'Invasion' talk among refugees has died down

MIAMI (UPI)—Talk of a new refugee "invasion" of Cuba has died down here as rapidly as it flared up about a week ago.

It is now clear that a report that refugees "commandos" from Central America were smuggling arms to anti-Castro guerrillas in Cuba snowballed out of all proportion in the telling.

About 20 men appear actually to have landed in Cuba, but exaggerated reports reaching here magnified that number as much as 150-fold.

When "invasion" rumors first began circulating, refugee leader Manuel A. de Varona told UPI that it was true that three small-boat parties had landed in Cuba.

"The arms we sent were more important than the number of commandos," de Varona said.

In a matter of minutes, however, the number of men involved suddenly shot up to "more than 500." A few hours later, Rep. Paul Rogers, D-Fla., heard from "trustworthy sources" that 3,000 heavily armed guerrillas had landed.

At that point, the press chief of the Cuban (refugee) Revolutionary Council stepped in with an announcement that the invaders would report progress by radio the following day.

Young GOP awaits speech by Goldwater

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Barry Goldwater addresses the national Young Republican convention tonight. The delegates are expected to show that the Arizona senator is their choice for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination.

Support for the conservative wing of the Republican Party in general and Goldwater in particular has been so marked at the Young Republicans (YR) conclave here that one of the candidates for the national chairmanship Wednesday announced 100 per cent support for Goldwater.

Donald E. Lukens, minority clerk of the House Rules Committee, took the step after he said he discovered Goldwater sentiment sweeping through the convention "like a fever."

"I want Senator Goldwater to be president of the United States and that's what all the young people at this convention want," he said. "They don't want anything else."

Homes of 2 police officers bombed in racial incidents

Community leaders appealed today for restraint at Minneapolis, Minn., where the homes of two policemen involved in a recent racial incident were bombed.

Civil rights leaders said the bombings may not have been done by Negroes but rather by "non-Negro persons who would like to see repressive measures taken against the Negro segment."

No one was injured in the explosions Wednesday morning which damaged the homes of Patrolman David Clunis and Police Capt. Kenneth Moore. Clunis is under suspension for allegedly beating a Negro with a blackjack during a racial incident, and Moore was suspended for allowing his men to start a fund drive to reimburse Clunis his lost pay.

The U.S. 8th Circuit Court of Appeals said at Montgomery, Ala., Wednesday it will make quick decisions on five "emergency" civil rights cases in three southern states. The suits strike at racial discrimination in Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi.

There were these other developments:

Frankfort, Ky.: Gov. Bert Combs issued an executive order Wednesday banning racial discrimination in Kentucky. He indicated he would back the order up all the way.

New York: A teachers union official charged the city board of education Wednesday with trying "to pit teachers against the integration groups." A school official had rejected union demands for teacher pay raises on grounds available education funds would have to be used to implement state-ordered school integration.

Greenwood, Miss.: Nine Negroes were arrested Wednesday when they refused police orders to disperse while attempting to register at the voting registrar's office during the clerk's lunch hour.

Richmond, Va.: Gov. Albertis S. Harrison said Wednesday that "the people" not executive edicts, eventually will solve racial problems. He called for bi-racial committees at the community level.

Canton, Miss.: A white service station operator, Ben P. Lewis, 43, was arrested and charged Wednesday with the shotgun wounding of five Negroes as they walked along a street Monday night.

Chapel Hill, N.C.: Around 100 Negro and white demonstrators protested segregation at a drug-store Wednesday and police arrested a white demonstrator on charges of striking a youth with a picket sign.

Danville, Va.: Negroes decided

at a meeting Wednesday night to observe a racial truce until a federal judge rules on the legality of a state court injunction against demonstrations.

Londoner tries to steal kiss from Princess

LONDON (UPI)—An unidentified man, described as small, white-haired and dressed in tuxedo and black hat, tried to steal a kiss from Princess Margaret at the entrance to the Sadler's Wells Ballet Theater Wednesday night.

He was pushed aside by a theater official.

Without a word, the man stepped into the crowd outside the theater, waved his hat once, smiled and walked off into the night.

There was no apparent explanation for the incident.

A theater spokesman said the man was being ushered out of the theater at the time because he had no ticket.

As he reached the door, Princess Margaret and her husband, Lord Snowdon, arrived to attend a charity ballet performance.

The man gripped Margaret's arm and leaned over to kiss her cheek.

"Everybody was astonished at the incident," the spokesman said. "It was over so quickly and the little man had gone before anyone fully realized what had happened."

Why do so many marriages end up in divorce courts?

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Most Americans stay married, but millions don't. The following dispatch, the second of four, tells why married couples in America wind up in the divorce courts.)

So you're going to get married. What do you need besides a spouse to make the marriage last? Emotional maturity, most experts say.

Lack of emotional maturity is the real reason for most divorces. That is the word of many marriage counselors, lawyers, physicians, clergymen, sociologists, psychologists and others whose job it is to try to patch up or scrape away the pieces of broken marriages.

Most of them relate lack of maturity among married persons to teen-age trips to the altar.

Divorce is most apt to occur in the second or third year of marriage when the wife is age 21 or 22 and her husband 23 to 25. Health, Education and Welfare Department statistics show.

Veteran Judge's Advice

Judge Phillip B. Gilliam, of Denver, a veteran of 27 years of Domestic Relations Courts, advises:

"Look for someone mature enough to take care of you — someone who believes in himself or herself — one who can love deeply 'not only for herself, but for myself' with oneness of purpose — a gregarious type who gets along, who likes his or her parents. These are all signs of maturity."

There is no agreement among experts on an ideal age for successful marriage.

Sociologist Ernest Mowrer of Northwestern University says, "studies of the relationship between age and marriage success show that the highest proportion of successful marriages occur between men aged 23-24 and women aged 22-23. From there on upward there is little change but under those ages the studies show marriages are apt to be less successful."

Adjustment Is Key

Dr. Freda Kehm, a sociologist and psychiatric social worker who directs Chicago's Association for Family Living, said the chances of successful marriage "depend on the facility of adjustment. At the younger ages there is less chance to adjust."

Most experts feel financial problems may be a factor in unsuccessful marriage. But there is no absolute financial test to be applied before marriage.

Dr. Jordan M. Scher, Northwestern University psychiatrist, said, "The amount of income each is willing to live within." Dr. Kehm said, "It depends on the income status of the families from which they come. What seems like very little to some seems adequate to others."

Confidence vote given Eshkol

JERUSALEM, Israel (UPI) — Members of three political parties joined forces in Israel's Knesset (parliament) Wednesday to give Premier Levi Eshkol's cabinet a vote of confidence, 64-43.

The Mapai, National Religious and Adhut Haavoda parties backed the coalition, resulting from the resignation of former Premier David Ben-Gurion 11 days ago. The same parties supported Ben-Gurion.

Ships fail to stay out of sub area

ABOARD THE USS FORT SNELLING AT SEA (UPI)—Four ships, three of them Russian, sailed through the search area for the missing submarine Thresher during the past five days despite a U.S. Navy warning to all vessels to steer clear of the area, the Navy disclosed today.

The Navy disclosure came as the bathyscaphe Trieste was readied for its third dive to the ocean bottom in an effort to find the Thresher which sank April 10 with 129 men aboard.

The Navy said it served notice to all ships to remain out of an area in a 25-mile radius from the point where the nuclear powered submarine disappeared.

The Navy said two foreign vessels, one Russian and the other unidentified, passed through the prohibited zone early today.

The other two ships, both Russian, sailed into the area Sunday and Monday.

Before dawn today an unidentified ship sailed through the area

about three miles from a marker buoy being used by the Trieste to guide her descents to the bottom.

Later, at 9:15 a.m., a Russian ship identified only by the numbers RT258, described by the Navy as a "mother ship" carrying supplies for the fleet of Russian trawlers off the U. S. coast, passed 1.3 miles from the marker buoy and within 1.5 miles of the Trieste.

The Trieste, prowling the ocean bottom 8,400 feet below the surface, made sonar contact Wednesday with a 60-foot long unidentified object.

The contact came in an area where pictures were taken previously of debris believed from the sunken 545 million submarine. Three separate magnetic contacts also were made recently in this location some 220 miles off Massachusetts' Cape Cod.

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
