## Objections to road are voiced

PORTLAND (UPI)—Objections to a proposed road for logging operations in the Minam River area of the Willowa Mountains have been voiced at a U.S. Forest Service hearing here.

The Forest Service presented revised proposals for the Minam River Watershed at a hearing Friday, explaining that they were offered to sound out public opinion and that a firm program would be offered this fall.

J. Herbert Stone, regional forester, said the revised proposal included an increase of 11,225 acres to the Eagle Cap Wilderness area; a recreation area of about 23,000 acres on both sides of the lower reaches of the Minam River in the Whitman and Willowa National Forests, with timber harvesting on a selective basis, and a multiple use road running five miles down the Little Minam River to Boulder Creek. The road eventually would extend into the main Minam River recreation area.

A spokesman for the Save the Minam, Inc., said his group opposed a road into the Little Minam watershed.

George Reid of Baker, president of the Oregon Wildlife Federation, said his clubs had voted unanimously to include all of the Minam in a wilderness area attached to Eagle Cap.

## Mikels film well received; another thespian touring

Local area residents who viewed Ted Mikels' full length film, "Crosshair," at its Oregon preview recently in Bend, got an eye-full of spectacular Central Oregon scenery, and recognized some familiar faces.

Aside from being exhausted from participating vicariously in the villain's dogged pursuit of the hero — across trestles, in and out of a cave, over lava beds and across a river — this viewer was thoroughly entertained.

The scenery alone familiar, but presented as it was — as a montage representing a hypothetical area much smaller than the shooting locales — it was not immediately recognized, except by dyed-in-the-wool outdoor enthusiasts.

For the benefit of others who might wonder, the locations included Paulina Falls, the old irrigation flume near Shevlin Park, an unnamed cave near Arnold Ice Caves, the Wanoga Butte lookout, the Elk Lake pack station cabin, Todd and Green Lakes, the lava beds near Devil's Gardens, (on the Elk Lake road), and Dutch-

man's Flat. And of course, the snow-covered Cascades.

The forest fire, a crowning, spurning fury, was the only part that was "faked." A small, controlled fire was started, with Forest Service permission, near Mud Lake. The rest was stock footage.

Recognized in bit parts were Elaine Glass, Gordon Mouser and Phyllis Maitland, who have appeared in productions of the Bend Community Players. The Forest Service ranger was Frank Smith, who has done professional acting in Hollywood. The night club operator was Carvel Kirsch, Ted's brother-in-law.

### The Straw-Hat Circuit

Another well-known figure in the local little theater set, Howard Mouser, is one fourth of the cast of "Spring Time for Henry," on tour for the summer. The stock company was organized by John Hillsbury of Portland, lifetime theater man whose Portland Playhouse closed its doors for a three or four-month "sabbatical."

Mouser plays the part of the husband, in the triangle bit, with Hillsbury as "Henry." Charla Andrews, veteran Portland actress, is Julia Jellwell, the leading lady.

The tour will wind down the Washington and Oregon coasts, then back up interior Oregon and Washington. Bookings are being arranged in Idaho and Montana.

Hillsbury, who accumulated a huge collection of paraphernalia during the year of the Playhouse's reign as one of the "big three" of Portland amateur theater groups, hopes to resurrect his organization in the fall in a newer, shinier theater — one equipped with a liquor license.

Just a few days before the Playhouse closed its doors, the organization received the federal government's OK as a bona fide tax deduction for those wishing to contribute financial backing. Uncle Sam's blessing came a little late for this time around, but will pave the way, Hillsbury says, for opening a new theater in the fall.

Road and stock companies are nothing new to Hillsbury, who started his stage career at the age of four with Portland's old Baker Stock Co. At age 17 he was doing Shakespeare at the Ashland Festival. He's an old theater buddy of Kirk Douglas, and did a William Saroyan play at the Pasadena Playhouse.

Where Hillsbury has been is interesting. But where he will go is even more so. Some little theater backers in Portland are betting that he will weld together a solvent theater group, and through it, express his own theatrical ability, which is considerable.

With a little luck and a lot of business sense, that may just happen.

## Vernonia man killed, probe is underway

VERNONIA (UPI)—A man was shot and fatally wounded near here early today during an altercation at a home, Columbia County Sheriff Roy Wilburn reported.

Dead is Glenn Wood, about 32, Aloha. The shooting occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Beryl Norman at Riverside just east of here. The sheriff was questioning Mrs. Norman.

Wilburn said details were sketchy but that Wood apparently went to the Norman home while the Normans were away and Mrs. Norman's mother, Mrs. Ruth Raymer, was babysitting.

Mrs. Norman told authorities she ordered Wood to leave when they returned and that he struck her. She then went into the bedroom got a gun and the shooting followed, Wilburn said.

Wilburn said a struggle occurred and no one noticed Wood had been shot until he went outside and blood was seen on his shirt.

The sheriff was continuing the investigation.

## Tire blamed in car fire
