

Shoop & Schulze, Healy's, Brandis, Moose, Eagles, Lelco gain victories in two days of Little League action

Two close, low-scoring contests plus one lop-sided slaughter were seen in Bend Little League play last night.

Brandis, that team that just goes on winning and winning, left no doubt in the minds of junior baseball connoisseurs that it is about to dominate the American League, just kept tearing the cover off the ball with boring consistency.

When it was all over, Brandis had beaten Medo-Land by a ridiculous score of 32-2. The largest inning for the Brandis bombers was the third in which they picked up 10 runs. The first frame provided them with five, the second with six, the fourth with a mere two, and the fifth with nine.

Wednesday night the same league saw a much calmer contest. Brandis wasn't playing. The Moose Little Leaguers did in the Dairy Queen, 8-4.

Dairy Queen Little Leaguers took things seriously right from the start, and got the jump on the Moosers when they put together a four run effort in the first frame. The Dairy Queen thus led 4-0 all the way until the fourth frame when the Moose mallet swingers finally got going. It was a big inning for the Moose. It provided with six runs, enough for the win. As insurance, however, the Moose picked up two more in the fifth.

Over at Marshall Field in the National League, last night saw

a knock-down-drag-out fracas between the Eagles and Cascade Gas. Steve Bjorvik, Eagles short stop, stole home for the winning tally in the seventh to put the Cascade Gas assunder, 5-4.

Scoring by both squads was evenly distributed over the innings. Cascade Gas picked up the first one in the second frame, and in the bottom half of the same inning, the Eagles pushed across two. Cascade Gas came right back in the third and posted two more, and the Eagles answered them with a lonesome score in the frame's bottom half. With the count knotted 3-all, the Eagles crossed the plate with another in the bottom of the fourth for the go-ahead.

Cascade Gas, however, picked up one in the fifth.

Wednesday night, the National League saw the Lelco nine shut-out the Elks, 5-0. After scoring an early, and what proved to be the winning tally in the first inning, the Lelco batters waited until the fifth frame to get rolling again. When the fifth frame came,

Lelco padded its 1-0 lead with another tally, and then in the sixth gained a little security with a three-run spurge.

Dennis Murphy did the trick on the mound for the Lelco charges. He almost tossed a no-hitter, but a solid rap by Bobby Backstrom in the sixth and final inning, robbed Murphy of the coveted honor. Murphy hurled 13 strike outs.

Juniper Park last night was the scene of another close one. Healy's Little Leaguers managed to outlast a stingy Miller's nine, 4-2. Miller's, however, never was ahead of Healy's. Healy's got the first tally of the game in the second inning when Mike McCool blasted a home run with nobody aboard. Two more base hits in the frame failed to score another run, however.

Miller's went scoreless in the first three innings, and Healy's picked up its last three runs in the third frame. Then, in the top of the fourth, Miller's took advantage of a walk and two base raps, (one a double by Dave Plath)

and crossed the plate with two runs. The fifth and sixth frames proved to be uneventful, and the 4-2 fifth inning score turned out to be the final margin.

More hitting occurred at Juniper the night before. A never-say-the-season-is-shot Shoop & Schulze nine came through early to win it, 10-6. VFW was the loser.

Steve Kiel, who toils on the mound like a real workhorse, went the distance for Shoop & Schulze and came out winner.

Shoop & Schulze, furious over several recent losses, took it's wrath out just as soon as the game got started. Boom! the first inning was over and the Shoop & Schulze squad had the Vets by the tail, 5-0. Shoop & Schulze batters pelted the horsehide some more in the second to fatten its lead by three more tallies. Two more in the third put the heretofore losers out in front by a sizable 10-0 margin. VFW went to work late in the contest, garnering four runs in the fifth and two more in the sixth, but the Shoop & Schulze bombers couldn't care less and coasted home with a well-earned 10-6 victory.

Leading the hitting performances of the contest was Shoop & Schulze's Des Triplett who nearly hit one out of the lot in the second frame. It was the tilt's only home run.

It was a game of extra base hits. Shoop & Schulze had three doubles and a triple. The losing Vets let themselves be known as first baseman Jonnis banged a sizzling three bagger as did catcher Johnson. Both triples came in the fifth inning.

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Texan McKinley favored to gain at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI)—Chuck McKinley of San Antonio, Tex., seeking to become the first American to win the Wimbledon men's crown since 1955, was favored to nail down a quarterfinal berth today when he met India's Jaidip Mukerjee.

Frank Froehling, the only other Yank survivor in the men's singles, doesn't swing back into action until Saturday when he faces England's Roger Taylor.

Three of the five Americans remaining in the women's singles were scheduled to play today.

Donna Floyd Fales of Arlington, Va., was pitted against Mrs. Vera Sukova, the Czech housewife who lost to Karen Hantze Susman of San Antonio in last year's final; Dorothy Head Knode, formerly of New York but now living in Tokyo, faced Mrs. J. W. Cawthorn of England, and Tary Ann Fretz of Harrisburg, Pa., met Jan Lehane of Australia in third round matches.

McKinley and Froehling both took advantage of sore-armed foes in reaching the round of 16 Thursday.

Fourth-ranked McKinley needed only 50 minutes to gain a 6-3, 6-2, 6-2 victory over Arthur Ashe of Los Angeles, who suffered a recurrence of an arm injury and admitted he "felt like quitting but wouldn't."

Froehling, a 6-3 native of Coral Gables, Fla., who is ranked second behind McKinley in the U.S., was leading Australia's Bob Howe, 6-3, 6-4, 3-2, when the Aussie was forced to retire because of a strained right arm.
