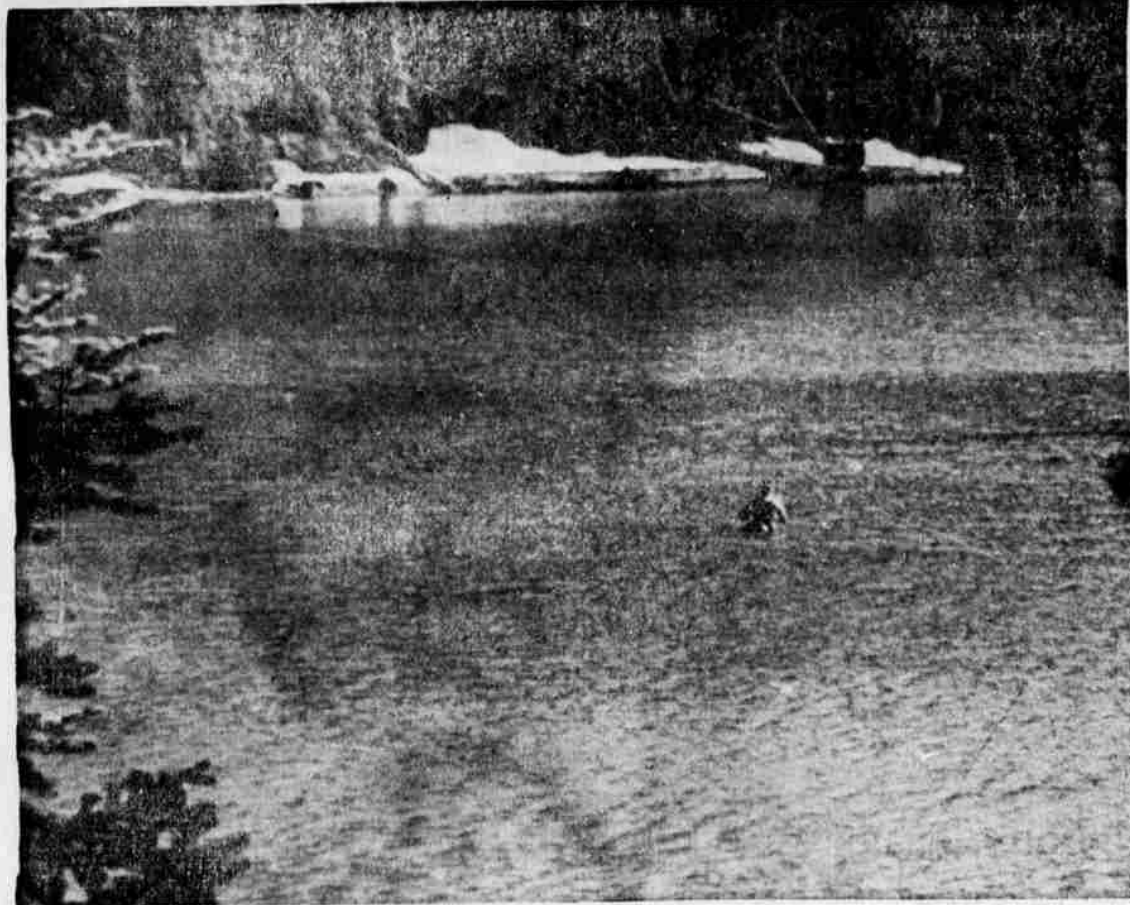




UNUSUAL SCENE—Amid quite natural setting, an unidentified fisherman appears to be walking on the water in center

Late-inning goofs: Bend Legion loses to Corvallis nine, 6-4

Bend's American Legion baseball team hit the ball all over the lot last night at the municipal ballpark, but didn't have the wherewithall to overcome a hot Corvallis nine.

Bend won it and then lost it in the last two innings, 6-4.

Bend's late-inning capitulations are becoming an unenviable pattern. Bend went ahead in the eighth frame, 4-3, but could not contain the Corvallis onslaught in the eighth and ninth innings.

Bend had two chances to redeem itself, but both times the fates were against them.

Coach Bill Bauer's locals got the go-ahead tally in the eighth when Derald Parsons doubled, stole third and scored on a balk.

Trouble came, however, in the top of the ninth. Jim Davis, Corvallis' tosser, got aboard on an error, and went to second when teammate Randy Sammy scratched an infield hit. Things looked not too healthy for Bend, but fans

were not prepared for the colossal goof that followed. Dan Dumont bunted down the third base line, Parsons picked it up and tried to force Davis at third, but overthrew sending the ball deep into the left field bullpen.

This wild toss allowed two Corvallis runs and put Dumont on the bag at third. Roger Cox, Corvallis' hard hitting catcher who played on the USC frosh team last spring, then blasted a tremendous sacrifice fly to center, scoring Dumont.

Bend's number one disappointment, however, came in the bottom of the ninth. Bend got the bases full with nobody out, but was not able to score.

It happened this way. Don Watrous singled. Bill Kohn walked, Dave Shelton singled, and the bags were full. Parsons went down swinging, and Coach Bauer brought in George Woodworth to pinch hit for Paul Wardlaw. Woodworth hit a liner down the third base line, and Terry Westfall, Corvallis' third sacker who played frosh ball last spring at Cal Poly, snared it and dashed back to the bag to double off Watrous. It was a close one, but the umpire called Watrous out.

This ended it all for Bend, who now has fallen below the .500 water mark in season play. Bend has won nine and lost 10.

Minor leagues' president dies

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI)—Cancer took the life Monday of George (Red) Trautman, 73, dealing a severe loss to the faltering minor leagues of baseball for which he fought for 16 years as president.

Trautman, a life-long sportsman who never was good enough to make the ranks as a professional player, had been ill for three months and underwent surgery a few weeks ago.

He had returned to his home two weeks ago suffering from lung cancer, but his family and employees of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues (the minors) headquarters here knew of his condition.

The funeral will be at 11 a.m., EST, Wednesday at St. Alban's Episcopal Church here.

Trautman became president of the minor leagues on Jan. 1, 1947, following the retirement of the late Judge W. G. Bramham. The minors were flourishing in the post-war boom at the time, but came upon hard times with increased competition of television and other recreation forms.

Trautman's only known professional play was in one doubleheader for a now unknown eastern team on a non-contract basis.

He entered the executive side of the game in 1933 when he was named president of the old Columbus Red Birds of the American Association that year.

His teams won two pennants and two Junior World Series in three years before he took over as president of the American Association in 1936. He became minor league president after serving as vice president and general manager of the Detroit Tigers during the 1946 season.

Moose wins 24-4

McKinley only seeded Yankee

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI)—Chuck McKinley of St. Ann, Mo., the only seeded American in the men's singles, and eight other Yanks will attempt to catch up with the field today in the Wimbledon tennis championships.

Five Americans, led by Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif., won first round matches and six Yanks were eliminated before rain washed out nearly half of the opening-day schedule Monday.

McKinley, a 22-year-old student at Trinity (Tex.) University who was seeded fourth for this largest tennis "world series," drew South African Davis Cupper Cliff Drysdale as his opening opponent.

Frank Froehling of Coral Gables, Fla., second behind McKinley in the current U.S. rankings, was pitted against seventh-ranked Donald Dell of Bethesda, Md., in an all-American opener.

19 entries in AAU decathlon says Sam Bell

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI)—Meet director Sam Bell said today that 19 entries had been received for the National A.A.U. Decathlon meet to be held Friday and Saturday.

He said that last Saturday was the mailing deadline, but that he would accept any entry postmarked then that came in the mail in the next day or two.

Bell was especially hoping still to hear from Phil Mulkey, former Memphis State cinder star and one of the United States' best in the tiring 10-event test.

The withdrawal of world record holder C. K. Yang in order to tour Europe with a Nationalist Chinese team has turned the competition into a wide-open scramble but four names seemed to loom above the rest.

There was Paul Herman, 1961 title holder with a high of 8061 points; Steve Pauly with a best of 7226 and the advantage of competing on his own track; Dave Edstrom, Kansas Relays Decathlon king this year with a high of 8176; and Mulkey, who piled up 8709 points in 1961.

Not only is the national title at stake here, but the top two

finishers will earn the coveted trip to Europe and the chance to compete in the forthcoming U.S.-USSR track meet.

Friday's events include the 100 meters, broad jump, shot put, high jump and 400 meters. Saturday will see the pole vault, 110-meter high hurdles, discus, javelin and 1500 meters.

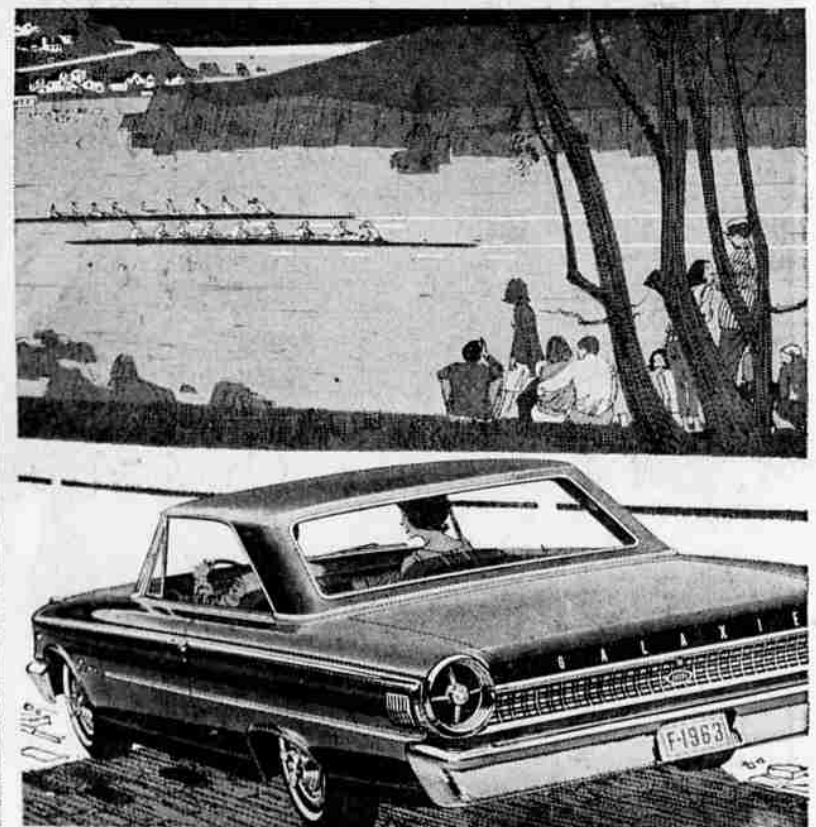
The meet will be scored according to traditional point-counting methods, despite impending moves by the International Amateur Athletic Federation to

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Local boxing commission chairman Fred Aaronson wants the World Boxing Association to make sure that Sonny Liston, who cancelled his fight here due to a knee injury, is fit to fight Floyd Patterson in Las Vegas next month.

Aaronson explained that the big heavyweight champion of the world is still carried on the Miami Beach commission record as "ill and unavailable" and that he should be formally released from this status by the commission here before being allowed to fight elsewhere.

Liston was scheduled to fight Patterson for the championship here in April, but injured his knee and the match was off.

Aaronson said Monday that Liston is not under any obligation now to fight here, but that "it seems only right that if a fighter withdraws from a fight in one town because of an injury, that injury should be certified as cured before he fights in another WBA town."
