Accused slayer flees hospital

SALEM (UPI)— Arthur Ferrie, 60, an accused slayer, walked away from the grounds of the Oregon State Hospital here Tuesday.

Hospital authorities said Ferrie, who was committed in 1943, was not believed dangerous.

Ferrie was charged in February of 1943 with the fatal shooting of Albert Iowa Berg, 54, at the Coos County town of Charleston. He was indicted for first degree murder.

Hospital authorities said Ferrie was on parole from the hospital at the time of the shooting. He was recommitted.

Hospital officials several months ago recommended Ferrie's transfer to an open ward and assignment to a job on the grounds. Records show that Berg was marched from his house at gunpoint and shot twice in the head with a .22 caliber rifle. Ferrie also was charged with attacking and wounding another man the following day.

Sweden stunned by spy case

STOCKHOLM (UPI) — Sweden was stunned today by the disclosure of the most serious espionage case in its history. Some newspapers demanded a complete overhaul of the nation's security system following charges which involved a retired air force colonel alleged to have spied for the Soviet Union for 15 years. Other newspapers attacked Russia for carrying out espionage in Sweden.

A Foreign Ministry spokesman said Tuesday that Col. Erik Wennerstrom, 56, a trusted and respected former air force officer and one-time attaché in Washington, had confessed to selling American and Swedish defense secrets to the Communists.

Sweden traditionally is neutral, but it has close ties to Norway, Denmark, the United States and other members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Foreign Minister Torsten Nilsson informed the Soviet charge d'affaires that the first secretary at the Soviet Embassy, Georgi Baranovski, and the military attaché, Maj. Gen. Vitali Mukolski, were persona non grata. Reports said both Russians left the country hurriedly.

Nilsson charged that the staff of the Soviet diplomatic mission "had been actively violating Swedish as well as international law."

"This case is a deeply shocking one," said Defense Minister Sven Andersson. "Col. Wennerstrom has caused his country serious damage."

Security officials did not disclose how much information Wennerstrom relayed to the Kremlin over the years, but there were indications he had received large sums of money.

The former colonel, who has an attractive wife and two children, lived in a luxurious villa in the plush Stockholm suburb of Djursholm. He was known as a genial host who entertained lavishly.

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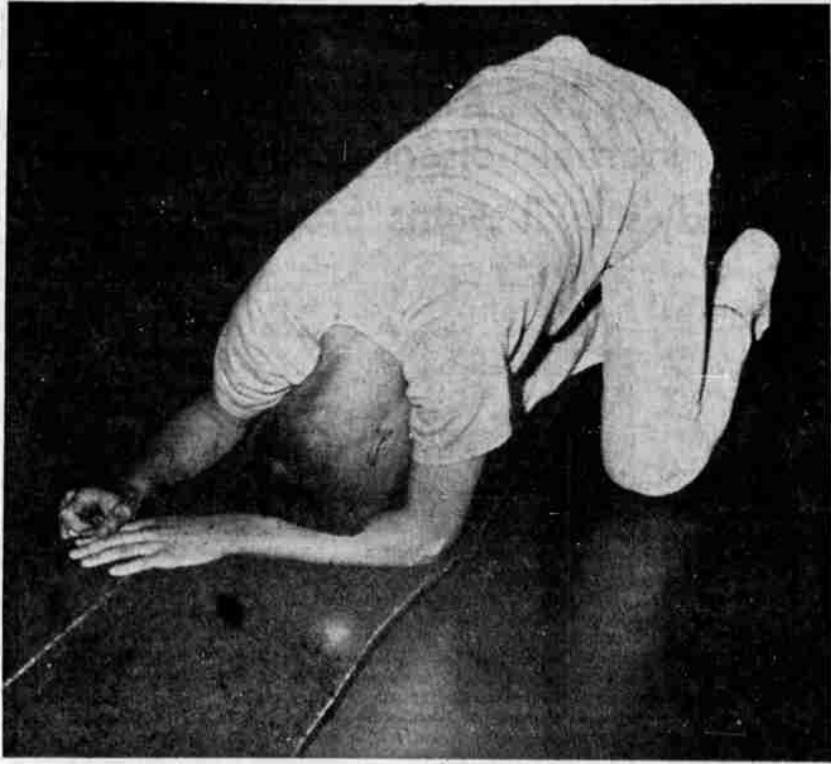

In order to qualify for the trip, the boys had to place in the local marble tournament which was sponsored by the Eagles. Eight various grade school winners competed in a playoff for the top four positions.

The four hopefuls will leave Saturday for the two day double elimination tourney which is being held at Jantzen Beach in Portland under the sponsorship of Jantzen Beach and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. They will compete with over 1000 other local tourney winners from throughout the state.

The meetings will be held here Thursday and next Monday. Federal Mediator George Walker said the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) would meet with the "Big Six" employer group here Thursday.

The Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW) will meet with the same employer group next Monday. Walker said the meetings would be "exploratory" in nature and were called by the mediation service.

Recruit flow is curtailed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy has sharply reduced the flow of recruits to the San Diego, Calif., Naval Training Center in an effort to combat a mysterious outbreak of meningitis cases.

Navy officials said the assignment of recruits to San Diego would be cut in half and they would be sent to other bases. The Navy already has ordered about 4,000 diverted to Great Lakes, Ill.

There have been 25 cases of meningitis at San Diego since January, and three resulted in the death of the victims. However, no new cases have been reported for more than a month.

The steps being taken to cut down on the flow of recruits to San Diego were described as precautionary and designed to reduce the chance of any new cases of the disease breaking out.

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
