

# Labor unions, school board rapped on bias

PORTLAND (UPI)—Negro leaders accused labor unions, the Portland Housing Authority and the Portland School Board of contributing to racial difficulties Sunday.

The criticism came at a rally after some 400 persons marched through the city's predominantly Negro Albina district in a memorial parade for slain Mississippi integration leader Medgar Evers. About 30 per cent of the marchers were non-Negro.

Labor unions were described as "the biggest single source of discrimination in Portland."

Mayfield Webb, president of the Oregon chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said "major event" would take place in the labor field in the next few weeks.

He said the "event" would affect all unions because Negroes were tired of what he called delaying tactics. He would not elaborate beyond that.

The housing authority drew Negro fire for its plan to build a federal low-cost housing development in the Albina district. Webb called it a "ghetto housing project."

Racial imbalance in several Portland schools was the cause of Negro leaders' criticism of the school board.

The marchers were not heckled as they moved quietly along the parade route. Most were well-dressed and many carried signs and wore black armbands. There were few spectators.

# Ex-Vale griddler crash victim

The accident occurred early Sunday as the Chester car was turning into the parking lot of a Caldwell tavern.

They were Mrs. Doris Colgan, 49, Monmouth; Esther Sandoval, 17, and her sister, Rose, 16, of Independence, and Sadie Peden, 16, Independence. Other weekend victims were Leonard Wise, 27, Heppner, and Mrs. Willoughby Blowers, 55, Creswell.

Three persons were killed in southwest Washington accidents. Kay Payne, 18, and Duane Fitzpatrick, 19, both of Longview, died Saturday when their car went over a 250-foot embankment east of Kelso. Orville J. Hushagen, 61, Kalama, died late Sunday night when he was struck by a car as he walked across a road two miles south of Kalama.

# Old dam to be dynamited out of existence

SPOKANE (UPI)—The Washington Water Power Co. announced Sunday it plans to dynamite a dam out of the south fork of the Clearwater River in Idaho.

Company officials said Grangeville Dam, one of the oldest hydroelectric projects, will be blown out sometime next month.

The dam is being removed in cooperation with a steelhead restoration project of the Idaho Fish and Game Department.

John R. Woodworth, department director, said restoration of the steelhead runs will continue for at least five years. Fishways at the dam were destroyed by high water in 1949 and were not replaced.

George Brunzell, WWP president, said the dynamiting of the dam will be a "first" for both fish and game administrators and utility executives.

"To the best of my knowledge, an operating power plant has never been removed in the interest of a fisheries program," he said.

Brunzell said the age of the dam and the obsolescence of its equipment made its removal practical. The dam was put in service in 1911 and WWP took it over in 1937 from the Chelan Electric Co.
