

Despite concern, bulk of those getting married will stay wed

EDITOR'S NOTE: If you are not married, the chances are overwhelming that you will be. The following dispatch, the first of four, examines the subject of matrimony and divorce.

June is busting out all over with marriages, and the annual national rate shows that six persons wed every minute.

The ceremony is performed on an average of every 19 1/2 seconds through the year. The total number of persons wed this year will be about 1.6 million.

And despite the concern over the rising divorce rate, the bulk of them will stay married. Census figures show that 85 per cent of the Americans who have been married have had only one spouse. Sociologists have found that three-fourths of all divorced persons remarry within five years.

Subject Of Debate

Thus, most American marriages endure, happily or otherwise. The happiness percentage has been a subject of debate down through the centuries.

Author J. P. Marquand said marriage is "damnable serious business, particularly around Boston."

Essayist Michel De Montaigne likened marriage to a "cage," Shakespeare to a "curse," and Cervantes to a "noose."

Popular it is. In the United States 9 of every 10 persons marry before the age of 32. The average age for marriage is around 20 for women and 22 for men — somewhat too soon according to many authorities. The most popular age for marriage among women is 23 and among men 25-27.

If you are an unmarried woman

between the ages of 22 and 24 there is one chance in five you will marry before the year ends. If you are an unmarried male between the ages of 25 and 28 there is better than one chance in six you will marry within the next 12 months.

But if you are a bachelor aged 30 there are less than three chances in four you will ever marry. A 30-year-old spinster has only slightly more than one chance in two of ever marrying. An unmarried woman who is 40 has only one chance in five of finding a husband, but an unmarried man the same age has a one in three chance.

"Two Party System"

An American Medical Association writer, Dr. Stanley R. Dean, described marriage as "probably the first two-party system of government ever devised."

An ideal partner in this two-party system, Dr. James H. Peterson, University of Southern California sociologist and marriage counselor said, is "a person who meets one's emotional needs, wits within the boundary of one's temperamental pattern, who is physically attractive, and who maintains interests that are stimulating — one who has a well-developed sense of values on which one can depend, and one who has fairly similar cultural-reference groups (a sociological term meaning similar background)."

As for what makes marriages go wrong, Peterson warned:

"As the age of the individual goes down from 21, the divorce rate goes up. The lower the age, the higher the rate of failure."

"The higher the educational level, the lower the rate of divorce," he adds. "The more schooling the fewer the problems."

Warm-up in Catholic-Protestant relations probably to continue

The remarkable warm-up in Catholic-Protestant relations which began under Pope John XXIII will continue under Pope Paul VI.

That is the expectation voiced by Protestant leaders who regard the new pope as a progressive, open-minded man, sincerely anxious to heal divisions in the Christian family.

The election of Milan's liberal archbishop to the papal throne ended a period of anxious suspense for Protestants. Not since the Reformation had they awaited the outcome of a conclave with such prayerful concern. They feared that a deadlock might lead to election of a compromise pope who would be lukewarm or indifferent toward Pope John's mighty efforts to "renew" the Catholic Church and reunite the Christian family.

The Rev. Dr. Stanley L. Stuber of Jefferson City, Mo., an official Protestant observer at the Second Vatican Council, said: "I feel that we can look forward to most fruitful and cordial relationships under his reign."

Prayed For Guidance

The Rev. Dr. Arthur Lee Kinsolving, president of the Protestant Council of New York City, said:

"To a degree unprecedented in history, Protestants have been praying to almighty God for the guidance of his Holy Spirit in the College of Cardinals as they chose a successor to that noble man, Pope John XXIII."

"With a new sense of fellow feeling and concern for the future of the Roman Catholic Church, we are grateful for the news of the election of Cardinal Montini, who is reportedly devoted to the same progressive and inclusive

Christian purpose."

There were similar comments from many other Protestant leaders in the United States and other countries.

Protestant leaders considered it a foregone conclusion that Pope Paul would act promptly to reconvene the Second Vatican Council, which was automatically suspended by the death of Pope John.

They also were convinced, by his past record and recent utterances, that the new Pope would seek the same basic goals of "renewal" and "updating" of the church that were so dear to the heart of his predecessor.

Some thought that Pope Paul VI, being younger, more intense and less patient of delay and obstruction, might move even more vigorously than Pope John XXIII in pressing for far-reaching reforms.

During the opening session of the Vatican council last fall, Cardinal Montini was unmistakably identified with the "liberal" bishops. He backed a liturgical reform plan which would permit use of modern languages rather than Latin in some portions of the Mass. And he spoke up strongly for modernization of the church's administrative structure, to give more authority and autonomy to bishops. He sharply criticized conservative members of the Roman Curia for trying to sidetrack the reform movement initiated by Pope John XXIII.

Two weeks ago, at a public memorial service for the late Pope, Cardinal Montini urged the Catholic Church "not only to remember but to follow" the path which John XXIII "blazed with such boldness." He warned specifically against any turning back from the spirit of "ecumenism" or Christian unity.

New pope has outstanding record against Communists

POPE PAUL VI

When he left Milan for the secret conclave of cardinals following the death of Pope John XXIII, Giovanni Battista Cardinal Montini already was generally considered the man most likely to replace the kindly peasant's son on the Throne of St. Peter.

As he entered the Sistine Chapel the evening the conclave began, murmurs were heard from those gathered to watch, "Papa... Papa... Pope. Montini, obviously annoyed, threw up his

hands and quickened his pace. But the next time he was seen in public—some 43 hours later—it was in the white robes of the Pope.

Somewhat Different

Montini's departure from Milan for the conclave was somewhat different than his arrival there some nine years earlier. At that time, on a rainy January day in 1955, the archbishop—but not yet cardinal—had spent 30 years with the Vatican secretariat of state.

He was a close friend of Pope Pius XII and in his position as pro-secretary of state for ordinary (internal affairs), he had been an extremely powerful man inside the Vatican. Pius, several years before, had offered to raise him to the rank of cardinal but Montini had turned it down, saying he

preferred to continue as pro-secretary so he could better serve the pontiff.

His appointment as archbishop of Milan was made on Nov. 3, 1954. Milan, the heart of Italian industrialism, was booming not only with new money but also with Communist workers.

Goes to Workers

The archbishop took the battle to the workers, to the factories, steel plants, rubber works—wherever there were laborers to be found.

Within days after his arrival in Milan, he started the first of a series of visits that were to go on through his entire time there. He visited every church of his archdiocese, and almost every factory, no matter how small.

Montini is an intellectual, and even then he did not rely on emo-

tion or political crusading to make his point with the workers. He spoke clearly, not moving them to tears, but leaving them with ideas and thoughts to ponder.

Leader of Liberals

During the years of Pope John's reign, Montini came to be generally regarded as the leader of the Italian "liberals"—although he did not publicly hold that role during the council when differences of opinion cropped up between the liberal and conservative groups.

He spoke only once during the first two-month session of the council, while some cardinals spoke as many as 20 times on different subjects up for debate.

But behind the scenes, Montini played an important role. He held constant consultations with the

non-Italian cardinals who took the public leadership in the "liberal" groups.
