

Floats invited for Fair parade

 REDMOND — All Central Oregon has been invited to enter floats in the 1963 Deschutes County fair parade, according to Chairman John Holechek.

Holechek and his committee members, Dr. Dean Dowd, Ray Pulsifer and Eldon Stroup, have sent letters in all directions urging entry of floats. Return postcards accompanied the letters. Holechek says everyone is invited to enter the parade, whether or not they receive a letter of invitation.

The parade will march down Sixth Street in Redmond at 11 a.m. Saturday, August 3, a highlight of the 44th annual Deschutes County Fair, which also includes two rodeo performances and hundreds of open class, 4-H and FFA exhibits.

With the fair less than six weeks away, board members and volunteer workers have moved into high gear in preparation for the festivities. Redmond Union High School has granted the board permission to use the high school gymnasium again this year for the queen's ball Friday evening, August 2, and the buckaroo dance Saturday evening.

Several changes have been

made in facilities at the arena and on the fairgrounds, both for convenience and as a safeguard for participants. The racetrack has been fenced off from the main arena. The track now can be used for cutting horse contests after the regular race program. The ambulance will be stationed at the south end of the arena.

L. M. McCormack has been awarded the bid for painting all fences and buildings at the fairgrounds. Rodeo ticket booths have been moved closer to the north end of the grandstand.

Since the new fair premium book was issued, there has been a change in location of the dress revue and home economics awards program. Originally scheduled in the high school gymnasium, the event now will take place in the Catholic Parish Hall Friday, August 2, at 8 p.m.

7 'Tolerance' vote favored by state officials

OLYMPIA (UPI) — The voters should have a chance to decide if they want Washington to have an official "tolerance" toward gambling in spite of the bold theft of referendum petitions, Gov. Albert D. Rosellini and Atty. Gen. John J. O'Connell agreed today.

Both Rosellini and O'Connell promised to do all within their power to place the tolerance policy referendum on the November, 1964, general election ballot even without the formal petitions.

But they also agreed that only the State Supreme Court could decide if the measure legally could be placed before the voters.

O'Connell said he would file a suit soon asking the court to authorize the vote.

"The Supreme Court will have to write some new law on this," O'Connell said, "but unless the measure is on the ballot, the wishes of the people will have been thwarted."

Meanwhile, police searched for the two men who were believed to have stolen the petitions from a vault in the State Capitol Building where the documents were awaiting the official canvass by Secretary of State Victor Meyers.

Hall conviction upheld by court

BOISE (UPI) — The Idaho Supreme Court has upheld the 25-year robbery conviction of Rodger Hall in connection with the 1959 holdup-slashing of an Oregon doctor near Gooding.

Hall was convicted on a robbery charge in a Gooding court after first having been acquitted for the fatal shooting of Dr. John Hunt Jr.

Hunt was traveling alone in his car from Oregon to visit in the east when he was accosted on U.S. Highway 30 near Gooding.

Hall was traveling in a car with Emmett Spencer and Mary Katherine Hampton, who turned state's witness and was never prosecuted.

"The three," the court said, "after passing Hunt's car and assuring themselves that he was alone, stopped ahead of Hunt. Spencer flagged him to a stop with a road map as a ruse, ostensibly to ask directions."

"He then approached Hunt's car with a gun concealed under the map, forced himself into the car and at gunpoint ordered Hunt to drive off the highway, where he ordered Hunt to deliver his wallet to Hall, which he did."

"Then Spencer shot and wounded Hunt and moved him from under the wheel, drove Hunt's car to a more secluded spot, where his car and belongings were ran-

sacked, and where Hunt was fatally shot by Spencer and left in his car, where he was subsequently found by officers."

The court said Spencer was never apprehended and returned to Idaho.

"It has recently been learned that he is in prison in Florida," the court said, "convicted and awaiting the death penalty for murder committed there."

Justice C. J. Taylor wrote the unanimous opinion.

Special meals for inmates due

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope Paul VI will mark his coronation Sunday by offering special meals to prison inmates in Rome, Milan and other Italian cities, a high Vatican source reported today.

The source said it was not immediately known who would represent the Pope at the luncheons in the prisons. The pontiff himself was not planning to visit any of the jails on his coronation day.

The gesture was reminiscent of the charitable interest in prisoners taken by Pope Paul's predecessor, the late John XXIII.

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
