Slow Players

Most rounds required five hours or more, which sent Joe Dey, executive secretary of the PGA scurrying to warn the "slow" players.

"You can't hit it," was Tony Lema's reply, "until you find it."

Mike Souchak carried it even farther than Lema.

"Even after you find it, you're likely to lose it," said Big Mike. "On one hole we finally found my ball. I spread the grass and was able to identify that it was my ball. But then, after I went to get a club, I couldn't find the spot again. So the hunt started all over."

Even after they found it a second time, when Mike took his stance he still couldn't see the ball.

"I just whacked away at about where I thought it was," he grimaced, "and managed to knock it out a few feet where the grass wasn't quite so deep."

Give Up Search

How, you might ask, can a threesome with a gallery of 3,000 and 40 marshals lose a ball. Well, Deane Beman, the former amateur champion, was playing with Lema and Sam Snead when he knocked a ball about 15 yards off the fairway on the 18th hole. They spent 15 minutes looking for it a scene reminiscent of a berry hunt, and finally had to give up.

Lema, who earned his nickname of "Champagne Tony" by hosting thirsty newspapermen after each victory, was well up in contention with a two-round total of 145 but the rough really had him worried.

"I'll tell you fellows," he said, "if I get into this stuff much more you're going to have to settle for Seven Up on what I'll be winning."

Bend, Portland crew to try doubleheader today
